COMMUNITY COLLEGE MONTH This is national Community College Month. Both President Reagan and Governor Atiyeh have signed proclamations recognizing the role community colleges play in education. The number of community colleges in the country has grown from a handful of primarily private two-year colleges at the turn of the century to the 1,221 institutions now listed in the most recent AACJC directory. Close to 55 percent of all postsecondary students in the United States are enrolled in community, technical, and junior colleges -making these colleges the single largest component of all of higher education.

As in all such cases, the factfinder is a labor lawyer appointed by the State Employment Relations Board mediator.

RASMUSSEN TO RETIRE - Gerald Rasmussen, LCC's vice president for Instruction and one of the college's earliest employees, will retire June 30 after 21 years with Lane. Rasmussen was hired in 1965 as a history instructor and Social Science Department head, became associate dean of instruction in 1967, dean of instruction in 1974, and vice president two years ago. "I've looked at my life," says Rasmussen, who will be 60 in July, "and it's time for me to retire."

Rasmussen was among the handful of Board of Education members and staff who in late 1965 toured California community colleges and then came back to create the educational plan which since has guided the development of this college academically and architecturally. Rasmussen's retirement plans include some research and writing in history, an active role in the Danish-American Heritage Society, and some paid parttime instructional projects possibly in foreign countries.

RETENTION TIP - Instructors: When students have problems in your classes, you should request an appointment with them. Don't wait for them to contact you; too often they simply will fade away, thinking they can't catch up with missed classes or assignments when that may not be true. FORMER LCC STAFFER DIES - A graveside service was held last Friday for Roger J. Houglum, a member of LCC's first faculty and a pioneer in local radio. Houglum, 74, died Feb. 4. He is survived by his wife, Ladelle (neé Mobley), daughter and son, and sister and brother. Houglum was on the original staff of the Eugene Vocational School and in 1965 became a member of LCC's first faculty. He remained here until his semiretirement in 1976, and kept office hours until poor health forced his retirement a few months ago.

Houglum established KRVM, the first public FM radio station in the Pacific Northwest, in 1947. He formed public radio station KLCC in 1967, and assisted in the development of public radio station KWAX in 1951. PARNELL TO VISIT THIS WEEK - LCC's founding president, Dale Parnell, is scheduled to visit the college this Thursday. A 10:30 a.m. meet-ing will take place in the LCC Theatre. Parnell will speak on "The National Agenda for Community Colleges" -- connecting high schools and community colleges, promoting the associate degree and creating partnerships with employers. Also planned Thursday is the announcement that the LCC library will house the Dale Parnell Archive.

BOARD MEETING REPORT - Here's a late-breaking report on last Wednesday's LCC Board of Education meeting.

Enrollment: The board learned that the actual number of students attending LCC this year has not changed significantly since last year, but more of these students are attending part time -- which affects a budget built on fulltime-equivalent enrollment.

Budget: The college is planning about \$600,000 in cuts during the remainder of this school year, because of the currently projected shortfall of about \$552,000. The Office of Instruction is slated for about \$300,000 in cuts. Vice President Gerald Rasmussen says there will be no involuntary staff reductions. About \$200,000 of the instructional cuts will come through reducing the number of part-time teachers in light of the projected enrollment decrease spring term. Other budget cuts are planned in Student Services, the President's Complex, Administrative Services and capital outlay.

Presidential Inauguration: There will be no presidential inauguration, as had been suggested and initially considered by LCC board members.

ALTERNATIVE PLAN UNDER DISCUSSION - In a Tuesday afternoon meeting with instructional department heads, President Richard M. Turner III presented an alternative plan for organizing the Office of Instruction. Under this new proposal, he would eliminate the fourth dean position in favor of a new, second staff assistant to the vice president for Instruction.

(In a Jan. 23 all-staff meeting and Feb. 5 work session with LCC board members, the president had proposed the fourth dean to oversee curriculum development and evaluation of all LCC credit programs. The LCC Board of Education, during its regular meeting of Feb. 12, endorsed the president's administrative changes.)

The president cites the following features of the alternative plan (staff assistant, <u>not</u> fourth dean):

1. Department heads report directly to the vice president for Instruction.

 The fourth dean -- dean of Arts, Sciences and Technologies -is eliminated.
Rather than a line administra-

3. Rather than a line administrator, who supervises the department heads and reports to the vice president for Instruction, provision is made to add a lower-paid staff administrator when the specific need is determined by the new vice president

new vice president. 4. Stated concerns of some department heads about the number of administrative levels are addressed and more direct communication is provided.

5. Administrative costs are minimized, resulting in greater institutional efficiency.

After getting reactions from department heads Tuesday, Turner asked them to return to faculty and staff for input that will in turn be forwarded to him before a final decision is made.

PARNELL REVISITED - Bad timing, bad weather and a lack of communication resulted in the poor advance notice of Dale Parnell's talk on campus Thursday morning. We apologize to staff. For those who missed the talk, here are some highlights: PARNELL REVISITED, cont. - Introduced by President Turner as "the community college man of the '80s," Parnell launched into a discussion of the national agenda for community colleges. There are three things we should do, he said:

Reach out to the high schools.
Promote the associate degree.
Develop better partnerships with employers.

Parnell said community colleges must take care of the new three Rs -- recruitment, retention and resource development -- or end up spending efforts on retrenchment.

Parnell discusses this "national agenda" in his 1985 book, "The Neglected Majority." For information on the book, call ext. 2591 or ext. 2303.

On another note: The visit of Parnell -- LCC's founding president and current president of the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges -- provided the opportunity to announce the establishment of the Dale Parnell Collection at LCC. <u>Series of Workshops Planned</u> Survival Skills for Non-"Management" Employees

Even though they may not be a member of the management bargaining group, many classified and faculty employees are responsible for the assignment of work to other employees or students (work-study, CWE, etc.)

In an effort to increase the skills of employees in this category, Staff Development sent a survey earlier this year to approximately 100 staff members, asking about the kinds of problems encountered and the kinds of assistance or training needed.

Response to the survey was very good. We've now categorized the ideas for training into four general areas: changing problem employee behaviors, effective discipline, how to motivate employees, and conflict resolution in the workplace.
