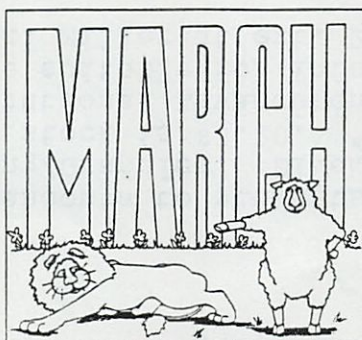

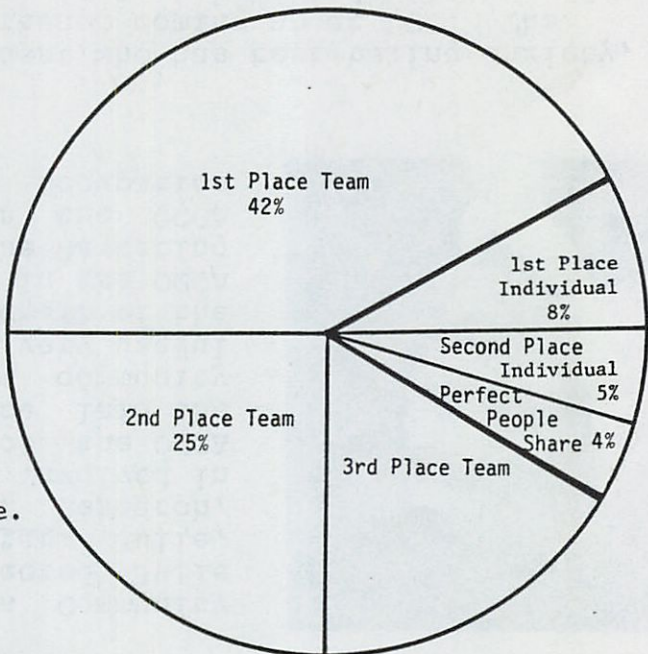

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'BABY ON BOARD!' SIGNS COULD CAUSE NEEDLESS ACCIDENTS

Thinking of buying one of those yellow "Baby on Board!" or "Mother-in-Law in Trunk" signs for your car? DON'T!

They could bring you a lot of grief in the form of an auto accident, warns the Insurance Information Institute.

The signs, which sell for about \$1 or \$2, generally are attached to the rear window, where they can obscure your vision.

The different messages also increase the danger of rear-end collisions, as drivers in vehicles to the rear pay more attention to reading than to driving, and may actually wind up crashing into sign-bearing cars.

According to the I.I.I., it's a far better idea to comply with compulsory child restraint laws in every state and to place babies (and children) on board in restraint devices.

NEWS ENDORSES LEVY - In a wonderfully supportive editorial, the Springfield News solidly endorsed passage of LCC's serial levy in its Saturday, March 14 edition. The last paragraph reads: "We think the board has shown courage in putting the issue before voters and wisdom in keeping the amount and duration of the levy within reason. Now it's the voters' turn to show some faith in our community college--one of the better institutions of its kind in the nation. We have a \$70 million investment to protect at Lane Community College, not including the incalculable benefit of training and employing our citizens. Over four years, \$2.9 million is a small price to pay to protect that investment. We urge voters to approve Measure 20-03 on the March 31 ballot.--erj"

BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETS TONIGHT - Purchase of a \$77,920 touch-tone telephone registration system heads a list of housekeeping matters to be addressed at tonight's LCC Board of Education meeting. He says the system will "provide a more efficient, convenient, easy and inexpensive way for our students to register."

Among other agenda items: purchase of appraisal services as part of establishing a fixed assets system, purchase of microcomputers for Counseling, and awarding of a bid for printing the College catalog.

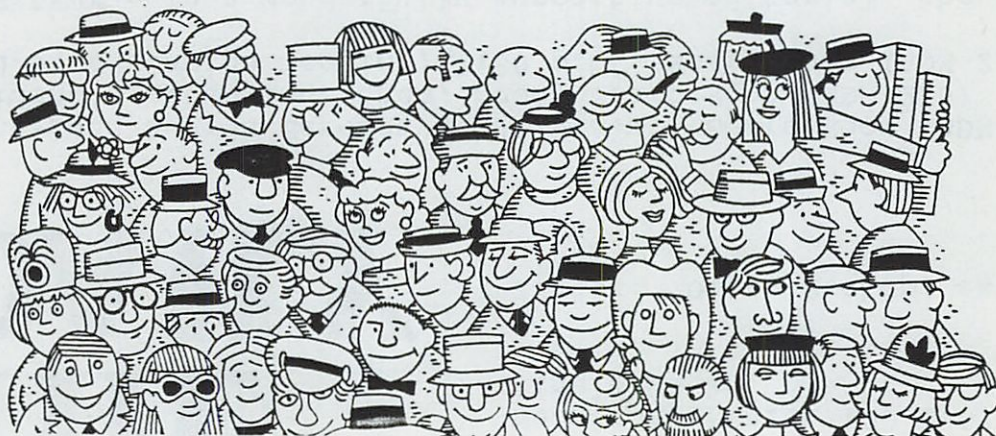

COLLEGE ENROLLMENT TRENDS - Current enrollment trends at LCC are continuations of trends that the college has experienced over the last several years. Enrollment in Adult Education, primarily through our Downtown Center, has remained constant for some time. Enrollment at the main campus has declined at the rate of 5 percent per year. Our decrease in enrollment is due chiefly to a nationwide drop in the number of people in the 17-22 age group. This population change is a long-term one, that will not be reversed for another ten years. Some campuses have offset this population trend by enrolling more women, minorities, and older students. Consistent with the above trends, we find that proportionately more of our students are becoming evening or part-time. Departments that experienced enrollment drops this term included Mechanics, Data Processing, Electronics, and Industrial Technology. On the other hand, departments showing at least modest increases included Home Economics, Social Science, Science, and the Cottage Grove Education Center. Barrett of Greenleaf as director of Retired Senior Volunteer Program.
