EXCELLENCE THROUGH INNOVATION - Representatives from the League for Innovation in the Community College visited LCC last week to review the college's continuing membership in the national organization. In an information session with interested staff, the League reps shared some facts: Nineteen college districts (53 colleges), representing 14 states and one Canadian province, now belong to the League. That amounts to 26,000 staff members in League colleges and 850,000 college students. Right now, the League is focusing on the community college and the computer. RETENTION HINT FOR TEACHERS: OVERVIEW A CHAPTER BEFORE READING - Many students are not skilled in how to learn from their readings, especially textbooks. Show them the study aids an author has incorporated into a text. Does the author put major headings and sub-heads into an outline to show a chapter's structure? Does the author have major headings in the forms of questions? Does the author use good visual aids, such as diagrams, graphs and pictures? Does the author use study questions, a summary and a glossary at the end? Students should survey their texts by answering these questions. How do you, the instructor, view each chapter? Give your students a brief overview of each chapter before they read it, so they know what you think is important. By teaching your students textbook skills, you are teaching them how to be independent learners.



RETENTION HINT: for instructors - Help your students take good lecture notes. Remind students you don't expect them to take notes on everything you say; but, they do need to record the main ideas, main details, and support. Then you, the instructor, need to be very clear to stress those main ideas, details and support. Use such clear cues as: writing on the board; stressing points with strong body language; using such transitions as "First," "Another important point," and "Get this clearly;" and summarizing your main points at the end of the lecture. Try to make abstract ideas visual by using models, diagrams or other aids. The more that students can see abstract ideas visually, the better they can remember them.

THIS WEEK'S RETENTION HINT - Let students know it's okay to make mistakes. Explain to them we learn best if we risk being wrong. Let them know it's good to ask questions. Whenever we learn something new, we are awkward and feel a bit inept. Share your own educational process. Let them know how you felt as a student just learning what they are learning now. Share your early awkwardness in the subject with them. Empathize with your students' errors and help your students learn from them. Go over common errors students make on their exams--before and after the exam. Encourage individual students to bring in their exams and discuss errors they don't understand. Errors are tools to help us learn.

Even though they may not be a member of the management bargaining group, many classified and faculty employees are responsible for the assignment of work to other employees or students (work-study, CWE, etc.)



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


