

Gabriel continues as coordinator of the College High Program and Lane County Vocational Education Consortium; Alice Kaseberg of Eugene will teach mathematics; Mac Allison comes from Eugene private business to teach electronics; Stan Addison of Cottage Grove moves from mechanics tutor to the faculty; Carolyn Blanchard moves from the temporary to the permanent dental faculty; Darlene Thomasec moves from temporary to permanent nursing faculty; Candace Mead moved from substitute to permanent nursing faculty; Julianne Nutting of Portland becomes a child development instructor; Donald Savoie moves from temporary to permanent teacher of culinary, food service and hospitality; Dr. Thomas J. Hickey from Vermont joins the criminal justice faculty; Stephen D. Johnston moves from temporary to permanent instructor of study skills; Marjorie Vignoul comes from District 4J to teach study skills; and Debra Carroll moves from the BAC to become Adult Education office manager. Stanley Elbertson retires from the Performing Arts faculty as of Dec. 31.

COMMENDATION -- Hearing that 90 percent of the objectives in last year's College Plan were attained, the Board of Education unanimously accepted a report of 1985-86 activities "with commendation" for the College staff. Board member Bill Manley of Eugene pointed out that most of the achievements were on top of staff members' regular workloads. It was a night for kudos as Manley also offered a commendation for Showplace:LCC and those who manage and work in it.

OTHER BUSINESS -- The Board accepted a \$293,104 FIPSE grant for Apprenticehip; approved a \$1,100 remodeling of the electronic editing lab; approved \$10,632 for videotapes; approved buying \$18,930 worth of gym clothing; okayed a \$5 student body fee for high school completion students; and approved a Management Employees Working Agreement for 1986-87 which calls for a 2.6 percent increase in salary.

EDUCATION, NOT BOOZE -- It'll be "drink to me only with thine eyes" in a proposed new Alcohol Server program at LCC. There won't be any alcohol because the 8-hour course will focus on information about alcohol and its effects on the body, laws relating to sales and service, identification of problem drinkers, etc. Mandated by the Legislature for the state's 200,000 alcohol servers, the program is expected to be offered sometime this academic year. LCC will join a statewide community college consortium to offer the service.


