LCC AMONG TOP 20 -- Three authors searching for leadership models in higher education picked LCC as among 20 institutions showing the way. J. Wade Gilley, Kenneth A. Fulmer and Sally J. Reithlingshoefer authored <u>Searching</u> For Academic Excellence: Twenty Colleges and Universities On The Move and Their Leaders. It was published by MacMillan in July. As attributes of the on-the-move college, they cited such things as local control, leaders with vision, supportive boards, teamwork, listening to the community, the idea that individuals make a difference, commitment of staff to the institution, concern for faculty and students, an attitude of being opportunity-conscious, and intense commitment to quality and excellence. They described LCC as a college "that seems to thrive on innovation." LCC Library has ordered a copy of the book and will announce its availability through The Daily on its arrival.

GETTING RESULTS -- Oregon Small Business Development Center Network is seeing dramatic results from its efforts. The Network, headquartered at LCC, surveyed 200 small businesses to measure improvements in 1985 over 1984. Businesses that received intensive help from the state's 18 Centers (15 are at community colleges) realized average increases of 34% in sales, 50% in net profits, 36% in payroll, 29% in part-time staff, and 39% in full-time staff.

MEETING VIA TELEPHONE -- LCC's Board of Education meets at ll a.m. today via telephone to handle several items which can't wait until its September 10 session. The Board often takes August off, as far as meeting is concerned. The agenda includes two roofing projects, leasing of mobile classrooms, and a proposed hiring. Health Technology and Science Buildings will get new asphalt roofs yet this summer if a low-enough bid is received. Two portable classroom units would be leased for a year to house the Dislocated Worker Program under a proposal from the Training and Development Department. They would be sited next to the Apprenticeship Annex at the south end of the main campus. Due to be in place by October 1, each building would be 24x36-feet and would include a classroom and two offices. Low bid for the job is \$18,600 by Bartzat Leasing of Eugene. A federal DWP grant will pay for the lease. The personnel matter concerns hiring a department head for Adult Basic Education/High School Completion.

SOFTWARE GIFT RECEIVED -- The Electronics Department has received \$30,000 worth of software from CADKEY (Micro Control Systems, Inc.) of Connecticut. The CADKEY 2-D and 3-D computer-aided drafting (CAD) software will support the present CAD training program in Drafting/Architecture. It will be utilized in a new course, Advanced CAD, as a co-offering with present autocad software. The grant was coordinated through CADKEY's Vice President Pete H. Smith by Electronics Department head Bob Vogel.

EARTH DAY AT LCC -- Staff volunteers willing to help in a campus clean-up of leaves and litter are invited to come to the main campus on Saturday, September 6. Organized by Showplace: LCC, the event will include instruction for those who would like to learn how to prune shrubs. LCC Grounds staff will be available both for instruction and to help get the clean-up organized. The event begins at 10 a.m. and ends when workers are ready to leave. MOST JOBS DON'T REQUIRE BACCALAUREATE -- Among the 37 fastest growing occupations, only six will require a bachelor's degree for entry. <u>AACJC Letter</u> quotes the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) as projecting more jobs than skilled people to handle them between now and 1995. BLS says paralegal jobs will grow 98 percent; data processing equipment repairers, 56 percent; electrical/electronics technicians, 50 percent; computer operators (not peripheral), 46 percent; peripheral electronic data processing equipment operators, 45 percent; travel agents, 44 percent; physician assistants, 40 percent; mechanical engineering technicians, 37 percent; registered nurses, 33 percent; medical records technicians, 31 percent; office machine/cash register servicers, 30 percent; artists and commercial artists, 29 percent; cosmetologists, 29 percent; dental hygienists, 29 percent; photographers and camera operators, 29 percent. Job opportunities will grow, says BLS. Today's 106.8 million jobs will increase by 1995 to 122 million. A skills shortage is predicted, rather than a worker shortage.

AT LCC LIBRARY -- The book, <u>Searching for Academic Excellence: Twenty Coll-</u> eges and Universities on the Move And Their Leaders, is now available at LCC Library. Published last month by Macmillan, it describes LCC as one of the "on-the-move" colleges in leadership initiative and academic excellence. EFFORT UNDERWAY -- With less than three months until November 4, various groups supporting and opposing ballot measures are gearing up for the campaign. <u>News Digest</u> from Oregon Community College Association says the Oregon Education Association has hired Mark Nelson to run a yes on 7, no on 9 effort. Nelson orchestrated the past six "no on 1½-percent" campaigns, defeating each of the property tax limitation attempts. Ballot Measure 7 is the OEA-sponsored school finance proposal to be funded by a 5-percent sales tax. Measure 9 is the latest version of the 1½-percent property tax limitation sponsored by the Oregon Taxpayers Union. Interestingly, only one voter pamphlet statement was filed on behalf of Measure 9, and that came from the Libertarian Party, reports <u>News Digest</u>.

LCC PEOPLE PART OF STUDY -- A Ford Foundation study of how changes in the economy are affecting the quality of life will include comments from two participants in LCC's Dislocated Worker Program. Tamara Pinkas of the DWP staff told The Daily that Alex Poinsett flew to Eugene from Chicago based on reports about the quality of the program. She quotes Poinsett as commenting that "people spoke so highly of the program that I wanted to include their (students') comments in my report." He is focusing on the Pacific Northwest wood products industry. DWP serves people who have been laid off from jobs and are or have been receiving unemployment insurance benefits. In other business, the Board leased two portable classrooms from Bartzat Leasing of Eugene for use for a year by the Dislocated Worker Program. The buildings are to be in place near the Apprenticeship Annex at the south end of the main campus by October 1. The \$18,600 cost will be met by a federal DLW grant. The Board hired David B. Oatman, Jr. of Waubonsee Community College, Ill., as head of the Adult Basic Education/High School Completion Department. President Turner advised the Board that the gravel front of the Siuslaw Area Center at 3149 Oak St., Florence, is being paved at a cost of \$9,600 from College maintenance funds. Since the city is paving Oak Street, the College was able to arrange for the contractor to include Siuslaw in the job.
