**FAREWELL** - William A. "Bill" Berry, vice president for administrative services since 1980 at LCC, has resigned effective December 31 to accept a similar position in St. Peters, Missouri. As business manager, he is among the first employees to be hired by the new college. It's also an opportunity to return to the midwest," Berry said. His roots and family are there and he worked earlier at Johnson County Community College at Overland, Park, Kansas, and at the University of Missouri at Kansas City.

President Turner said a temporary successor to Berry will be announced soon. A national search for a permanent administrative services vice president is planned.

"I am sad to see Bill Berry leave," said Turner, "but I am satisfied that he cannot be persuaded to stay, considering the opportunity he sees in the new position." President Turner called Berry "one of the top college business officers in the country. He has contributed enormously to LCC over the last six years. "

■ **Pearl Harbor Anniversary Day: December 7, 1986.** This marks the 45th anniversary of "a date that will live in infamy," the day when 200 Japanese aircraft attacked Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, the U.S. "Gibraltar of the Pacific." The raid, which began at 7:55 AM and lasted only an hour, left nearly 3,000 dead, almost wiped out the entire U.S. Pacific Fleet at anchor there, and destroyed about 200 aircraft on the ground. It brought about immediate U.S. entry into World War II.

**TELEPHONE ANSWERING DEVICE OR MODEM USERS** - If you have either a telephone answering machine or a modem that you use in conjunction with a telephone line, please inform Donna Morgan at ext. 2565. The new phone system treats these a little differently than did the old system. In order for the machines to function properly, the phone switch needs to know where they are.

**DID YOU KNOW?** - Any donation of equipment or materials or other assets to LCC or to the LCC Foundation for use in College programs must first be approved by the appropriate vice president or dean before it is formally accepted. Gifts are receipted through the LCC Foundation to ensure that equipment and materials are properly recorded for inventory purposes and to ensure prompt acknowledgement to the donor.

Any donation of equipment, materials, or other assets that involves a cost to the College of \$100 or more must be approved by the President or designee. A brief written plan for use of the equipment/materials is submitted to the appropriate vice president or dean and must include plans for the storage and distribution of donated equipment or materials.

A letter of acceptance (or rejection) of donated equipment or materials is issued by the LCC Foundation Office within 30 days of the offer. The letter must include a full description of the equipment or materials donated. Copies of the acceptance letter are distributed to the College property control manager in the Purchasing Department and to the appropriate department administrator involved in the gift transaction.

**TAKE ADVANTAGE** - One of the benefits of working at LCC is the opportunity to enroll in one credit or one noncredit class each term with no tuition charge. 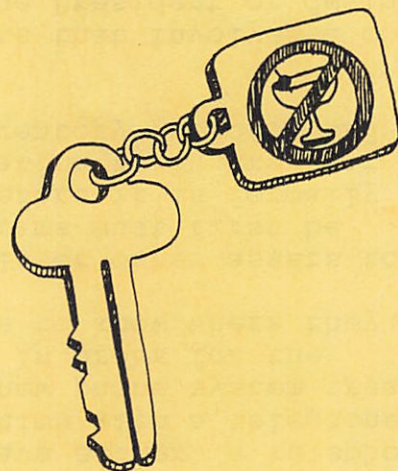

Colvin will serve from Jan. 1 until a new vice president is appointed and takes office, says President Richard M. Turner, III. That could be in about six months, Turner said. Colvin has indicated that he will not be a candidate for the permanent appointment as vice president.

The interim vice presidency is the fifth managerial role assigned Colvin since he joined LCC in 1970 as a researcher. In 1973 he became director of institutional research and planning. He became director of information services in 1978, director of facilities services in 1979, and director of campus services in 1984.
