PURCHASING DEPARTMENT REMINDER Planning any major purchases or projects (with a total cost over \$10,000 for materials, services or equipment) that need to take place this summer? The last day to get bids out in time to take the results to the July Board meeting for approval is Friday, June 6. It would be best to have the specifications to Purchasing at least a week to ten days prior to that date.

TAKE FLIGHT You can now get your initial certification for a private license to fly helicopters through the Flight Aviation Department. Requirements for a private flying license is 30 hours of instruction. You may begin instruction with a summer session offered June 23 through August 15. The Flight Tech program also offers certification for a rating or transition certificate. This is for people with flying skills who want to transfer those skills to flying a helicopter. A commercial license is available after 50 hours of instruction. Careers in helicopter aviation are available in such areas as logging, hospital recovery, air carriers, and bush-pilot flying. Registration is June 10. For more information about the program, call the Flight Tech Department at 689-2021.

EXPENDITURES AND COST PER FTE REPORT

Highlights

1. Lane Community College's cost per FTE in 1984-85 was \$3135. This is \$215 lower than the average cost per FTE for all Oregon community college and \$277 lower than the average cost per FTE for lower division programs at Oregon's public universities. The comparative cost per FTE amounts are:
 - * Public Universities: Lower Division \$3412 per FTE
 - * Community Colleges (average) \$3350 per FTE
 - * Lane Community College \$3135 per FTE
2. The College continues to experience a decline in student FTE. In 1984-85, student FTE was approximately 465 FTE lower than in 1983-84. This 5.4% FTE decline significantly impacts the College's cost per FTE.
3. The College's total expenditures rose by \$1,665,685 (6.9%) in 1984-85.
4. Increases in expenditures for salaries and other payroll expenses totalled \$48,787 (0.2% increase). The average faculty salary and benefit increase in 1984-85 was 6.1%. This modest increase in personnel expenditures indicates that the College is successfully realigning its staffing patterns to match student FTE declines.
5. In 1983-84, 86.1% of the College expenditures were personnel-related. However, by 1984-85, personnel expenditures decreased to 80.9% of the College's total expenditures.

6. In 1984-85, \$787,558 was spent on capital outlay acquisitions. Major expenditures included improvements in the motor pool, a mail truck, Media Productions equipment and microcomputers.
7. In 1984-85, the College continued its efforts to complete deferred plant and equipment maintenance. A total of \$305,822 was spent on equipment repair and replacement (\$41,019), remodeling and renovation projects (\$28,180), and deferred maintenance (\$236,623).
8. Significant increases occurred in other expenditures which support College-wide operations. The most notable increases were in:
 - * early retirement program costs (67.1% increase)
 - * insurance costs (33.7% increase)
 - * telephone support costs (15.8% increase)
 - * KLCC support costs (12.3% increase)
 - * tuition waiver costs (11.5% increase)
9. Decreases in expenditures occurred in two major areas of College-wide operations:
 - * professional development leave costs (62.5% decrease)
 - * bad debts costs (36.7% decrease)

BUDGET ADOPTED LCC's Board of Education adopted the College's fiscal year 1986-87 budget formally last Wednesday night. No one spoke for or against the proposal in a minute-or-two hearing. The general fund for next year totals \$29,635,100. Property taxes to help fund it total \$12,620,604. An additional \$660,433 in property taxes will go toward bond retirement. The latter means that the campus "mortgage" will be paid off next year.

OTHER BUSINESS The Board passed resolutions thanking and commending Vice President Gerald Rasmussen for his 21 years of service as a staff member and Robert C. Bowser for his four years on the Board. Both end formal connections with the College on June 30....Plant funds totaling \$1,500 were approved for remodeling the Testing Office in Center 220....Student Health Services was cited as a national model for serving almost 85 students per day on an annual budget of \$151,000....Mercer-Meidinger, Inc., of Portland was hired as agent/broker of record for next fiscal year's employee benefits insurance and property and casualty insurance.

PERSONNEL The LCC Board of Education has approved these personnel appointments: Richard Crawford to counselor-instructor in Counseling; Arlene Kinley to payroll assistant in Personnel Services; Marie A. Nelson to benefits assistant in Personnel Services; Marie Wiles to associate department head in Health Occupations; Richard Reid to acting department head for one year in Performing Arts; and accepted the retirement of faculty member Frances Clark, Home Economics, effective July 1, 1986.

SLIDE PRESENTATION "My impressions about the political system and the people and how they're surviving" will be Dave Wienecke's topic at a slide presentation on his recent trip to the People's Republic of China. 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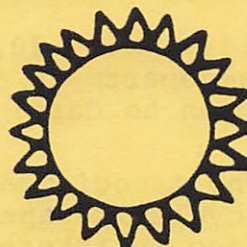

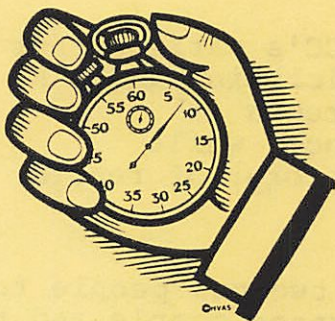
