"NO ONE" WINS, BUT EX-PRESIDENT GARNERS VOTES - The Chronicle of Higher Education asked college presidents across the country who the most effective national spokesperson for higher education is. The winner was "no one," who drew 17 percent of the vote. Among others listed by the 207 respondents were: The Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh, president of the University of Notre Dame, with 12 percent; John Phillips, president of the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, with 9 percent; Ernest Boyer, president of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, 8 percent; and Dale Parnell, president of the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges, 7 percent. Other academic leaders trailed behind. Parnell was LCC's first and founding president.

Myth--Telecourses require only TV viewing.

REALITY--

Telecourse students use textbooks, do assigned homework, and take midterm and final exams just as classroom students do. In addition, in most courses there are mail quizzes, interaction by telephone and in person with the instructor, and other services provided by a support staff and system. Often there are optional group seminars.

Telecourses are integrated learning systems coupling a variety of artifacts to facilitate learning, managed by a skilled faculty member within a sophisticated support system.

TELECOURSES...MYTHS & REALITIES -

MYTH 2--Telecourses are easy.

REALITY: Research on students completing such courses indicates that students feel these courses are as difficult or more difficult than classroom courses. While the content of comparable courses is the same, the course format of a telecourse requires substantial self-discipline and motivation to study. Students carry a greater responsibility for the integration of the course content. Research shows that students take telecourses as a matter of preference for variety or for convenience, not because they are easy.

There are two groups of telecourse students: first-time course takers, and repeaters. The first time an individual takes a course, he or she has a particularly difficult time learning how to take the course, as well as learning the content. The same situation applies to classroom courses, but, through years of experience, students learn how to be taught in classroom settings. When learning how to learn through other means, students must gain that experience, also.

ENROLLMENT NEWS - Enrollment at LCC is down, as reported in the Sept. 30 Daily and a flurry of recent newspaper articles and local TV broadcasts. Registration figures indicate enrollment this year will be about 7,650 full-time-equivalent students. College administrators had anticipated a drop to 8,000 from last year's 8,200. If the trend continues as projected, it could cost LCC more than \$400,000 in tuition and state aid. Sue Jordan, Productivity Center, is evaluating statistics for indicators that can help administrators and the rest of us understand what is occurring. At this point she says credit enrollment has been declining since 1982-83, while adult education enrollment has fluctuated.

BACK FROM D.C. - Jack Carter, vice president for Student Services, and Linda Waddell, director of Financial Aid, returned late last week from Washington, D.C., where they met with federal officials to discuss an alleged overpayment to LCC for financial aid programs. Carter reports the issue isn't yet resolved. He says LCC needs to develop further statistical support for the data submitted on the applications for the years in question--fiscal years 1979, 1980 and 1981. The government says it overpaid LCC about \$447,000 for "Fair Share" and "Conditional Guarantee" programs. LCC and government officials will continue to work on the problem, which could affect the amount of federal financial aid LCC will be able to award in the future.

LCC isn't the only college involved in the matter. While Waddell and Carter were in Washington, college officials from Idaho and the Oregon Institute of Technology also were there discussing their cases--with at least two institutions from Washington state scheduled for appearances in November.

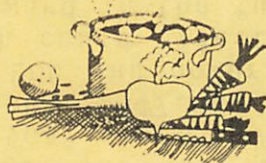

They'll be helped by the Planning Committee, made up of members of the Administrative Council and College Cabinet. All staff members will have opportunities to participate in the planning process, at the department level.

These are President Turner's speeches at the Instructional Senate inservice session and all-staff meeting, and Diane Dann's report on the status of marketing planning.

SAFETY RECORD DROPS - According to Bill Mansell of Administrative Services, the college's safety record for 1984-85 was not as good as the 1983-84 record. During 1984-85, 46 accidents occurred at a cost of \$34,505. During the previous year, 24 accidents occurred at a cost of \$21,469. (Reserves are included in these totals to allow for potential costs for accident claims still on open status.) The Mathematics Department continues as the college's safety leader with its 12-year, accident-free record.

Mansell reports that a number of safety activities underway may help improve the college's overall record. A wellness/fitness program for employees may be initiated. The college also will be implementing new federal regulations requiring organizations to inventory, classify and list all harmful chemical agents and substances to make staff, students and the public aware of their presence and use. A system of safety awards also is under study.

OPEN GYM - Community patrons, as well as LCC students and staff, can take advantage of the college's wide range of athletic facilities. The cost to community patrons is \$1 for a daily user's fee card or \$10 for a term pass. The fees cover use of gyms for basketball, badminton and volleyball; the weight room; and the resurfaced tennis courts. They do not cover locker room or gym clothes services. User cards are available at the Intramural and Recreational Sports office, which is located in the main gym and is open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

TELECOURSES--MYTHS & REALITIES

MYTH 4--Telecourses are developed by TV people who care only about entertainment, and faculty members are basically excluded from tele-course development.

REALITY: Telecourses are high initial-cost development courses, the costs of which must be amortized by wide use. No single person designs or produces a telecourse. Telecourses are produced by a team of people, including instructional designers acquainted with educational technology, one or more faculty advisors, a TV producer, and various other personnel, including writers and editors of print materials, researchers, etc. Often there are special content consultants used in developing specific program content and an advisory committee to review the overall course outline, topics, and instructional objectives. In fact, telecourses are produced with the specific purpose of providing the independent study student with a course comparable in content to a classroom course, if it is the purpose of the course to replicate that content. In addition, several telecourses have been developed that do not replicate courses previously taught in classroom settings.

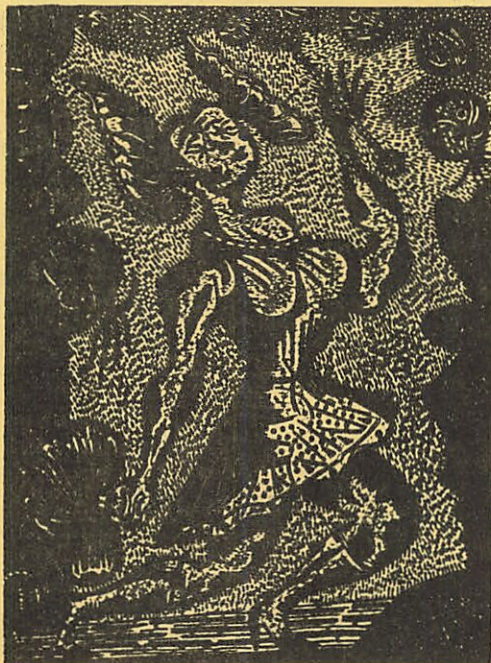
