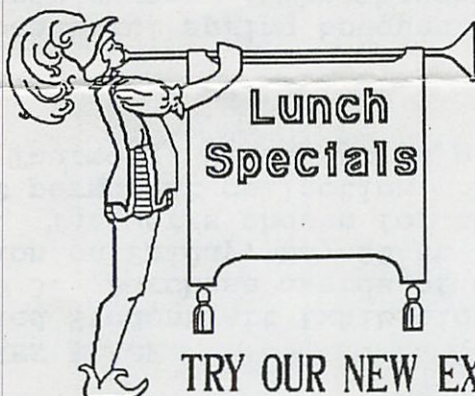

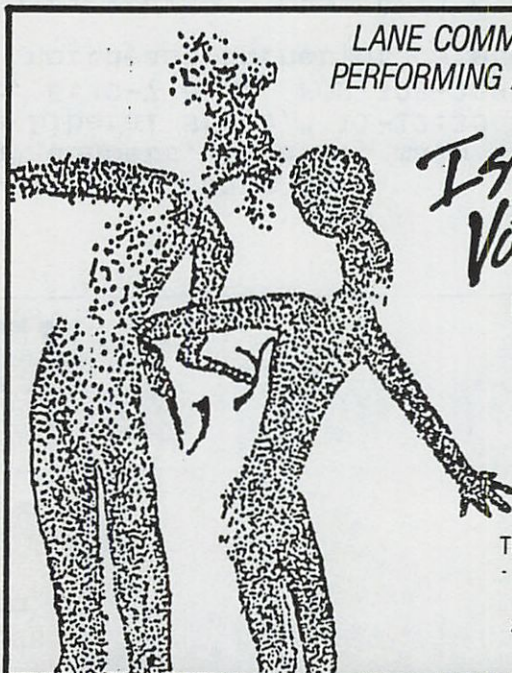

## BOARD NEWS

New scholarships will be available to students entering LCC in 1988-89 as a result of LCC Board of Education action last Wednesday. The scholarships will be funded from the \$500,000 donation Wayne Shields made last October. Scholarships, in the amount of \$500, will be given to students from twenty-three high schools, six students from High School Completion, and to twenty-one students entering vocational programs at LCC. In addition, the funds from the General Fund which were previously designated for Board scholarships will be reallocated for 1988-89 to provide six full tuition scholarships to ASLCC officers, twenty-four \$330 scholarships for students in Performing Arts, forty-eight \$330 scholarships for students in Athletics.

### INNOVATOR CHOSEN

Thomas Wayne, instructor in the science department, has been named LCC's League for Innovation "Innovator of the Year." Wayne was nominated for his work in developing a student database that reorganizes data obtained from LCC's mainframe computer to promote student success. The system also will increase the ability to predict future enrollment patterns and adjust staff assignments. Examples of information that can be obtained from the database are:

1. Peak dropout times for science classes.
2. Variation in peak dropout times among science classes.
3. Number of drops that result from switching classes.
4. Number of students who drop a science class one term and re-enroll in science the following term.
5. Relationship between dropout rates and science course grades.
6. Effect of late enrollment on science grades.
7. Prerequisites and student success in subsequent science courses.
8. Relationship between grade earned and enrollment in sequential science courses.

The award is given annually to one individual from each of the 16 League member college districts. It recognizes a staff member who has designed and implemented a significant innovation during the past year.

### OF NOTE

- Larry Warford, Executive Dean, is developing a project on Customized Contract Training in League Colleges. He will be using the Delphi technique to survey chief executive officers, chief academic officers, and contract training personnel to determine League colleges' philosophy, benefits and advantages, curriculum, and staffing for contract training. The League for Innovation in the Community College is an national consortium of 16 community college districts. The League, to which LCC belongs, was founded in 1968 to stimulate innovation and experimentation.

- LCC has been awarded a three-year grant to develop a national clearinghouse for apprenticeship-related programs. The federal grant, totaling nearly \$300,000, will fund the establishment of an electronic database that can be accessed from locations throughout the country, making available hard-to-find materials for colleges.

### PLANNING TASK FORCE UPDATE

The Planning Task Force met on Thursday, May 12, to review feedback gathered from staff on the identified trends and issues. The group also heard the results of the Community College Goals Inventory study and the Board of Education's Community Forum. In addition, the task force discussed key values or unifying principles which were expressed by LCC staff. The task force formed the following four sub-groups:

- Unifying Principles
- Mission Statement
- Trends and Issues
- LCC Response/Strategies

# DAY

May 30

## HOW IT ALL BEGAN

Memorial Day actually started on an April morning in 1863. The place: Columbus, Missouri. The Civil War was still raging as a group of women came to the cemetery to decorate the graves of their soldier dead. The lengthy war made their task even more grim.

An elderly woman finished decorating the graves of her two sons, then walked toward two mounds at the corner of the cemetery. Another woman stopped her. "What are you doing?" she asked. "Those are the graves of two Union soldiers."

"I know," replied the elderly woman as she spread flowers on the graves. "I also know that somewhere in the North a mother or a young wife mourns for them as we do for ours." She faced the other women and continued, "They are dead, our heroes of the South; and they are dead, these unknown soldiers of the North. All of them are lying here in our churchyard. When the war is over and peace comes, we shall call all of them heroes. We want someone to do this for our loved ones in nameless graves. We must do it for these in our cemetery."

Four years later, this story appeared in the *New York Tribune*. Afterward, it was reprinted in papers across the country. It was accepted as the first effort to replace the hatred of war with peace.

In 1868, the National Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic issued an order designating May 30th as a day to decorate the graves of all who had fallen in the war.

One hundred and twenty years have passed since that proclamation. Decoration Day has grown into Memorial Day, a day to pause and remember the price paid for our freedom. On Memorial Day we honor not only the dead of the Civil War, but the Spanish-American War, World War I, World War II, Korean War, the war in Vietnam, and all those who gave their lives defending freedom on our behalf around the world.

The sad thing is that in years to come, there could be other wars and other graves to decorate ... unless all the people of the world work toward peace. Let's make this our hope and our prayer.
