WELLNESS SPACE - Did you know depression comes in two forms--chronic and acute? Acute depression can be the result of a run-in with your boss, a fight with your spouse, a smashup with your car. It has a specific, identifiable and appropriate cause.

Chronic depression may appear not to have a cause. It's the result of acute depressions that have been allowed to build up. Chronic depression may be difficult to identify. Its symptoms include insomnia, fatigue, low self esteem, withdrawal, difficulty in making decisions, and a tendency to put things off. The most important difference between acute and chronic depression is that where acute depressions are usually unavoidable, chronic depression is to be avoided at all costs.

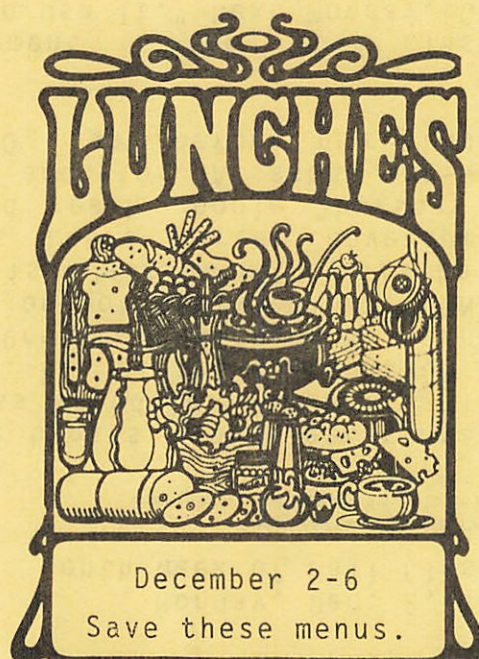

WELLNESS SPACE - DO YOU KNOW that in contrast to acute depression, chronic depression is nearly always disabling, and will complicate a person's life in ways that may be hard to correct and may at times be irreversible? We must deal with our acute depressions as they come, and not allow them to become chronic. HOW? Psychologically, by forcing ourselves to confront and analyze our acute depressions, as painful as that might be. Talk to someone--a spouse, friend or professional counselor--at the very outset of a depressed feeling. HOW? Physically, by keeping ourselves strong enough to be reasonably resilient to life's unavoidable setbacks. As the ancient Greeks discovered centuries ago, mind and body are in this thing together.

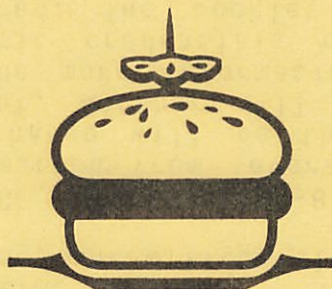

ELECTRONICS FIRE DAMAGE STILL UNKNOWN - A transformer fire of undetermined origin has cut power to the Electronics Building--forcing the transfer of students and staff to other campus locations, and possibly damaging sensitive electronics equipment with its smoke. The fire occurred Monday morning, with the power outage stopping clocks at 6:22 a.m. The Goshen Fire Department assisted in putting out the fire, which was contained to the transformer area. Before the fire could be extinguished, smoke was vented to the building's first and second floors through ducts leading from the transformer's basement site. In addition to the damaged transformer, which may cost as much as \$10,000 to repair or replace, electronics lab equipment was penetrated by sticky carbon dust. Some of the building's offices and classrooms also received a coating of the oily, smoky substance. The carbon dust requires special cleaning, and all of it must be removed to prevent recontamination. LCC will be contracting with outside firms to clean the building, its fixtures and furniture and to clean affected lab equipment. The latter treatment involves immersion in an acetone bath. The cost for cleaning up and repairing damages could run as high as \$50,000, according to Paul Colvin of Campus Services. Beyond the college's \$1,000 deductible, the cost is to be borne by LCC's insurance carrier. Students have had to convert remaining labs to lectures during this last week of fall term. College staff are moving as quickly as possible to assure that equipment and classrooms will be available for students starting classes on Jan. 6.

What's doin' with Staff Development these days?

Most of you are probably aware by now that the office has experienced a transition period since last spring. The college has decided to continue to offer needed training and development opportunities through a highly service-oriented centralized office staffed by me. For the present, the office continues as a part of the Office of the President; I report directly to Larry Warford, Executive Assistant to the President.

What kinds of services can you expect from Staff Development? For the time being, I'll be working within the following guidelines:

1. The responsibility for providing training and development activities will be split between this office and the line managers, as follows:

Staff Development will offer activities of general interest to all employees or groups of employees (such as first aid, computer training, stress management, etc.) We'll also continue to keep you posted about these opportunities each term via our quarterly overall calendar of training and development activities, as well as up-to-date, relevant information in our monthly column and follow-up reminders in other issues of the DAILY, as appropriate.

The responsibility for specialized staff development activities remains with line managers. However, if you are a manager, the office can do any number of things to help you develop and train your staff. We can help you decide what training you or your staff needs, coordinate and/or implement any phase of the training, evaluate the outcome, and keep track of who has attended what. I'm available to work with you on any or all of the above categories on an as-needed basis.

2. The office will continue to serve as a central clearing house for information regarding off-campus staff development opportunities, including workshops, seminars, faculty exchanges, and opportunities for employment abroad.

3. The Staff Development Resource Center in ADM 113 is open for any employee's use and contains books, publications, and tapes of interest to classified, faculty and management staff. The office will continue to circulate publications of interest to employees on our routing lists.

4. Staff Development remains responsible for maintaining the Quality Circle program on campus, as well as the assignment of experienced meeting facilitators on short-term assignment, as requested.

I'd like to close by saying that my goal is to provide the highest degree of service to any employee who requests it from this office. Please let me know if there's any way Staff Development can help you. Call me at ext. 2577 or 2849, or come by and visit in ADM 114.

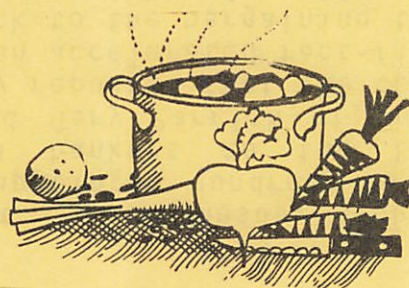

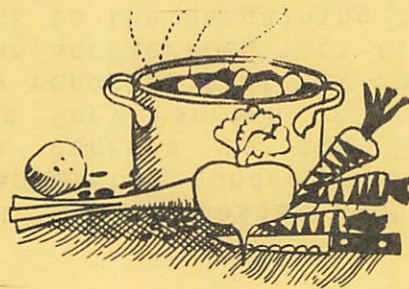

THE TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT

The Training and Development Department at Lane Community College provides training and employment services to both the public and private sectors. The Department has been nationally recognized for delivering innovative and effective programs for a wide variety of individuals and agencies. The Department has been very successful in developing programs which allow economically and educationally disadvantaged individuals the opportunity to receive training and then transition into the labor market quickly. During Fiscal Year 1984-85, the Department had a budget of 1.2 million dollars and served over 600 students, ranging in age from 14-72. Between 80 and 90 percent of our students leave our programs with jobs. This high placement rate is the result of employer involvement in curriculum design, innovative instructional delivery systems, and paying close attention to student needs.

Lane Community College is a major partner in local economic development efforts. The Training and Development Department works closely with the local Private Industry Council and the Eugene/Springfield Metropolitan Partnership to recruit new industry to the area or help local businesses expand. The Department's role is to design and implement training programs meeting the employer's specifications, to ensure a trained, available workforce.

Finally, the Training and Development Department offers contracted training programs, both credit and non-credit, to business, industry, public agencies, and community groups for their employees or members. Training may range from a one-hour workshop to a three-month course taught at the employer site. This training is one effort by the College to meet the education and training needs of the community, to adapt to new market segments and to generate non-reimbursable PTE and revenue for the College.
