# PIGEONS MIGHT BE CHEAPER

New postage rates are in effect as of April 3. Highlights of the rate package, in addition to the 25 cent first-class postage rate, include:

- A 21 cent rate for regular presorted first-class mail and 19.5 cents for carrier route presorted first-class mail.
- 15 cents for post and postal cards.
- A rate increase of 25 percent for third-class regular bulk mail.
- Express mail letter rate of \$8.75 for expedited letters weighing up to eight ounces.
- New zip + 4 discounts for third-class mail.
- New postal rates for international mail. The basic air mail rate for letters will increase from 44 cents to 45 cents per half ounce up to two ounces.
- Changes have altered registered mail, return receipt, certified mail, insurance and other special services--domestic mail only.

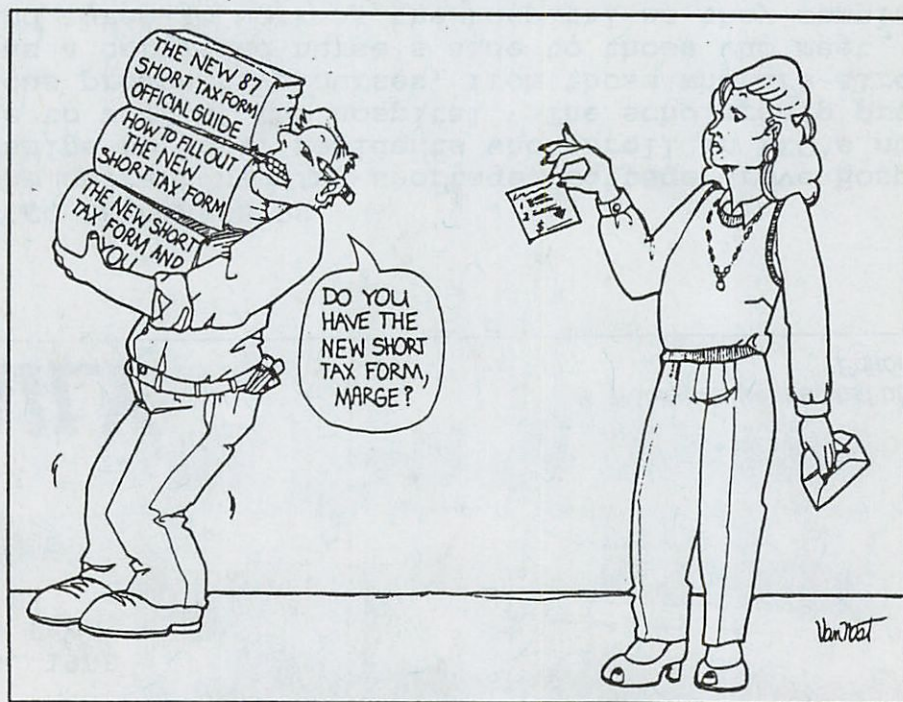

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

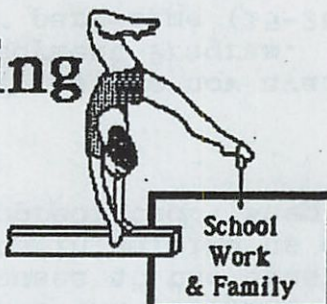

# LCC TO PARTICIPATE IN INTERNATIONAL EVENT

LCC will participate in a model project encompassing athletics and "Citizen Diplomacy" the first week in May. At this time, Soviet athletes will visit the United States to participate in the second half of an exchange sponsored by the Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges.

The first half of the exchange took place last July when 18 student-athletes from several Oregon and Washington community colleges traveled to the Soviet Union. (LCC sent four student-athletes.) They traveled to Moscow, Leningrad, and Minsk where they met and socialized with Soviet young people, attended lectures and workshops by Soviet physical education instructors, and toured places of cultural and historical significance. They also had the opportunity to compete in track meets on teams composed of athletes from each country.

Eighteen student-athletes from the Ukraine region of the Soviet Union will visit Eugene, Portland, and Spokane, May 1 through May 15. During their visit they will participate in several community events including spending an entire day on the LCC main campus where they will attend classes and plant a friendship tree. A Community Fun Run/Walk will be held in their honor on May 3. (See below.) 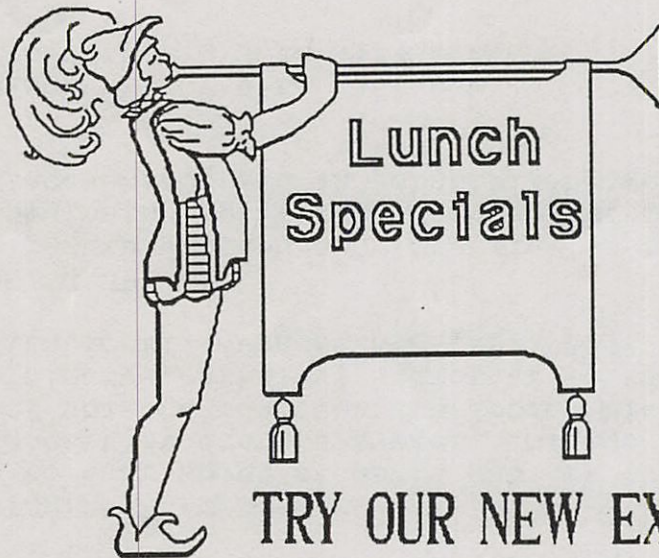

## TAX BASE UPDATE

Taxpayers are asked to allow LCC to establish a new tax base of \$16,325,049 at the May 17 election. The new tax base would go into effect at the start of the 1988-89 fiscal year on July 1, and would result in an estimated LCC tax rate of \$2.32 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. That is 30 cents more than the 1987-88 rate of \$1.91, plus the 6 percent constitutionally permitted increase of 11 cents.

The owner of a \$60,000 home would pay an additional \$18 in LCC taxes next year if the new tax base is approved or an estimated total of \$139.20. Currently, the owner of a \$60,000 home pays an estimated \$121.20.

During 1987-88, some 65 positions were eliminated and \$2.2 million cut from the operating budget. For the year beginning July 1, 1988, the college will eliminate 35 additional positions and reduce programs and services by almost \$1.4 million. Major cuts will be made in mechanics, college-level courses taught in the high schools, and dental hygiene. The cuts reflect rising costs and reduced state and federal support.

If the new tax base is approved, \$352,539 of the reductions will be restored. Additional monies would be spent for normal cost increases, updating and upgrading programs and services crucial to maintaining the college's quality, and establishing a contingency fund to provide fiscal stability over the next three to four years.

If the tax base does not pass, the College estimates that it also will have to cut an additional \$1 million in programs and services in 1989-90.
