

WELLNESS SPACE - As part of a fad diet, fasting usually is ineffectual. Total fasting as a medical treatment for severe obesity first was introduced about 30 years ago. A drastic method that is risky and usually uncomfortable, fasting indeed results in a rapid, initial weight loss, but most of the loss is fluid and minerals rather than fat. As the fast continues, the person loses body fat, but also considerable lean body mass (especially muscle) and more minerals. Because of the dangers of a prolonged fast, this technique rarely is recommended any longer, even for the morbidly obese. Few people who actually lose weight by this means maintain their loss, and some may sustain permanent injury. For a person in good health, there is no danger in a self-imposed 24-hour fast. But, despite some claims made for fasting, it won't "cleanse the body" or result in permanent weight loss. --Wellness Task Force

WELLNESS SPACE

A low resting heart rate is a sign of good cardiovascular condition. To measure your resting heart rate, hold a finger over the carotid artery in the neck or the radial artery near the wrist. A true resting heart rate is counted immediately upon waking in the morning. In contrast, an exercise heart rate is taken during vigorous exertion. You should compute your optimum target heart rate as 70% of 220 minus your age. The best measure of fitness in most healthy people is the length of time it takes the heart rate to return to its normal resting level after strenuous exercise has raised it to its optimum exercise rate for a few minutes. The sooner it recovers - usually one to three minutes - the fitter you are. The more you exercise, the faster your heart rate will return to normal. An improved recovery time may not necessarily mean that you are healthier, but it does show that your heart is stronger.

BUDGET WRAP-UP LIKELY - LCC's Budget Committee meets Thursday evening at 8 to continue study of the proposed spending plan for next year. Open to the public, the session will be held in the Board Room, Administration 216. (The Budget Committee includes seven elected Board of Education members and seven appointees.)

The Budget Committee began its deliberations last Wednesday and indicated it probably will approve the college administration's proposed 29.6-million operating budget. The total is up 2.6 percent over this year and falls within projected revenues, making unnecessary a funding election for the fiscal year which begins this July 1.

Members said that holding LCC to very lean spending for another year would be a show of good faith toward a college district with its own economic problems. There was discussion, however, that indicated LCC might seek voter approval later for continuing a debt service levy which expires in fiscal year 1987-88. The "mortgage" on the main campus will be paid off, reducing the property tax levy by 10 cents per \$1,000 of true cash value. Voters could be asked to continue paying the 10 cents to give LCC about \$700,000 more each year for such things as maintenance and teaching equipment needs.

Chairing the Budget Committee for the third consecutive year is Dean Van Leuven of Veneta. Bill Manley of Eugene is vice chairman. Gary Parrish of Springfield was reelected secretary.

Those who'd like to examine the budget document will find copies at the library, at Carol Beckley's office in Administration 202 (Administrative Services), and at Dean Larry Murray's office at the Downtown Center.

LCC INSTRUCTOR NOMINATED TO SPEAK - Velma Jesser of the Business Department has been nominated to speak on "Writing Quality Procedures that Ensure Success" at the League for Innovation national conference, October 5 through 8, 1986, in Miami, Florida.

HOW MIGHT GRAMM-RUDMAN AFFECT LCC? - Nobody knows for sure how the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings (Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985--P.L. 99-177) will affect LCC. It calls for cutting the federal budget deficit from around \$200 billion to zero by 1991. According to information collected by Larry Warford of the President's Office, it appears several programs at LCC could be hurt. Vocational education funds could be trimmed by \$80,000 over four years (from the current \$500,000). Student finan-cial aid could be cut to the extent of withdrawing funds from 150 to 900 students. Small Business Administration funds for the Business Assistance Center might not be affected at all. It is thought that cuts in financial aid might cause some students now at four-year schools to switch to community colleges.

MORE CLASSES OFFERED - Noncredit classes for spring term are up 40, a 15 percent increase over the usual spring list.

BUDGET APPROVED LCC's Budget Committee approved the Administration's recommended budget for Fiscal Year 1986-87 at a meeting Thursday night. The \$29.6 million operating budget is up 2.6 percent over this year. The total is within projected revenues. In what was basically a housekeeping meeting, the Board approved an updating of Mass Communication courses and approved spending \$18,753 for equipment to teach Work Activity Center clients packaging techniques. The money was earned by WAC students in work projects. Lon Mills of Mills & Associates was hired to help negotiate a new labor contract with the LCCEF for \$6,000. Reroofing of main campus buildings was discussed, but no action was taken.







INNOVATOR OF THE YEAR Coordinator of Testing Daniel Hodges has been named LCC's League for Innovation "Innovator of the Year." Hodges, who learned of the award Thursday morning, is being honored for developing six innovations: the study tips collection, learning tapes and outlines, textbook readability program, computerized test scoring and analysis, course comparison program, and "an open letter to students." Hodges joined the LCC faculty in 1970. He was selected for the innovation award by a committee which included Cheri Courtnage, Lane County Employment & Training; Larry Douglas, Eugene Chamber of Commerce; Charlene Blinn, Counseling Dept; Charles Reich, Business Assistance Center; and Bill Mullin, Social Science, who was Innovator of the Year for 1985. The award is given annually to one individual from each of the 18 League member college districts. It is designed to recognize a staff member who has designed and implemented a significant innovation during the past year. Other nominees were Greg Harpole and Eddie Jellesed, Business Department; Dwight Miller, Math; LCC Employee Wellness Task Force; and Jim Bacon, English & Foreign Language.
