TIPS FOR A HEALTHY SUMMER*

You can save your skin in more ways than one if you take simple steps to protect yourself from the sun.

The American Cancer Society reports that between 300,000 and 600,000 cases of skin cancer are diagnosed each year, and that about 5,000 people die of the disease annually.

Fortunately, most cases of skin cancer are easily curable if they are diagnosed and treated in time. Most of the deaths result from the rarer, melanoma form of skin cancer, although common types of the disease can become serious if they are left untreated.

Staying out of the sun during the hotter, midday hours will go a long way toward preventing sun damage, because the dangerous ultraviolet rays are strongest when the least amount of atmosphere filters them-two-thirds of the harmful radiation is emitted between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.

When you have to be out in strong sunlight, applying one of the new sunscreen preparations instead of the conventional suntan lotions will considerably reduce the harmful rays reaching the skin. Any sunscreen is effective, but the best are those containing para-aminobenzoic acid--PABA--or benzophenone.

Only a doctor can tell if a skin condition is cancerous or likely to become cancerous. But anyone who has a sore that doesn't heal or a mole or mark that undergoes change in color or size should get a medical checkup promptly. Usually such signs do not mean cancer, but they should be taken seriously.

The harmful rays of the sun not only can cause cancer, but may lead to premature "aging" of the skin by destroying its elasticity and leaving it dried out and wrinkled.

BOARD REPORT - The LCC Board of Education met last Wednesday night. The board elected Jim Pitney as chairman and Mary Unruh as vice chairman. Pitney, serving his third term on the LCC board, owns a dairy farm in Junction City. Mary Unruh is a financial consultant in Eugene. In other business, the board approved creation of a new two-year degree at LCC--one that would prepare students for direct entry into bachelor of science programs at four-year schools. The board also adopted a resolution to support passage of a sales tax in Oregon. The resolution specifically noted that the college would receive no additional money as the result of a sales tax, but the tax would provide property tax relief as well as more stable funding for public schools and community colleges.

CONGRATULATIONS, DAVID JOYCE - David Joyce, who teaches in Art and Applied Design and Mass Communication, recently took the Best of the Show award at the Gregon/Washington Juried Exhibition held at the Maryhill Museum of Art in Goldendale, Washington.
