THIS WEEK: BOARD WILL DISCUSS FACULTY CONTRACT, POSSIBLE TUITION INCREASE - The LCC Board of Education will meet this Wednesday night, at 7:30 in the Board Room. Board members will consider the proposed LCC Education Association contract approved by LCC faculty last Thursday, and will discuss a proposed tuition increase.

If approved, tuition for in-state students would go up \$3 - to \$21 per credit hour (or \$231 per term, full-time). For out-of-state and foreign students, tuition would go up \$5 - to \$80 - per credit hour (or to \$880 per term, full-time). Noncredit rates would be established at \$1.10 per clock hour.

Also on the board agenda is discussion of the 1986-87 budget. The board meeting is open to the public.

LEAGUE FOR INNOVATION INNOVATOR OF THE YEAR AWARD

The League for Innovation in the Community College has created an award that is designed to recognize League College staff members who have designed and implemented a significant innovation during this past year. The recognition is known as the Innovator of the Year Award and is given annually to one individual from each of the 19 League member college districts. Any current Lane Community College employee, part-time or full-time, may be considered for the award.

The recipient of the Innovator of the Year Award will receive a plaque from the League for Innovation to be presented at an appropriate LCC function. The award winner will also be featured in the League publication, Innovator.

Last year's award went to Bill Mullin, of Social Science, who helped develop a computer-managed instruction/testing system. In 1984, Velma Jesser of Business won for developing a new Integrated Office Systems vocational program for the College. In 1983, Spanish instructor Arden Woods for developing a program that assists teachers in correcting subjective writing.

The deadline for nominations is April 4.

CALL FOR NOMINATIONS

WHO MAY NOMINATE?

Nominations may come from anyone either inside or outside the College.

WHAT ARE THE SELECTION CRITERIA?

The award will be given to an individual who has designed and implemented a significant innovation at LCC. The League has established the following criteria for making the selection from among nominees. PLEASE NOTE THAT ONE OR MORE OF THE CRITERIA SHOULD BE MET, BUT IT IS NOT NECESSARY THAT ANY NOMINEE SHOULD MEET ALL CRITERIA.

1. Quality - Students and/or staff agree that the innovation increases quality in the course program, office, or institution. Evidence of quality may include student ratings or letters of support from colleagues.

- Efficiency There is evidence that the innovation or outstanding program contributes to a more efficient way of doing things. Student ratings, perceptions of outside consultants, and pre- and post-comparison of time involved are examples of evidence.
- 3. Cost effectiveness There is evidence that the innovation adds a value to the institution while at the same time containing or reducing costs. Cost data will serve as evidence.
- 4. Replication The program selected can be used by other institutions with a minimum of difficulty. The description of the program should include any conditions necessary for replication.
- 5. <u>Creativity</u> The selected program should be as original as possible or the adaptation should at least be creative. The description of the program or letters from experts are examples of evidence.
- 6. Timeliness The award-winning program should not be more than five years old at that institution, but it must have been around long enough to have been tested so that it meets most of the criteria.

HOW WILL THE WINNER BE SELECTED?

LCC's Innovator of the Year Award Selection Committee will review the nomination and supporting materials and select one award winner by April 30. The committee will invite and encourage high-quality nominations, and in the event no nominations are deemed to be of a caliber worthy of nationwide recognition, no award will be made.

The selection committee consists of three LCC employees representing management, faculty and classified personnel, and two members from the community. Larry Warford, League representative, chairs the committee.

HOW ARE NOMINATIONS MADE?

Nominations should consist of the name and department of the innovator and a one-page description of the project, process, item, or activity supported by relevant materials. If materials are visual, or in some other form, it may be necessary for the nominee to make arrangements for the Award Selection Committee to have access for viewing purposes.

BOARD HIKES TUITION, OKAYS FACULTY CONTRACT - The LCC Board of Education Wednesday night voted 5-2 to raise student tuition beginning this summer. The two dissenting votes belonged to Larry Perry and Bob Bowser. For in-state students, credit tuition will go to \$21 per credit hour (from \$19), or \$231 for full-time students (up from \$209 this year). For out-ofstate and foreign students, tuition will go to \$80 per credit hour, or \$880 per term. Rates for noncredit, adult education courses also will increase. They will be set at \$1.10 per clock hour, which translates to \$33 for a 30-hour class - a class which costs \$30 this year.

The board also approved a new, two-year LCC Education Association contract, ratified last week by faculty. The new contract is retroactive to July 1, 1985, and continues through June 30, 1987.

Under its terms, LCC faculty who work less than half time will receive a 6 percent salary increase for the 1985-86 year. In the 1986-87 year, these part-time faculty will receive a 5 percent salary increase, as well as steps on the salary schedule. Faculty working half time and more will receive a salary increase of 2-3/4 percent, as well as an acrossthe-board sum of \$785, for the 1985-86 year. During the 1986-87 year, these half-time and more faculty will receive a salary increase of about 3.8 percent, plus steps on the salary schedule - if they are eligible. The new contract also includes changes in such areas as early retirement and professional development. One issue remains open - faculty workload. Negotiators for both the college and faculty will be meeting in an attempt to settle this issue. The LCCEA retains the right to strike over the issue if a satisfactory agreement is not worked out by Dec. 31, 1986. (Contract information provided by Hank Douda, Employee Relations director.)

The board also accepted a resignation by Deborah Holmes, coordinator of the Central Area Center in Cottage Grove, who will be leaving LCC at the end of May.
