ICE CREAM SOCIAL RESCHEDULED - The ice cream social planned this afternoon for LCC's new president, Dr. Richard M. Turner III, and his wife, Dolores, has been postponed in the wake of former president Eldon G. Schafer's death Tuesday evening. The ice cream social, hosted by the LCC Board of Education, has been rescheduled for Tuesday, Aug. 20, 4 to 6 p.m. on Bristow Square. The social will feature a croquet tournament, custom--made ice cream sundaes, and a brief program at 5.

SCHAFER MEMORIAL SERVICE - The memorial service is planned at 11 a.m. on Monday, Aug. 12, in the LCC Performing Arts Theatre, for Eldon G. Schafer. LCC's recently retired president died at Sacred Heart General Hospital Tuesday evening. All staff members are warmly invited to join the public service. Please notify your supervisor, if you will be absent from work to attend.

Schafer was president at Lane from 1970 until his April 30 retirement. Since then, he had been in and out of Sacred Heart. His most recent relapse occurred about a week and a half ago, when he returned to the hospital with complications resulting from leukemia. He was 63. He is survived by his wife, Lucy, a graduate of the University of Oregon Law School and practicing attorney, and son, Kenneth, a recent graduate of the University of Oregon.

Those who would like to make contributions in Schafer's memory are invited to consider the Eldon G. Schafer Endowment for Innovation, the Lane Memorial Blood Bank and the American Cancer Society.

In a letter to Lucy Schafer, LCC President Turner wrote: "As President of Lane Community College, 1970-1985, Eldon G. Schafer was an educational leader, administrator and mentor par excellence! His personal qualities of love and concern for his family, fellowman and community; his integrity; his commitment to the highest ideals of our society; as well as his dogged determination to persevere in the face of adversity complemented his outstanding professional attributes and provided those who knew him, even for so short a time as I, with an exemplar or model of the fullness of the human spirit."

RETIRED DEPARTMENT HEAD DIES - Melvin C. Gaskill, who retired as head of the LCC Mechanics Department in 1974, died Monday, Aug. 5. He was 70. He is survived by his wife, Lois, and other family members. Gaskill started his teaching career in 1942 at the Eugene Vocational School as an aircraft mechanics instructor. He joined LCC when the college was formed. The family requests that, in lieu of flowers, contributions be made to the Mel Gaskill Scholarship Fund for aircraft students. Contributions may be arranged with the LCC Foundation.

ELECTRONICS DEPARTMENT ZOOMS AHEAD - The college is developing a topquality computer-aided drafting and design program. The Electronics Department has received a grant of four software packages for computeraided drafting from AutoDesk, Inc., of Sausalito, Calif. The package is valued at about \$10,000. Earlier this summer, the department received \$30,000 in hardware and \$5,000 for curriculum development through federal Vocational Education Act funding. And, this fall, Dan Forbess will join the staff as an instructor in computer-aided drafting and design. Forbess, a supervising facilities engineer with Hughes Aircraft, holds a master's degree in industrial technology.

MEMORIAL CELEBRATION - A memorial celebration was held Monday morning for Eldon G. Schafer, LCC's recently retired president who died last week of cancer. The celebration featured music, presentations, and the recollections of friends and colleagues. Among those speaking were Dale Parnell, LCC's founding president and current president of the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges; Omar Barbarossa, LCC's student body president in the 1970-71 year; and Richard McClintic, president of the Oregon Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America.

LCC Pres. Richard M. Turner III read a resolution adopted by the LCC Board of Education last week that names Schafer "president emeritus in perpetuity." As president emeritus, Schafer's name with the title emeritus will be used in all official lists of college administrators. "This is a way of keeping his name and his memory before us and future generations," according to Turner.

THANKS TO ALL WHO HELPED - Thanks to the many staff members who contributed to Monday's memorial celebration for Eldon G. Schafer. Your efforts in organizing the event are appreciated.

BOARD PULLS TAX LEVY and OTHER BUSINESS - LCC is taking its one-year tax levy proposal off the Sept. 17 ballot and will return to voters after a more detailed analysis of financial needs. The LCC board voted last Wednesday to postpone the levy election after determining the college may receive money from two sources that would nearly equal the amount the levy would have brought in if passed. The two sources: about \$242,500 in unexpected tuition revenue, if enrollment reaches new, higher estimates; and about \$245,000 in state money approved by the 1985 Oregon Legislature. Pres. Turner says the college still needs additional financial resources, but will postpone asking taxpayers "until we can do better analysis and make our case to the community.

In other business, the LCC board approved a management employees working agreement, approved the 1985-86 College Plan, and changed a registration date for winter term.

The management agreement affects about 91 persons with the creation of a new salary schedule. The agreement represents an approximate 5 percent increase in the basic wage and salary package, according to Hank Douda of Employee Relations, and the maintenance of medical benefits at the October 1985 level, plus an additional \$50 a month per individual annuity.

The board okayed rescheduling winter term registration for new and returning students. The old date was Monday, Dec. 23; the new date is Thursday, Jan. 2. This change will make it easier for staff and students to disappear the week of Dec. 23-27. (Dec. 25, 26 and 27 are holidays.)

TEACHERS ARE VISITING - This week and next, LCC is hosting 21 teachers from elementary and middle schools throughout the area. VOTERS DEFEAT BUDGET REQUESTS - Voters rejected two community college budget requests last week. Umpqua Community College in Roseburg lost its \$250,000 supplemental operating levy, with 42 percent voting yes and 58 percent voting no. Portland Community College lost on a \$3.5million three-year levy in a much closer race, with 49 percent voting yes and 51 percent voting no. PCC is questioning the legality of the election. The measure was approved by voters in Multnomah, Washington and Clackamas counties, but defeated by voters in Columbia and Yamhill counties. College officials had not been notified that Yamhill County voters would be using mail ballots.
