KLCC WINS NATIONAL AWARD - KLCC-FM was awarded a first prize by the Corporation for Public Broadcasting for its "Morning Edition" promotional/advertising campaign. KLCC won the prize in the category of markets with 399,999 and fewer persons. Paula Chan Gallagher, KLCC's development directory, picked up the award--a plaque and \$1,000 check--at a Seattle conference last week. Cheryle Hawkins, Oregon Outdoor Posters, designed KLCC's billboards, charging only for materials and placement. On a trade basis, KLCC arranged print ads with five weekly and monthly newspapers and magazines. Guehler and staff from The Production Department designed the print ads, again on a trade basis.
