VOC-ED STUDENTS EARN MORE - Graduates of Ohio vocational education programs earn 21 percent more money four years after graduation than high school graduates without vocational training. Professor Ismail Ghazalah of Ohio University at Athens used Internal Revenue Services data to learn that unemployment is as much as 66 percent less for the vocational graduates than for those in the general work force who are the same age and have had the same number of years schooling. Labor Day was first celebrated more than 100 years ago. Labor unions were just being formed. Politicians were passing legislation to protect workers.

Today, however, most of us probably never even think of the meaning behind this holiday. It is just the last long weekend at the end of the summer...the last hurrah before the children head back to school and the leaves need to be raked...another excuse for stores to stage elaborate sales to woo customers.

What was Labor Day intended to be? The first celebration, in 1882, started as a quiet way to honor the folks in America who work hard—carpenters, printers, construction and factory workers, and all others.

When the holiday first began in America, many

factories were unsafe. Children worked long hours with dangerous machinery. It seemed that some workers spent their entire lives inside the factory. Legislation and labor unions teamed up to change that: hours were shortened, children left factories for school, and a minimum wage was established.

America became industrialized and earned a reputation for watching over its workers. While there are still exceptions today, vigilance and safety standards work to rub out those exceptions. And the great wheels of industry churn on.

So this year, maybe we should reflect upon the industrial roots of our nation and celebrate appropriately—a community parade, a neighborhood picnic, a family reunion. Then, it's back to business.

The items on state price agreement include batteries, light bulbs, automotive parts, bindery supplies, laboratory chemicals and supplies, computer terminals, printers, copiers, electrical fixtures, fire extinguishers, first aid kits, flairs, chain saws, detergents, microfilm supplies, offset printing supplies, copier paper, projectors, overhead projectors, tools, hardware, vehicles......

The State charges a service charge based on the dollar amount of the order placed.



TODAY - 200th Birthday of the U.S. Constitution

NARROW MISS - LCC's proposed \$737,500 operating levy was defeated at Tuesday's election by 156 votes out of 59,430 cast. The margin was a skinny 26/100 of one percent, as voters cast 29,637 ballots for and 29,793 against. Undervoting seemed to hurt, as 2,530 people who voted on the other measures on the ballot chose not to vote on the LCC issue. The percent of LCC undervoters, 4.13, was more than twice the percent of undervoters on the ballot measures for the county sheriff and the Extension Service, both of which were approved strongly.

 - 200th Birthday of the U.S. Constitution, September 17, 1787. At the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia 200 years ago today, delegations from 12 states voted unanimously to approve our Constitution. Thirty-nine of the 42 delegates present signed it before drafting the letter that would transmit it to the Congress, which would meet two years later. Observances planned through 1989 will mark these significant events in our nation's bicentennial history.

How to Drive Yourself Crazy

Articles and books on a variety of self-help topics are widely available. There are suggestions on how to cope, reduce stress, and in general make your life better and more satisfying.

However, some people prefer to make themselves miserable. If you are a person who hasn't quite got the hang of how to do this, here are some tips on how to make yourself REALLY crazy!


- Save your major worries until about midnight, then start heavy thinking. Suggested topics include your old age, losing your job, the mistake you made at work last week which they haven't discovered yet, that suspicious wart you've had for five years, or radon in your basement. You can work up a good panic by 1 a.m.
- Keep an inventory of your faults. Ignore strengths. Focus only on your bad points. Try to select friends who will remind you of how awful you are. If you don't have friends like this, you probably have some rela-

tive who can be counted on to point out your weaknesses.

- Set unreasonable goals. No matter how much money you're earning, remember there are others doing better. Try to name three of them, preferably younger (and better looking) than you are. Think how others could do a better job than you do.
- When your children make mistakes, don't accept it as part of growing up. View each situation as the first sign of impending moral decay, delinquency, and a wasted life. Imagine your offspring as shiftless burns at age 30, scrounging off you.

- Never let others know how you feel or what you want. You shouldn't have to tell them; they should be able to read your mind. If you assume this, you stand a good chance of feeling really deprived.
- Never trust anyone. Struggle with problems alone. If you feel the urge to confide in someone who seems to care, remind yourself that people are basically no good and are out only for themselves.
- Never take a vacation break. It's a luxury you can't afford, especially if you're working up to a really good state of exhaustion.
- Above all, never seek help. No matter how serious the problem, convince yourself that asking for help is a sign of weakness and that you can tough it out alone.





DOES YOUR DOG CARRY MORE IDENTIFICATION THAN YOUR CHILD?

Most medical facilities will not treat seriously injured children without the consent of a parent or legal guardian. The longer it takes to find that individual, the longer treatment is delayed sometimes resulting in serious consequences.

George Wager of Buena Park, California, got the idea for lifesaver tags several years ago after he read a newspaper account of a child who was hit by a car. The child had no identification, so authorities had difficulty reaching the family. Wager realized that his children carried no identification either, although his dog wore tags with

As a result Wager founded Lifesaver Charities, a nonprofit organization that distributes tags to be affixed inside, or laced in, children's shoes. The tags are durable, non-erasable, and waterproof and can also be sewn inside clothing. They are about the size of other clothing labels, yet have space for essential information, including a parent's signature authorizing doctors to "do whatever is deemed necessary to insure the safety of the child."
