ENROLLMENT NOT TOO BAD -- As of last Thursday, fall term enrollment in credit classes was ahead of fall 1985 by 28 full-time equivalent students. Vice President Jack Carter says that offsets a 30 FTE decrease in summer term, meaning that the College is at least holding its own. Final counts, including adult education, probably won't be known for several more weeks. Most credit departments are doing well at this point, though there are FTE decreases in several areas. Mechanics and Mass Communication, Carter reports, are each down 21 percent from a year ago; Business is down 7.7 percent.

TELEPHONE SOLICITATION-OFFICE/COPIER SUPPLIES SALES SCAM -- You may occasionally get long distance calls from companies with important sounding names. The salesperson will tell you that they have been referred to you by someone, or that they work for a government agency or even that they have a free gift for you. They will offer you various office or copier supplies at supposedly bargain prices due to overshipments, death of the company owner, their freight shipment derailed, etc., etc. It usually sounds like a good deal. If you do respond to their sales pitch and place an order over the phone - you'll more than likely regret it. When the supplies arrive you'll find them other than as represented over the phone, of inferior quality, and always highly overpriced. Trying to return them ends up an experience in frustration. These companies will even threaten to sue you (some have). It's a mess.

These professional con artists and the fraudulent companies they represent are on the increase. Be alert - know your suppliers! The best way to deal with these types of situations is to refer all telephone solicitors to the college Warehouse and state that all office/copier supplies are purchased only there. Remeber to buy all of your office supplies from the Warehouse. The prices are the best around and you get same day delivery also. - Purchasing Services

OUCH! If Ballot Measure 9 (the 1½% limitation on property taxes) is approved at the November 4 election, LCC will lose \$2,333,891 in fiscal year 1987-88, according to the Oregon Legislative Revenue Office. In fiscal year 1988-89, the LCC cut will jump to \$6,278,830. Administrative Services Vice-President Bill Berry says the loss of \$2.3 million could require: a cut of 92 of 254 classified people (36%); a cut of 55 of 256 faculty (21%); or a cut of 48 of 84 management positions (57%). He says the loss of \$6.2 million could mean: a cut of 248 of 254 classified positions; a cut of 147 of 256 faculty positions; or a loss of 84 management positions plus 86 classified poitions. As for the impact on students, some 3,000 would have to go elsewhere the first year and up to three times that many in the second year.

TWO MORE DESERVE THANKS -- In addition to those mentioned as Eugene Celebration volunteers in last Thursday's Daily, two more must be added. Sincere thanks to two Performing Arts people, Barbara Myrick and Karen Falise. They added entertainment and face painting to the LCC Booth and were much appreciated by the crowds.

A STAFF OF GIVERS -- You probably read earlier that 89 staff members are involved in Showplace: LCC, the volunteer effort to beautify the main campus. But, have you heard that the 1986 President's Club of LCC Foundation has 79 staff members who have given a total this year of \$26,752 in cash and in-kind gifts to the College? President's Club membership requires an annual gift of at least \$100. Also greatly appreciated are the under-\$100 gifts given this year by 34 other staff members. LCC has many generous, giving people. If you know of other examples, share them with the Daily editor.

WINNING IDEAS -- If you're interested in what it takes to win the Idea Exchange program, here are the ideas that won certificates and \$50 savings bonds (the bond comes after the idea has been implemented) for four staff members. Rod Metzger, Social Science faculty, suggested modifying teacher list printouts so they are more useful for roll-taking and other record-keeping. The idea was implemented as of last summer term. Tom Birkenhead, Business faculty, suggested use of a Delphi Technique to solicit ideas from staff and students to solve specific problems. His idea was used last year to seek ways to increase enrollment. Janet Anderson, Athletics, suggested contacting former students to let them know if they have completed academic requirements. If not, they are advised of registration dates. Implementation is to take place next summer. Sue Colvin, Personnel Services director, suggested use of gift certificates for LCC tuition. They could be offered as Christmas or special occasion gifts. A winter term implementation date is planned.

RETIRING -- Three more LCC pioneers are retiring. The Board of Education approved retirement requests last week for Victor Favier, who has taught biology since 1966; Hayden Hodges, physics/engineering instructor since 1968, and John Kreitz, Business Department head since 1967. Favier and Hodges leave December 31, Kreitz February 28, 1987. In other personnel matters, the Board accepted the resignation of Mitch Stepanovich, assistant reference librarian and Phi Theta Kappa advisor, who becomes a library department head at the University of Texas; and moved Ruth Coffman from temporary to permanent instructor in Health Occupations. She came to LCC from Sacred Heart Hospital, where she was evening charge nurse.

In other business at its October 8 meeting, the Board agreed to schedule public sessions in 1987 in outlying areas of the District to meet residents and hear about needs and ideas for solving them. A resolution was passed to honor the contributions of now-retired Evelyn Tennis, former Student Activities support person. The administration was authorized to sell surplus items, including a 1981 Oldsmobile and a blister-pack machine. Investment earnings in fiscal year 1985-86 totaled \$460,008, the Board was informed. on average daily investments of \$5.9 million at an average interest rate of 7.63 percent. Some \$421,000 went to the general fund and the rest to the plant

A safety/accident report for the years 1983-86, the Board learned, shows a number of departments to have been accident free for up to eight years. English & Foreign language has gone more than eight years without an accident; Siuslaw Education Center at Florence and Student Health Center have gone six years; and Performing Arts, more than four years. Reporting no accidents in the last three years were Cottage Grove Center, Business Department, Mass Communication, Social Science, Electronic Services, Study Skills, Athletics, Printing/Graphics, and Institutional Advancement. Accidents from falling or slipping and from moving or lifting objects continue to plague those departments which focus on physical labor. Some 46 accidents in 1985-86 cost the College \$64,229. Both numbers, however, were reductions from the prior year, in which 50 accidents cost \$186,884.



The passage of Measure 9 will be a blessing to home owners, renters, unemployed and employed people, as well as businesses and retired people, as well as businesses and retired people. If property taxes are allowed to increase the next 20 years like they have the past 20 years, the property taxes on the average home would be \$8000 to \$10,000 per year. We have thousands of women and men in Oregon where their only source of income is Social Security. The average women in 1985 on Social Security drew \$199 per month and the average man \$521 per month. There are thousands more of widows, retired people, umemployed, disabled and Veterans living on LESS than \$10,000 per year. These people are paying from 10 to 30% of their TOTAL INCOMES in property taxes.
