Out with the old and on with the new. But before you January 1 finally wave 1987 good-bye, you'll need to settle things with Uncle Sam Yes, taxes.

With the sweeping changes in the tax laws, this year might be a good one to pass on the headache of figuring out your taxes to a pro fessional. But before you hire someone, be aware that the range of tax preparation services offered by different types of tax preparers depends on their education and training. What you need depends on your income situation.

If your return contains only W-2 and small investment income with basic itemized deductions, you can go to any reputable tax preparer for help. That includes Public and Non-Certified Accountants, as well as other tax experts, such as national firms or local individuals.

If your return is more complex, you should consider consulting a more highly trained individual, such as a Certified Public Accoun-A Certified Public Accountant (CPA) will advise you on alternate

ways to prepare your tax return, and can represent you before the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). CPAs are governed by the code of ethics of a professional organization, which requires that each CPA pass a stringent initial exam, and then continue earning education credits on a yearly basis.

An Enrolled Agent is also authorized to represent you before the IRS. Enrolled Agents are certified by the IRS after passing a government exam or after working five years as IRS auditors.

If your tax situation becomes involved and threatens to take you into federal court, CPAs and Enrolled Agents will recommend a Tax Attorney, who specializes in tax problems. Attorneys-with or without tax training-can represent you before the IRS.

Before hiring a tax service to prepare your return, here are a few things you should ask:

- How much will preparing my return cost?
- What kind of accuracy check will be made on it?
- Will it be reviewed for mathematical errors only or also for errors in tax law interpretation?

- Is the preparer willing to sign my return and provide his or her Social Security or Federal Identification Number on the return?
- Will the preparer represent me if the IRS audits my return? If so, will there be an extra charge?

The preparer should not guarantee you a refund before completing your return nor suggest that you take non-existent deductions or commit other dishonest acts. The preparer should not ask you to sign a blank return or one completed in pencil.

And remember, although you hire someone to prepare your return, you are personally liable for any additional tax, interest, or penalty. That threat alone should spur all taxpayers to hire the most competent and honest tax preparer available for the money!

Call On The IRS For FREE Tax Help

Toll-Free Hot Lines: Call the toll-free number, listed in your income tax packet for an answer to any question. They won't ask your name, so anonymity is guaranteed.

1-800-484-FORM: Call for forms or free publications on more than 90 tax topics. Highly recommended are IRS Publication 920 "An Explanation of the Tax Reform Act," and IRS Publi-cation 17 "Your Federal Income Tax." (You'll also find an order blank for forms and publications in your tax packet.)

Tele-Tax Service: Check your tax packet for the Tele-Tax Number in your area. The tollfree Tele-Tax Service gives you access to about 150 recordings on various tax topics.

Walk-In Service: Feel free to drop in at your local IRS District Office to ask questions or to attend self-help classes. The IRS operates more than 500 walk-in offices.

VITA: If you know a senior citizen needing tax counseling, call your local tax assistance number to enlist the help of a local, specially trained community-service volunteer.

IRS Service By Mail: If you make under \$50,000 per year, you can send your signed return to the IRS with your W-2 wage statement attached, and income and expense informa-tion filled in. When you mail your return by April 15, the IRS will figure your taxes for you. Check your tax packet for details

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INSPECTION KEEPS SKIES SAFE - The Flight Technology Department has been selected by the Federal Aviation Administration for a safety and regulation compliance inspection known as the National Aviation Safety Inspection Program. Since the department conducts an FAA Approved Pilot Training program, it is monitored, regulated, and controlled by the FAA. This national inspection was mandated by Congress, to address safety considerations in the national air transportation systems and helps programs, such as the one at LCC, identify and correct potential weaknesses.

The inspection team will consist of FAA inspectors selected from FAA regional offices around the country. LCC falls into the FAA's Northwest/Rocky Mountain Region consisting of seven Northwestern states. The FAA is selecting a major airline, a commuter/regional airline, and an FAA approved flight school in each of its six regions. Those selected in our region include United Airlines, Denver; Horizon Airlines, Portland; and LCC Flight Technology.

Flight Technology Department Head Terry Hagberg says that he appreciates these inspections, and "it's because of this extensive inspection process, that when you board a flight crewed by LCC grads, you can expect your trip to be safe."

We are happy to announce our first trophy for our newly established forensics team--a first place in extemporaneous speaking-awarded to William Becones, who earned a perfect score competing with University of Oregon and Carroll College students (among others) in his final speaking round. Neuschwander, Spiker, and Jones also earned first and second rankings in preliminary speaking rounds of extemporaneous speaking and dramatic interpretation.

The LCC team will compete again in April, thanks to ASLCC's generous support for our activities.

STUDENTS HOST CONFERENCE - The Sigma Zeta Chapter of LCC is hosting the 1988 West/Northwest Regional Conference of Phi Theta Kappa this Saturday and Sunday, February 13 and 14, at Nendels Motel. Sigma Zeta is the local chapter of the national community college honor society Phi Theta Kappa.

In 1984-85, credit headcount enrollment in community, technical, and junior colleges represented 41 percent of all undergraduate students in the United States. Community, technical, and junior colleges were the colleges of choice for 55 percent of all first-time freshman in the fall of 1984.

Last year, more than 29,000 community residents took classes at LCC. Students ranged in age from 12 to 80 years.

HOUSING SUIT SETTLED

LCC received a check for \$124,515 in an out-of-court settlement in a lawsuit against Adult Student Housing Inc. (ASH) of Portland. The non-profit organization ASH built the apartment complex Ashlane in 1972 with a low-interest loan from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, and agreed to rent to LCC students at regulated rates. It also agreed that the apartments would be deeded to the College when the HUD loan was retired in the year 2013. In 1984, when ASH became a for-profit corporation it took back the deed being held in escrow for LCC. The College filed a suit in 1986 seeking return of the deeds to escrow and the property to the College in the year 2013. After negotiation, ASH agreed to pay LCC an amount equal to the estimated value of the apartments in the year 2013--\$1.1 million--discounted to the present. The money has been placed in an interest-bearing account until a recommendation can be made regarding its use.

Subject: Serial Levy Update, 1987-88

Last summmer, the Board of Education was asked to review the projects which we believed should be funded as a result of the 1987-88 Serial Levy approval. Since that time we have identified one project, namely Administrative Recarpeting, 2nd Floor, which could be placed on a "hold status." At this time those monies associated with that project can be more appropriately utilized to fund the following handicapped accessibility items:

- 1. Automatic door openers for the two main outside entrances to the cafeteria dining areas.
- 2. Main outside entrance on the east side of the Center-2nd floor.
- 3. Fourteen restroom doors throughout the Center Building.

Included for your review is an up-to-date status report on all of the projects which were discussed at the August Board meeting. Since time is of the essence for these improvements, we would like to proceed with the projects which reflect the highest priority needs of the campus. The three items which are outlined above are as a result of our recognizing what is in the best interest of the campus as a whole in light of the limited financial resources. We are currently engaged in discussions regarding the use of next year's serial levy funds, and we will inform you of our recommendations as soon as a list of the projects is developed.

BOARD NEWS

At last week's board meeting, action was taken to have the College continue to operate on the quarter calendar. For budgetary reasons, the Board suspended the Insurance Adjusting Program, effective at the end of spring term. The door was left open, however, to restoring all or part of the program in the future and moving it to the Business Department. In other business, the Board took no action on a proposal to split LCC's present tuition scholarships into smaller amounts in order to share the money with a larger number of students. Associated Students of LCC vigorously opposed the proposal, which would have cut full-time grants of six ASLCC officers. Athletics and Performing Arts students would have been among gainers of the shared monies.

The Board accepted the resignation of Robert M. Blucher from the Data Processing program. He has been at LCC since 1976; he now is taking classes at the University of Oregon, teaching at the U of O, and doing some writing. Tamara Pinkas, marketing specialist in Training and Development, moves to a job as CWE coordinator.

BUDGET PROBLEM AGAIN UPON US

If you missed last Thursday's all-staff meeting, you should know that next fiscal year's budget probably will be between \$600,000 and \$1 million short of what we need to operate present programs and services. Dick Hillier, vice president for Administrative Services, said the College is studying ways to cut costs; he suggested that staff share ideas through department heads. One possible source of new income is voter approval this spring of a new tax base. The Board of Education will consider putting a measure before voters at the March or April meetings.

COURSEWARE DEMONSTRATION

School Futures representative Gene Small will be on campus Thursday, February 25, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., demonstrating interactive videodisc courseware in room 423C of the Center Computer Lab.

Interactive videodisc technology combines the power of the computer with the realism of video. A typical system includes a videodisc player, color monitor, and frequently, a microcomputer. The technology permits individualized, self-paced instruction with discriminate feedback.

The demonstration will feature courseware produced by Health EduTech, Inc. This company produces and markets generic and custom interactive videodisc programs in three main areas: HEALTH--addressing current public requirements, such as safety and AIDS education; EDUcation--emphasizing adult basic skills, particularly in reading and math; and TECHnology--focusing on the use of the personal computer. The math series, which ranges from basic math to applied algebra, also features both English and Spanish audio tracks.

WATCH FOR ERRORS

When you get your medical bill, look it over thoroughly. Mistakes can happen. Check accuracy of your name, address, group and identification numbers. Look at the services or supplies on the bill to see that you aren't billed for services or supplies you didn't receive. For example, you might have been charged for x-rays or lab tests that were ordered but later cancelled. It's not unheard of for someone to accidentally be billed for services that someone else has received. Finally, add up the figures yourself to make sure there are no mathematical errors.

If you do find a mistake, let your doctor or hospital know about it right away. If they agree, they can either send you a corrected billing, or you can cross out the incorrect item, and indicate on the billing that it is an error with your signature or initials beside the incorrect item. Then resubmit the bill to your insurance carrier for payment. If your doctor's office or hospital does not agree, you can call the claims department of your insurance carrier for assistance. FUTURE BUSINESS LEADERS COMPETE

About 300 students plus 30 teachers and parents were on campus last Saturday for the high school Future Business Leaders of America district office skills competition. Representatives from 17 high schools in this area competed for the right to go to state and national office skills competitions. This was the second consecutive year that LCC hosted the district contest, and the second year that it was facilitated by Greg Harpole of LCC's Office Administration faculty. That's the program which won the 1987 State Department of Education award as best postsecondary vocational program in Oregon.
