GOOD NEWS - Word has been received from the U.S. Department of Education that the long-standing (four years) financial aid liability has finally been resolved. The resolution will result in approximately \$100,000 more in the Work Study and SEOG programs, collectively. The original liability was \$427,000, but with interest would have totalled more than \$500,000. The terms of the resolution reduced the liability to \$187,000 and allowed LCC to eliminate any remaining liability by crediting the funding reductions of the past two years.

Vice President Carter notes that many individuals contributed to the successful resolution, including Senators Hatfield and Packwood. Also, a special thanks to Rich Freund of the Counseling Department for his help in preparing statistical data for our presentation. Special recognition goes to Linda Waddell for her untold hours of searching records, reviewing regulations and preparing materials. Also, thanks to the Financial Aid staff for their understanding, assistance and hard work during this period.

SOME FACTS YOU MAY NOT KNOW - Did you know that the College currently has 334 black and white boards on the main campus? Each night the custodians service the boards by cleaning chalk trays, erasers, boards, and restocking chalk trays. This effort takes an average of three minutes per board, or 16.7 person hours per night. If instructors were to erase the boards after each class, custodial service time could be reduced by one-third or 5.56 hours each night. If instructors were to completely erase boards after class and then use a chamois, time savings would be two-thirds or 11.12 hours per night.
