CHOSEN - President Richard M. Turner, III, has been elected to a three-year term on the Board of Directors of the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges (AACJC). He assumes office July 1. Turner was chosen in balloting conducted last month among chief executives of the 1,200-plus community colleges in the U.S. and Canada. He was nominated for the 35-member Board by AACJC's National Council on Black American Affairs.

To each of you and others, who may not be cited here by name, but who also deserve so much appreciation. Thanks for going the extra mile to see that the job was well done. I am most grateful.

FINAL RESULTS - LCC won a 55 percent yes vote for its serial levy at last Tuesday's election. Final counts show totals of 21,000 to 17,022. In Lane County, the vote was 20,778 to 16,639 (56% yes), Monroe Elementary School District in Benton County voted 28-75 (27% yes). Harrisburg Union High School District in Linn County voted 194-308 (39% yes). Voters in Douglas County (there are only 21 Douglas registered voters in the LCC District) are included in the Lane County total. Analysis of the voting by precinct is to be completed later, but this election appears at first glance to parallel prior LCC elections. LCC, to win an election, must attract a majority of yes votes in Eugene. The goal, outside Eugene, is to try to attract yes votes in the 30 to 40 percent range, at least. REPORT OF LCC ADVOCATES - Jim Pitney, Junction City dairyman and LCC Board member and chairman of LCC Advocates, asked The Daily to share this report of Advocates activities with staff.

Some \$625 was spent on the Advisory Committee endorsement ad in last Sunday's Register-Guard; \$812 was spent on 30-second spots on KUGN AM and FM on the day of the election and the preceeding three days. Gordon Bussey volunteered to do the voice for the radio spots."





INNOVATOR OF THE YEAR AWARD

The League for Innovation in the Community College has created an award that is designed to recognize League College staff members who have designed and implemented a significant innovation during this past year. The recognition is known as the Innovator of the Year Award and is given annually to one individual from each of the 19 League member Any current Lane Community College employee, college districts. part-time or full-time, may be considered for the award.

The recipient of the Innovator of the Year Award will receive a plaque from the League for Innovation to be presented at an appropriate LCC The award winner will also be featured in the League publication, Innovator.

Last year's award went to Dr. Daniel Hodges, Coordinator of Testing, Counseling Department, who developed six innovations: the study tips collection, learning tapes and outlines, textbook readability program, computerized test scoring and analysis, course comparison program, and "an open letter to students."

The deadline for nominations is April 30, 1987.

CALL FOR NOMINATIONS

WHO MAY NOMINATE?

Nominations may come from anyone either inside or outside the College.

WHAT ARE THE SELECTION CRITERIA?

The award will be given to an individual who has designed and implemented a significant innovation at LCC. The League has established the following criteria for making the selection from among nominees. PLEASE NOTE THAT ONE OR MORE OF THE CRITERIA SHOULD BE MET, BUT IT IS NOT NECESSARY THAT ANY NOMINEE SHOULD MEET ALL CRITERIA.

- 1. Quality Students and/or staff agree that the innovation increases quality in the course program, office, or institution. Evidence of quality may include student ratings or letters of support from colleagues.
- Efficiency There is evidence that the innovation or outstanding program contributes to a more efficient way of doing things. Student ratings, perceptions of outside consultants, and pre- and post-comparison of time involved are examples of evidence.

- 3. <u>Cost effectiveness</u> There is evidence that the innovation adds a value to the institution while at the same time containing or reducing costs. Cost data will serve as evidence.
- 4. Replication The program selected can be used by other institutions with a minimum of difficulty. The description of the program should include any conditions necessary for replication.
- 5. <u>Creativity</u> The selected program should be as original as possible or the adaptation should at least be creative. The description of the program or letters from experts are examples of evidence.
- 6. <u>Timeliness</u> The award-winning program should not be more than five years old at that institution, but it must have been around long enough to have been tested so that it meets most of the criteria.

HOW WILL THE WINNER BE SELECTED?

LCC's Innovator of the Year Award Selection Committee will review the nomination and supporting materials and select one award winner by May 15. The Committee will invite and encourage high-quality nominations, and in the event no nominations are deemed to be of a caliber worthy of nationwide recognition, no award will be made.

The Selection Committee consists of the four past recipients of the Innovator of the Year award. They are: Ms. Arden Woods, Spanish Instructor (1983), Ms. Velma Jesser, Business Department (1984), Mr. Bill Mullins, Social Science (1985), and Dr. Daniel Hodges, Counseling Department (1986). Mr. Larry Warford, League Representative, chairs the Committee.

HOW ARE NOMINATIONS MADE?

Nominations should consist of the name and department of the innovator and a one-page description of the project, process, item, or activity supported by relevant materials. If materials are visual, or in some other form, it may be necessary for the nominee to make arrangements for the Award Selection Committee to have access for viewing purposes.

According to figures released by the state offices of the OSBDC Network, the LCC center outperformed all 19 centers within the network in 1986. The LCC SBDC overachieved every established goal, including goals set by the US Small Business Administration, which partially funds the SBDC program. 





UNFUNDED AFTER JUNE 30 - Some 46.63 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions, in addition to the 20 FTE faculty positions announced earlier, are unfunded for the fiscal year which begins July 1. In a letter sent to all staff Wednesday, President Turner said the staff reductions are necessary to achieve a balanced budget for the 1987-88 year. "We simply cannot continue . . to provide the same level of offerings and services that we did when our enrollment and resources were better matched," he said. More than \$2 million had to be cut. Names of persons affected by the reduction have not been made available to the general public, but those whose positions are unfunded were to have been notified of their status not later than last Tuesday. Since some positions are part-time or were only cut in part, the number of people affected is larger than the number of positions reduced.

Approximately proportionate reductions were spread among the three College branches and Office of the President. Administrative Services Branch has 16.04 FTE classified staff unfunded. Most affected areas are plant operations and maintenance, accounting, and Computer Services. Instructional Branch is reduced 18.44 FTE classified and management staff. Four management positions are eliminated and six other management positions will have reduced workloads or altered assignments. Media Productions is cut in its entirety. Student Services Branch loses 8.95 FTE. Reduced in staff are Counseling, Career Information Center, Multicultural Center, Athletics, and Student Activities. Office of the President loses 3.2 FTE classified staff, along with reductions in funding for Printing/Graphics and KLCC. Word Processing Center will be closed.

President Turner said the College will do all it can to assist persons

President Turner said the College will do all it can to assist persons affected by the reductions. The Board of Education will meet in executive session on Wednesday, April 29, to discuss matters pertaining to personnel affected.



Some Things We "Know" Just Aren't So

The French writer Montaigne once observed that we believe nothing so firmly as what we know least. It's true that many of the things we "know" simply aren't so. Furthermore, some of our convictions have a surface plausibility that makes them potentially more harmful than just-plain-crazy notions.

For instance:

Night driving is safer than day, because there are fewer cars on the road at night.

Not so. Accident statistics indicate that 10 pm to 3 am is the most dangerous period; 10 am to 3 pm, the safest.

Always keep your eyes glued to the road while driving.

No, it's better to let them roam around a little, except in very fast or intricate traffic. This reduces the deadly, mesmerizing effect of the unending, unchanging road.

The best treatment for frostbite is rubbing the area with snow.

No, the favored remedy now is warm water at or a little higher than body temperature.

To control bleeding, apply a tourniquet.

On the contrary, medical experts come very near to saying that an untrained person should never try this. The possible consequences of shutting off circulation are too dire. Instead, press a sterilized bandage or handkerchief against the wound until medical help arrives.

"Repeaters" or accidentprone individuals and "scofflaws" who have a total disregard for the law cause most highway accidents.

Not according to a survey made some years ago. It found that 8 out of 10 drivers involved in fatal accidents had no previous records and that 4 out of 5 were obeying traffic laws when their accidents occurred. These things can happen to anybody, and constant vigilance is the only protection.

Swimming in cold water is not only exhilarating, but especially beneficial.

Health authorities don't seem to think so. A water temperature in the 70s is relaxing and comfortable. Water of 60 degrees or lower may produce dangerous exhaustion, since it requires an increased energy output to counter the loss of body heat.

In heavy fog, turn on your brightest lights and drive slowly.

The "slowly" part is good, but your lights should be on low beam, as the high beam will only reflect back into your eyes.

Lightning never strikes the same place twice.

Nonsense. The Empire State Building was hit 48 times in one year.

If you want to be really safe, stay home.

No. Estimates of the number of home accidents run into the millions each year. Falls, collisions with heavy instruments, fires, discharges of firearms that were presumed to be unloaded—things like these make the home an unsafe haven.
