SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS -

- The 1987 Maximum Subject wages will increase to \$43,800.
- The 1987 contribution rate remains 7.15% (.0715) for employer and 7.15% (.0715) for employe.
- The maximums a person receiving social security benefits can earn without a benefit reduction have increased as follows:
 - A. Ages under 65 \$6,000 (\$500 per month in first year of retirement.
 - B. Aged 65-69 \$8,160 (\$680 per month in first year of retirement.)
 - C. Aged 70 and over No earnings limit.

- \$460 in covered wages will provide a quarter of coverage for 1987.

ELECTION DECISION DELAYED - LCC's Board of Education has postponed until its Feb. 11 meeting a decision on whether to seek a maintenance and equipment levy at the Mar. 31 election. On advice of attorney Ed Harms, the Board agreed to seek an opinion from the State Department of Revenue regarding the difference between operating monies and capital expenditures. Only the latter would be in the levy. Harms said the statute which would tell the College what it could include, "frankly, is a mess."

In other business, the Board was advised that underrealized enrollment and salary settlements which exceeded early cost estimates could put the College in danger of overspending its budget by the end of the year. The shortfall could reach \$200,000, according to Interim Vice President for Administrative Services Paul Colvin. He said the College's contingency fund could cover it if the shortfall goes no higher.

Vice President for Student Services Jack Carter reported that winter term enrollment may be as much as 100 full-time equivalent students lower this year than last. The Nanny program in Home Economics has been approved by the State as an optional track in Early Childhood Education, reported Vice President for Instruction Jacquee Belcher. She said the program is attracting students from across the nation, since it's the first such program in the country at the community college level. Prospective employers already have contacted the College to hire its first graduates.

In personnel matters, the Board accepted the retirement of William J. Beals, Jr., from the Social Science faculty, effective Jan. 1. Beals, former Social Science head, spent 20 years with LCC. Margaret Stauffer of RSVP will retire Jan. 31 instead of last Dec. 31; she will remain on the job until her successor is hired. Appointment of Paul Colvin as Interim Vice President for Administrative Services was approved.

SPENDING RESTRAINT ASKED - Looking ahead to the fiscal year which begins July 1, the President has asked budget managers to create a five percent reserve in this year's budget to help meet next fiscal year's needs. This year's budget includes a \$1.1 million cash carry-forward. This has been a standard procedure in LCC budgeting for some years. The cash carry-forward is thus an essential part of each year's budget. Without it, cutbacks would be inevitable. The five percent figure will not be across-the-board, however, since spending for campus-wide obligations such as insurance and utilities cannot be avoided. Creation of the reserve at this time comes about because of budget uncertainties about total enrollment and other expected sources of revenue. Should the financial picture improve this spring, some of the reserves identified through this process may be released.

WOULD FAILURE OF THE MAINTENANCE/EQUIPMENT LEVY AFFECT THE OPERATING BUDGET? Yes. Past rejected levies already have. In each of the last three budget years, the College has allocated \$250,000 toward deferred maintenance. That's how the College funded the reroofing last summer of the Health and Science Buildings. That money could have been used for operating expenses or to replace worn out equipment, had a prior maintenance/equipment proposal been approved by voters. If this year's proposed levy is rejected by voters, the College may have to move more money away from operating to fix more roofs and meet other needs that can't be put off. It depends on what needs suddenly become critical. Moving money away from operating to maintenance and equipment needs can't help but impact, to some degree, staffing and supplies budgets. 1987 W-4 WITHHOLDING ALLOWANCE CERTIFICATE CHANGES

All employees are required to file the new 1987 W-4 form so that withholding from wages are as close as possible to the tax liability.

If you expect to have non-salary income (interest, dividends, rental income and capital gains) of \$950 or more, you must estimate the amount and enter the estimate on the form W-4 worksheet. Non-salary income will reduce the number of withholding allowances you claim.

Employees whose spouse will earn more than \$950 must use a special new table (W-4 page 4) to determine the effect on the employee's withholding.

Employees who have more than one job must use a special new table (W-4 page 4) to determine the effect on the employee's withholding.

Employees with tax deductions that will no longer be allowed may be seriously underwithheld if the new W-4 isn't filed because the Tax Reform Act eliminates or reduces many tax deductions.

Withholding must match actual tax owed more closely in 1987. It must equal the lesser of 90% of taxes owed for 1987 or 100% of taxes owed in 1986. The taxpayer may be liable for a penalty tax and a \$500 fine.

The employer is required to send the IRS copies of the W-4 form if the employee claims more than 10 withholding allowances or if the employee claims exempt and earns more than \$200 per week.

An employee who can be claimed as a dependent on another person's tax return must pay tax in 1987 if he or she has non-wage income and the wages and non-wage income exceed \$500.
