SPOTLIGHT - The next in the series on innovators focuses on Bob Prokop. Prokop came to the Mass Communications Department in 1978 as an instructor, after a career in commercial and fashion photography in Chicago. Recently, he was one of the finalists for the Innovator of the Year award. Prokop was nominated for his work with the new Computerized Video Editing (CVE) system. He took a complex professional editing system and adapted it to the special needs of instruction. The CVE system is the only one of its kind in any education unit in the Northwest. However, these systems are in use in most commercial broadcasting stations and professional video production houses. This kind of editing is a blend of art and technology and by having instruction available in this area of expertise, LCC is keeping in step with state-of-the-art production and editing techniques making LCC students more employable in Eugene, and throughout the country. Prokop earned a bachelor's (1963) in photography from the Illinois Institute of Technology and a master's (1978) in public visual communication from Southern Illinois University. (The Daily Editor is very proud to be married to this innovator!)
