HAVE LUNCH WITH THE PRESIDENT - To enhance personal communication with staff and students, President Turner will hold monthly brown bag lunches in the Board Room (ADM 216) for the rest of the college year. FOREIGN STUDENT ENROLLMENT UP - Figures taken from reports made to an outside data collection at the end of Fall Term 1986-87 reported enrollment of LCC foreign students at an all time high. Data indicated the 156 students enrolled, up 45 from Fall term 1985-86. This is in keeping with the national trend of colleges and universities. Reports show that foreign student enrollment increased ten percent nationwide over the last five The profile, compiled the American Council on Education's Division of Policy Analysis and Research, said that 46 percent of the foreign students were from South and East Asia, especially Taiwan, Malaysia, Korea, India, and Japan. The next most represented area was the Middle East with 15 percent. The majority of foreign students majored in four fields of study: engineering (22 percent); business and management (19 percent); mathematics and computer sciences (10 percent); and physical and life sciences (8 percent).

ING CHOSEN - Sandra Ing, director of specialized student services, has been selected to fill a vacancy on the Junction City School Board created by the resignation last month of Earl Kelley. Ing says that she will run for the position in the next election. A resident of the Cheshire area for the past nine years, Ing has been employed at LCC for seven years, the past two as director of specialized student services.

ELECTION Q & A - What will the proposed serial levy generate in dollars and how will it be spent? Paul Colvin, interim vice president for Administrative Services, has prepared data which indicates that a 10-year levy would produce a total of \$6,021,269. Since the anticipated need totals \$14.7 million, not all suggested projects can be funded. Those chosen would be in four areas: 1) rehabilitation of run-down facilities (roofs, beam repair, paving, painting, etc.); 2) replacement of equipment which is worn out or outdated in both instruction and support areas; 3) campus-wide network of microcomputers, terminals and peripheral devices with mainframe access; and 4) new construction and remodeling to modernize existing facilities and to meet needs of changing programs.



ELECTION Q & A - If the College need for maintenance and equipment money over the next 10 years totals \$14.7 million, why are we asking for a levy of only \$7,250,000? One goal is to find a sum which takes into account both the College's needs and the apparent public desire to hold property taxes at or below the current level. The total being recommended to the Board of Education amounts to continuing the LCC share of property taxes at about the same level as this year. Bonds sold years ago to finance the construction of the main campus will be paid off next year. That could reduce the LCC property tax by about 10 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value, or \$6 for the owner of a home assessed at \$60,000. The College would ask voters to authorize continuance of this same level of funding to apply for the proposed serial levy of \$7,250,000 per year. It is thought that this approach of not asking for additional taxes is realistic. Paul Colvin, Interim Vice President for Administrative Services

MEMORANDUM - In a memo to the College Cabinet Members regarding the Jan. 28, 1987, article in the Register-Guard, President Turner said the following:

As you are aware, no doubt, the Register-Guard carried a story in its Wednesday, Jan. 28, 1987, edition about the shortfall we face and the steps we are taking to deal with it.

Although we feel the article was intended to be positive, there were some inaccuracies. One of them was the statement, "Colvin said the new shortfall is also being caused in part by a higher-than-expected settlement in salaries for teachers, a 3.8 percent for the 311 faculty members who teach half time or more."

This is not the position of Mr. Paul Colvin nor the rest of the administration. There are several reasons for the shortfall; among them, raises for all employees contributed to it. We would expect this, since we are a labor intensive organization and a high percentage of our resources are budgeted for employees' salaries.

We have confirmed with Register-Guard reporter James Thalman that Mr. Colvin's statement was not accurately presented. While this is unfortunate, we do not feel the article intended to mislead its readers.

I hope that this will help you to understand the facts about our shortfall and the steps we are taking to control our financial affairs.



ELECTION DECISION - Tonight's meeting of the LCC Board of Education will focus on a decision concerning a proposed maintenance and equipment serial levy at the Mar. 31 election. There has been discussion regarding a possible 5-year rather than 10-year levy request. In other business, the Board may consider deletion of Appendix A relating to workloads from the faculty contract, will award a bid for purchase of 13 microcomputers and seven printers for instructional and support services areas, and will consider adoption of an academic calendar for 1987-88.

RESULTS IN - Results of the Marketing Council survey of summer credit students and summer applicants (people who applied, but did not enroll) have been compiled and are available to departments planning summer offerings. Highlights include the fact that last summer 60 percent of students and 69 percent of applicants were women. There also appears to be opportunities for developing the 18-to-21 age market. Students liked LCC's friendly environment, helpful staff, quality of programs, and low cost. The major area for improvement was scheduling classes to avoid conflicts. A number of students also complained of cancelled classes. # Valentine's Day - February 14

"Roses are red, Violets are blue Sugar is sweet, And so are you."

Each February 14th, the ancient Romans celebrated a holiday called Lupercalia. On that feast, it was customary for young Roman men to enjoy the fun of blindly drawing a name from a box filled with names of all the local maidens. This celebration laid the foundation for Valentine's Day several centuries later, when the Church began replacing pagan celebrations with Christian holidays and assigned that day to commemorate two St. Valentines, both martyrs, who coincidentally had died on that date in 270 A.D.

The connection to romance grew not from any myths surrounding the two churchmen. Rather, it blossomed from conventional beliefs held in the Middle Ages that the second week of the second month was when birds began to mate. Thus a whole early literature was built upon St. Valentine's Day. Chaucer mentions it in the *Parliement of Foules*:

"For this was on seynt Valentynes day, whan every foul cometh ther to chese his make."

Two centuries later, Shakespeare had Ophelia singing in Hamlet: "Good morrow! 'tis Saint Valentine's Day,

All in the morning betime, And I a maid at your window, To be your Valentine!"

By the Romantic Era of the early 1800's, Valentine's Day had developed such an aura that it was second only to Christmas in celebration. Those were the days of some of the most memorable love lines in literature, when Elizabeth Barrett Browning wrote: "How do I love thee? Let me count the ways." And Gustave Flaubert penned:

"This is the hour when, alone amidst everything that sleeps, I open the drawer that holds my treasures. I look at your slippers, your handkerchief...your portrait. I reread your letters...my heart expands in the night, suffused with a dew of love."

In those days, "Valentines" to greet loved ones were elaborately ornate creations of paper and lace—and personal, very personal.





In the past 100 years, things have taken a different turn. Children still decorate boxes to hold the class's supply of Valentines, but their Valentine greetings are more likely to come from the local drug store's collection than from the children's hearts. Adults still have Valentine parties and greet each other with red heart boxes of sinfully rich chocolates, but our messages are more apt to appear in a newspaper classified than in a four-line poem from the heart.

#### BOARD NEWS -

LCC Board of Education members voted last week to put a four-year \$725,000 serial levy before voters on Mar. 31 to finance maintenance equipment projects. The levy will raise \$2.9 million. It will cost an estimated 10-cents per thousand dollars of assessed value. The owner of a \$60,000 home will pay an estimated \$6 a year. Offsetting that will be a corresponding decrease in property taxes for LCC of about the same amount, due to a payoff next year of bonds used to construct the main campus.

In other business, the Board approved the purchase of \$26,325 worth of microcomputers and printers for instructional and support areas of the College. Appendix A of the 1985-87 LCCEA/LCC Agreement, relating to workloads, was ordered deleted. The Board heard a presentation from faculty members who argued that workloads are inequitable in areas such as CWE, HSC, ABE, and ESL. The retirement of Wilner Moon, business instructor since 1971, was approved. David Marotta was hired as programming manager in Computer Services; he has been teaching data processing at LCC for five years. Nola McClellan was promoted from LCC Library cataloging assistant to assistant reference librarian. Stephen Candee moves from part-time social science faculty to temporary contracted position to teach political science.

TONIGHT - LCC's Board of Education will hold a public work session tonight at Cottage Grove. Members will tour the Cottage Grove Center, 103 South Fifth St., at 7 p.m. A 7:30 p.m. session will be held at the First Presbyterian Church, 216 South Third St., to meet with Cottage Grove Center Advisory Committtee members and other representatives of the community. The Board wants to get out to off-campus centers of the College District and to listen to comments, concerns and questions which constituents may have.



WE MAKE A DIFFERENCE - LCC adds over fifty-six million dollars to the local economy. That indicates an economic impact of more than three times the amount invested in the college. This is according to a release issued Friday regarding a statewide economic impact study sponsored by the Oregon Community College Association. The study, which is based on information from the 1985-86 academic year, used financial data, college records, and questionnaires completed by students from all of Oregon's community colleges. Oregonians invest \$21,038,317 a year in LCC through state and local taxes. The college also brings "new" money into the district. One example is the nearly \$4 million in student financial aid. The investment is then returned to the community through the expenditures of students, staff, and the college, which total \$36,408,724. LCC generates over 808 full-time equivalent jobs for employees, and another 3,935 jobs exist because of the money in circulation as a result of college's existence. Without LCC, the report indicates, approximately 369 full-time and 3,501 part-time students would not have attended college in Fall 1986, while 914 full-time and 5,430 part-time students would have attended an out-of-district college.
