MISUNDERSTANDING ABOUT CLASS SIZE

There continues to be some misunderstanding regarding the basis for reducing the number of course sections that may be offered during any term. Hence, the following explanation which, I hope, will either clarify this matter for you, or serve as the foundation for your further questions which I will be happy to address for you.

A course with a desired section size of 35 is not expected to maintain an average section size of 35. As one may guess, that may be difficult, requiring some sections to enroll more than the desired number of students. Only when average enrollment approaches the approved departmentally recommended minimal size for course sections, should some attention be given to the potential need to reduce the number of students. Only when average enrollment approaches the approved departmentally recommended minimal size for course sections, should some attention be given to the potential need to reduce the number of sections offered in order to raise the average enrollment per section.

A course with the desired class size of 35 and a five-year history of fall term average class (section) sizes of 25, 30, 33, 27, and 31 is not a course in trouble; there would be no need to reduce the number of sections, based solely upon the average class size factor. Another course, with the desired class size of 35 and a five-year history of fall term average class (section) sizes of 11, 16, 13, 17, and 7, however, would be subject to reduction in the number of sections offered.

Other factors also must be taken into account before reducing the number of sections of a course or eliminating the course entirely. Some of these include, 1) the enrollment below which a course section ceases to be cost effective, 2) the requirement of the course for currently enrolled curriculum majors, 3) the frequency with which the course is offered, 4) the accessibility of the course for students needing it.

Desired section size varies from course to course, depending on such factors as teaching delivery method, expected interaction between instructor and students, or the number of student stations available. A combination of these factors could result in satisfactory section sizes of 35, or 20, or 150; there is no absolute optimal class size. -- Richard M. Turner, III, President

MISUNDERSTANDING ABOUT CLASS SIZE

There continues to be some misunderstanding regarding the basis for reducing the number of course sections that may be offered during any term. Hence, the following explanation which, I hope, will either clarify this matter for you, or serve as the foundation for your further questions which I will be happy to address for you.

A course with a desired section size of 35 is not expected to maintain an average section size of 35. As one may guess, that may be difficult, requiring some sections to enroll more than the desired number of students. Only when average enrollment approaches the approved departmentally recommended minimal size for course sections, should some attention be given to the potential need to reduce the number of sections offered in order to raise the average enrollment per section.

A course with the desired class size of 35 and a five-year history of fall term average class (section) sizes of 25, 30, 33, 27, and 31 is not a course in trouble; there would be no need to reduce the number of sections, based solely upon the average class size factor. Another course, with the desired class size of 35 and a five-year history of fall term average class (section) sizes of 11, 16, 13, 17, and 7, however, would be subject to reduction in the number of sections offered.

Other factors also must be taken into account before reducing the number of sections of a course or eliminating the course entirely. Some of these include 1) the enrollment below which a course section ceases to be cost effective, 2) the requirement of the course for currently enrolled curriculum majors, 3) the frequency with which the course is offered, 4) the accessibility of the course for students needing it.

Desired section size varies from course to course, depending on such factors as teaching delivery method, expected interaction between instructor and students, or the number of student stations available. A combination of these factors could result in satisfactory section sizes of 35, or 20, or 150; there is no absolute optimal class size. --
