

YES, BUT... - Attending LCC is more expensive than enrolling at Oregon State and Western Oregon State and almost as expensive as University of Oregon, according to a cost of higher education comparison in the November 28 Springfield News. The newspaper didn't state, however, that the numbers represent costs of attending school away from home for a typical full-time student. LCC's 32,000 students are unlike state system students, for the most part, in that 3 of 4 are part-time, most live in their own homes or with parents, are older (average age is 29), and so on. Attending a non-dormitory school such as LCC might cost \$6,051 a year for those coming from out of the area and renting an apartment. But, that group represents only a small portion of our enrollment and is not typical and, therefore, should not be thought of as characterizing our student body. 

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
