Second Week of Summer Term

THAT YOU MAY KNOW FIRST President Turner has directed The Daily to let staff know today, before the mass media learn about it, that he will ask the Board of Education next Wednesday to approve the appointment of Dr. Jacquelyn M. Belcher from Bellevue (Wash.) Community College as Vice President for Instruction. The new VP is to report on Monday, August 18.

"Dr. Belcher was the unanimous choice of the Selection Committee," said President Turner. "Input from persons across the College community who met all candidates was overwhelmingly in favor of her."

Reached Wednesday while vacationing in Missouri, Dr. Belcher was equally upbeat about the College. "Lane Community College," she said, "is one of the premier institutions of its kind in the country. I'm pleased to have been selected to serve as the Vice President for Instruction at this time in its development. These are challenging times that will test the mettle of each member of the College community, and I'm looking forward to working with each of them."

Dr. Belcher, who said she likes to be called Jacquee (pronounced Jackie) in informal circumstances, has worked at Bellevue for 15 years, the last nine as Associate Dean of Instruction and earlier as Division Chair of Health Sciences and Instructor of Nursing. She returns to Eugene to oversee, in part, a nursing program for which--when it was a part of Sacred Heart Hospital--she was Director of Education from 1966-69.

Her formal training is in nursing and law. She received a B.S. in Nursing at Marymount College, Salina, Kans., in 1966 and a Master of Nursing degree from the University of Washington in 1971. University of Puget Sound awarded her the Doctor of Jurisprudence degree in 1983.

She has served a host of organizations as a board member, including Seattle-King County Chapter of the American Red Cross; Antioch University; Washington State Board of Dental Examiners; Catalyst III Corporation; Women's Network of Professional, Managerial and Business Women; and Pacific Family Law Institute. She is treasurer of the American Association of Women in Community and Junior Colleges, a Council of AACJC.

LCC Board of Education Member Charlene Curry, who attended all of last week's coffees for the finalists, said of the new VP: "I was very impressed with the quality of the candidates and the variety of rich backgrounds the candidates possessed. I was particularly impressed by Dr. Belcher and feel that the qualities and talents she brings to the job are tremendously exciting for the College and for the faculty."

Mabel Armstrong, Science Department Head who chaired the 14-member staff Screening Committee which chose the finalists, said: "Dr. Belcher combines the administrative skills and a vision of the future which will be needed to lead LCC into the 1990s."

Six finalists visited the campus from Oregon, Washington, Minnesota, Michigan and West Virginia. The group included LCC's own Dr. Judy Dresser, Home Economics Department Head.

DEANS IN CHARGE Until the new Vice President for Instruction arrives on August 18, the three instructional deans will administer the Office of Instruction. Deans Jim Ellison, Larry Murray and Jim Piercey will act both in their new assignments which began July 1 and their old assignments which theoretically ended June 30, as well as share the role of acting vice president. Murray is acting VP in early July, Piercey in middle July and Ellison in late July.

BERRY APPOINTED President Turner has announced that Vice President Bill Berry will be acting President while Dr. Turner vacations during the last week of July and the first two weeks of August. BOARD MEETING Personnel items top the agenda for the Wednesday night, July 9 meeting of the LCC Board of Education. It's at 7:30 in ADM 216. Board members will consider extension of the President's contract and the hiring of persons recommended by the President for the positions of Vice President for Instruction and director of the outreach center at Cottage Grove. Housekeeping matters include requests for approval of use of plant funds for landscaping, exterior signing, and campus lighting.

CONTRACT EXTENDED--President Turner's contract was extended to June 30, 1988, and he was given a 4% pay increase for this year by the LCC Board of Education at its July 9 meeting. LCCEA Chairman George Alvergue objected to the Board's action, suggesting communications and morale concerns. In a formal statement, President Turner shared his priorities for the new fiscal year. They include "working closely with faculty, staff and students to build an even more warm, friendly and cooperative educational and working environment;" plans to get acquainted personally with more staff through visits to staff workplaces and small group and individual meetings, bag lunches in his office, coffee hours in departments; continued emphasis on professional development; and fine-tuning administrative changes in procedures and personnel assignments made in the past year. He called 1985-86 "a great learning experience" and characterized it as "the beginning of the westernizing of Richard.... Old presidents can be taught new tricks," he said. He pledged that he "will be responsive in those areas in which there was concern" in the Board evaluation of his first year as president.

In other personnel matters, the Board hired Jacquelyn Belcher, associate dean at Bellevue Community College as vice president for instruction; Donald Strahan of Southwestern Oregon Community College as Central Area Coordinator at Cottage Grove; Brent Weaver, University of Oregon teaching fellow, as temporary music instructor; and Richard J. Harris of Tacoma Actors Guild as scenic designer/technical director of Performing Arts.

IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS--The Board approved spending \$32,200 in plant funds to improve campus signing, improve traffic and heating/cooling in the Campus Services Building, lighten up dark areas of the main campus, and carry out 11 irrigation and landscaping projects on the main campus.

BID AWARDS--Board members used a vocational education grant to buy the Business Department 12 personal computers for \$20,472. Computer paper supplies were purchased for \$12,442, and a \$11,493 copy machine was bought for the Downtown Center.

ALSO ON THE AGENDA--The Board adopted the College-Wide Plan for 1986-87 through 1990-91. There was consensus that the Board should hold meetings in outlying areas when possible, but no definite date was established. An August Board meeting will be held only if there is a definite need. Board members learned why main campus athletic fields aren't used from June through October. Excess sewage lagoon water is dumped on the fields in the summer because dumping it into the river is a "no-no" except in winter. AND FINALLY--Mary Unruh of Eugene was elected chairman of the Board and Barbara Doster of Mapleton, vice chairman. Member Charlene Curry of Springfield commented, "We have never had a mother-to-be as chairman." To which Ms. Unruh responded, "I carry more weight that way."

# PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT LANE COMMUNITY COLLEGE BOARD OF EDUCATION RICHARD M. TURNER, III JULY 9, 1986

I want to say what a pleasure it has been for me to serve this Board as President during 1985-86. It has been an enriching experience for me, for each of you has contributed so much to the College with your diverse and complementary backgrounds. I am grateful to you -- Bill Manley, Charlene Curry, Bob Bowser (whose term on the Board has just ended), Jim Pitney, Mary Unruh, Larry Perry, and Barbara Doster -- for your commitment of long hours, serious thought, time in travel, and deep concern for the faculty, staff and students of Lane Community College, and for me personally. Whenever you have been called on for advice and guidance, attendance at a College function, and support of various proposals, you have responded positively. (I expect to be able to say the same about Martin Lewis as I work with him this year.)

Of our Board, I have worked most closely this year with Jim Pitney. Jim has been a wonderful chairman. I suppose Jim was destined to chair the Board during this very significant year in its history. What else but destiny would have given him such a year as this to serve?! His broad knowledge and experience have enabled him to endure and thrive in a year that might have proven unbearable for other chairmen (of other boards, of course). His preparation for Board meetings has been meticulous. The time he and I have spent together discussing agenda and other matters has been most beneficial to me and has facilitated the smooth-running -- if sometimes long-winded -- Board meetings. I remember Jim's saying, after a meeting that ended after 11:00 p.m., "Gee, we had a great discussion!" What Jim really meant, however, was that everyone had a chance to have her or his say and to make a contribution -- and I know that that is very important to this Board.

I congratulate Mary Unruh on her election as Board Chair for 1986-87 and I look forward to working with her, in the manner that she prefers, as I did with Jim. Having served with Mary on the OCCA Board, I expect that she too will be an outstanding LCC Board leader. I also commend Martin Lewis for his success in winning a seat on the Board. My faith in Martin's anticipated success as a Board Member is based upon my confidence in the faculty and staff of LCC and the preparation he has received through them, as well as Martin's own abilities, achievements and potentialities.

I should like to express my sincere appreciation to the Board of Education for cooperating in the formal evaluation process that was designed and implemented at the end of the year. Charlene's co-authoring of the ACCT document on presidential evaluation provided added incentive for us to take a giant step in the objectifying of this process for improving presidential performance and the entire College as well.

The past year has been a challenging one for the Board, faculty, staff, students, and for me. We can cite a number of accomplishments during 1985-86 of which we are pleased. There remain, however, some challenges which the Board and I are committed to face squarely during the twenty-second year of the College. These, I prefer to regard as opportunities for me to provide strong leadership in finding resolution.

Key among my priorities for 1986-87 will be in working closely with faculty, staff and students to build an even more warm, friendly and cooperative educational and working environment. During a very busy first year, I have not gotten acquainted personally with many of our faculty and staff. I plan to extend my visits to the workplaces of our staff and to have more small group and individual meetings. One thing that I expect to do is have some bag lunches in my office, and other informal occasions, to talk about whatever may be of interest to persons attending and to get to know them better. Coffee hours in various departments will serve several purposes: 1) expose areas of the College that may not have been visited frequently by some staff; 2) get better acquainted with some of the creative and innovative things that are taking place in those departments; 3) create a closer bond between persons of various departments and an even greater appreciation for what we are as a total institution.

Improved communications between departments will generate an entirely new spirit of being a part of something bigger than the group we associate with most frequently. Faculty and staff will be encouraged to reach out to the total College community to find solutions to problems too frequently deal with in isolation. Faculty and staff will be motivated to support, in increasing numbers, activities of colleagues in other departments.

I believe that the organizational structure is an important vehicle for communication. If it does not provide at least two-way communcation, it should be examined closely and modified, or tossed out. The changes we made during 1986-87 are not foolproof. They require real cooperation and coordination to become and remain effective. I intend to provide leadership in testing, fully implementing and evaluating the new system. And, most importantly, I plan to support fully persons who are affected by the changes. There may be an adjustment period required for all of us to become accustomed to working in modified relationships; that is to be expected. We will work together in "debugging" the system.

I will be leading our top management team in the use of computers for improvement of communication and administrative effectiveness. Results will not be immediate; however, they should have long-range benefit in making the administration more responsive in handling the increasingly complex matters that we are involved with on a daily basis. Our plans are to acquire the needed hardware, software and training as funds are available.

We will be working together to develop new methods and techniques for utilizing the superb LCC faculty and staff and maintaining the excellent quality of education and administration that has been a hallmark of this institution. We will be working with faculty and staff, at the department level, to find mutually satisfying professional development opportunities, to keep up with the rapid growth of knowledge and its application to the educational process. Faculty and staff will be urged to take an active and assertive part in their own professional development. I will want to have them involved in discussion and implementation of this effort.

I shall be promoting informed participation in decision-making at all levels. Greater effort will be given to involving persons in matters in which they most intimately are affected.

These are but a few ways in which I expect LCC's twenty-second year to be a much better one than the twenty-first. For me, 1985-86 has been a great learning experience. One may say it has been the beginning of the westernizing of Richard. Lots more work is needed, I am convinced, but I tend to believe that old presidents can be taught new tricks. I also believe that I can benefit from experience. And I expect to do what I must in order to provide good leadership for Lane Community College. I know that I can count on the Board and I call upon faculty, staff and students to join with me in strengthening the humanization of our educational environment.

I should like to thank faculty and staff for participating in the evaluation process this year. I have reviewed the summary data carefully and will be responsive in those areas in which there was concern. I value the time you took to complete the survey questionnaires. Dan Hodges deserves commendation for the efficient manner in which he scored the answer sheets and provided meaningful statistical and narrative summaries for the Board and me. He also made himself available for questions that we had regarding the interpretation of the data. I thank him personally.

As we begin a new fiscal year, it is important that I express my appreciation to the Vice Presidents -- Bill Berry, Jack Carter and Gerry Rasmussen (now retired) -- and their staffs who have supported me so strongly in preparation for and during Board meetings. Special tribute is paid to Larry Warford, Marie Reid and Laura Tamura who have spent late evenings and weekends beyond normal working hours to ensure that the work of the Board has been facilitated. I also must include Lee Sowers, who was a most needed and helpful addition to our office staff during 1985-86; Sue Colvin was very kind in sharing Lee's time with us. College Counsel -- the firm of Ed Harms, Tim Harold, Joe Leahy & Sam Pace -- has provided excellent service for which I am grateful. I thank the news media -- college- and community-based -- for their good coverage of our activities. Lastly, but very importantly, I thank faculty, staff and members of the community who continue to demonstrate interest in the College by attendance at meetings of the Board. I encourage your being here.

I thank you for your indulgence, Madam Chair.
