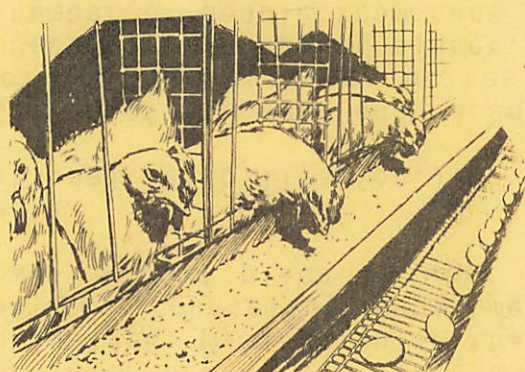

TIP GOES INTERNATIONAL - Two consultants in LCC's Teaching Improvement Process (TIP) program will go to Smithers, British Columbia, next month to present a one-day workshop for school district employees there. Jim Cobb of Social Science and Joyce Fish of Math will represent LCC in the training.

TIP... - Fish reports that a three-day training workshop for community college people from around the state is planned in June. So, TIP may be spreading. What is TIP? It's a confidential, peer consultation process in a basic 10-week format. A TIP consultant works with another faculty member in collecting information about the instructor's teaching methods and possible teaching strategies. Lane is an innovator in this self-guided, confidential process which furthers quality teaching and accountability, says Fish.

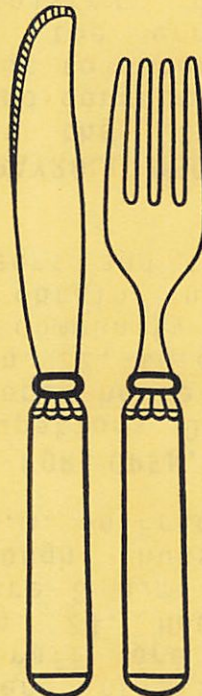

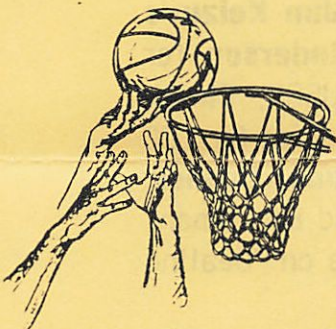

Last Thursday afternoon, LCC President Richard M. Turner, III, outlined administrative changes he plans to discuss with the LCC Board of Education in a Feb. 5 work session. Describing his proposals as "administrative changes," rather than a reorganization, President Turner said the purpose of the changes is to organize college operations to place more emphasis on current community needs. In an interview before Thursday's meeting, he said, "LCC is a dynamic institution that must meet changing needs. Fortunately, we are flexible enough to be responsive."

Whether or not you were able to attend Thursday's meeting, you may appreciate the following description of the president's proposals, which would become effective July 1.

Work now assigned to the three deans who report to Vice President Gerald Rasmussen, Office of Instruction, would be reorganized and a fourth dean added. The new dean would oversee curriculum development and evaluation of all LCC credit programs, including vocational and college transfer classes. Larry Murray, now dean of Community Education, would become dean of Community Education and Economic Development. Jim Piercey, now dean of Applied Technology, would become dean of Off-Campus Centers, responsible for developing the outreach center concept. Jim Ellison, now dean of Liberal Arts and Telecommunications, would become dean of Telecommunications and Instructional Support. The new dean of Arts, Sciences, and Technologies would oversee all credit programs.

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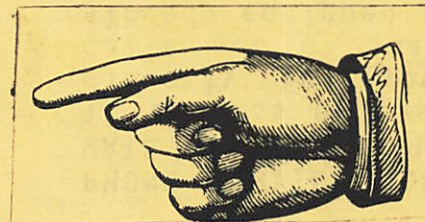
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
