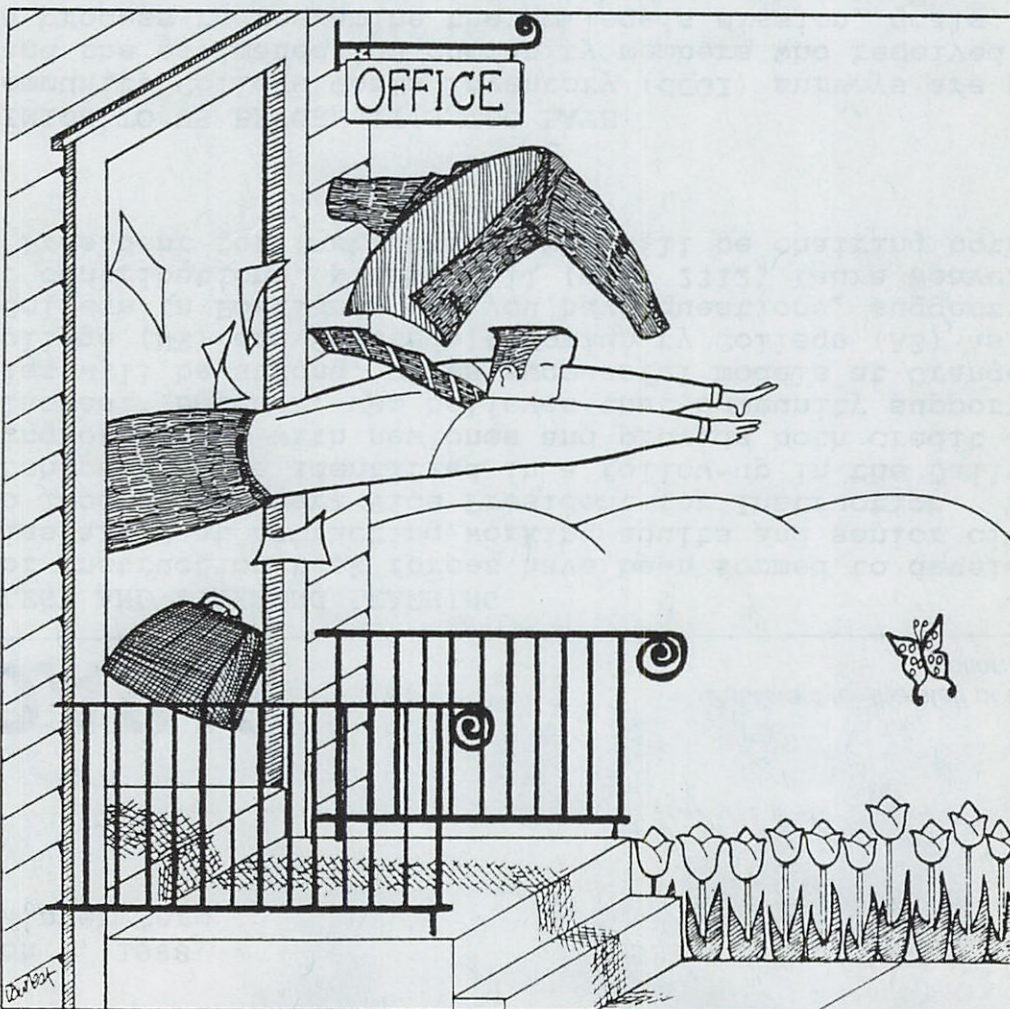

## IMPROVE YOUR HEALTH

A new class, WELLNESS AND HEALTH ASSESSMENT FOR EMPLOYEES, begins March 30 and is open to all LCC employees. It will meet once a week on Wednesdays from 4 to 5 p.m. in Health Tech 269 and will combine lectures with personal health assessments. The class is for employees who want to examine, maintain, or improve their present levels of health and fitness. Through personal analyses, everyone attending the class will be given the information and the means to carry out their own plan.

Lectures, delivered by LCC faculty and staff, will include: wellness dimensions; stress management; lower back fitness; smoking cessation; alcohol and drug dependency; nutrition; weight loss; health risks; physical fitness; and cholesterol and cardiac risk factors.

INNOVATOR OF THE YEAR AWARD

The League for Innovation in the Community College has created an award that is designed to recognize League College staff members who have designed and implemented a significant innovation during this past year. The recognition is known as the Innovator of the Year Award and is given annually to one individual from each of the 17 League member college districts. Any current Lane Community College employee, part-time or full-time, may be considered for the award.

The recipient of the Innovator of the Year Award will receive a plaque from the League for Innovation to be presented at an appropriate LCC function. The award winner will also be featured in the League publication, Innovator.

Last year's award went to Ms. Linda Riepe, Instructor and Coordinator for the Early Childhood Education Program, who developed a new degree program designed to train nannies, making LCC the first community college in the country to provide such a two-year degree program.

The deadline for nominations is April 22, 1988.

## CALL FOR NOMINATIONS

### WHO MAY NOMINATE?

Nominations may come from anyone either inside or outside the College.

### WHAT ARE THE SELECTION CRITERIA?

The award will be given to an individual who has designed and implemented a significant innovation at LCC. The League has established the following criteria for making the selection from among nominees. PLEASE NOTE THAT ONE OR MORE OF THE CRITERIA SHOULD BE MET, BUT IT IS NOT NECESSARY THAT ANY NOMINEE SHOULD MEET ALL CRITERIA.

1. Quality - Students and/or staff agree that the innovation increases quality in the course program, office, or institution. Evidence of quality may include student ratings or letters of support from colleagues.
2. Efficiency - There is evidence that the innovation or outstanding program contributes to a more efficient way of doing things. Student ratings, perceptions of outside consultants, and pre- and post-comparison of time involved are examples of evidence.



3. Cost effectiveness - There is evidence that the innovation adds a value to the institution while at the same time containing or reducing costs. Cost data will serve as evidence.
4. Replication - The program selected can be used by other institutions with a minimum of difficulty. The description of the program should include any conditions necessary for replication.
5. Creativity - The selected program should be as original as possible or the adaptation should at least be creative. The description of the program or letters from experts are examples of evidence.
6. Timeliness - The award-winning program should not be more than five years old at that institution, but it must have been around long enough to have been tested so that it meets most of the criteria.

#### HOW WILL THE WINNER BE SELECTED?

LCC's Innovator of the Year Award Selection Committee will review the nomination and supporting materials and select one award winner by May 16. The Committee will invite and encourage high-quality nominations, and in the event no nominations are deemed to be of a caliber worthy of nationwide recognition, no award will be made.

The Selection Committee consists of the four most recent recipients of the Innovator of the Year award. They are: Ms. Velma Jesser, Business Department (1984), Mr. Bill Mullins, Social Science (1985), Dr. Daniel Hodges, Counseling Department (1986), and Ms. Linda Riepe, Home Economics, Mr. Larry Warford, League Representative, chairs the Committee.

#### HOW ARE NOMINATIONS MADE?

Nominations should consist of the name and department of the innovator and a one-page description of the project, process, item, or activity supported by relevant materials. If materials are visual, or in some other form, it may be necessary for the nominee to make arrangements for the Award Selection Committee to have access for viewing purposes.

## COLLEGE GOES FOR TAX BASE

Last week the LCC Board of Education voted unanimously to ask voters at the May primary election to add an additional \$2.9 million to the LCC tax base. If approved, the tax base would increase to \$16,325,049 from this year's \$13,377,839. Approval of the tax base would increase the property tax rate by 30 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation above the 1988-89 rate, or from \$2.02 per \$1,000 to \$2.32. A person with a \$50,000 home would pay an additional \$15 in property taxes. Just under \$1 million of the tax base would go to balance next year's budget. The remainder would be used to restore some services and positions eliminated in last year's \$2.2 million budget cuts and to improve instructional programs, replace equipment and develop new programs. The College hopes to gain some long-term financial stability through the tax base and eliminate the need to go to the voters for yearly operating levies.
