AWARDS MADE

Two LCC departments have received awards from The Eldon G. Schafer Endowment for Innovation to support significant experimental projects. The Industrial Technology Department received \$4,542 to explore the feasibility of developing an aqua culture business in conjunction with private industry. The business would focus on catfish farming which is lucrative in other states but has not yet been introduced in Oregon as a viable business venture. Department Head Carl Horstrup said, "The funding will allow the department to design a catfish farming prospectus and to design and develop classes and/or workshops relating to catfish farming. A catfish farm would produce tuition income, provide employment to LCC students through Cooperative Work Experience, and possibly offer low-cost or free catfish to LCC's cafeteria and Food Service Program."

The Data Processing Department received \$3,620 to research and develop a computer competency graduation requirement for all LCC students in associate degree programs and to develop an experience-based, self-study version of Concepts of Computing, an entry-level computer course. The proposal addresses the growing need for computer literacy.

The Schafer Endowment was established in April, 1985. Eldon G. Schafer served as president of LCC from 1970 to 1985. The endowment, which is administered by the LCC Foundation, seeks to continue the heritage of innovation and the superb quality of instruction and support services left as a benchmark by the president-emeritus. This includes those students planning to take classes under the G6 (post baccalaureate undergraduate) classification. Any admissible applicant whose application is postmarked after July 15, 1988 may choose from the following options:

1. Students may be placed on a waiting list for Fall 1988 and be admitted for Winter 1989. Those on the waiting list will be considered for Fall term admission on a space available basis.
2. Students may cancel their application and request refund of their \$25 application fee.
3. Students are encouraged to consider applying to other Oregon State System colleges and universities.

BEFORE YOU SIGN ANY PETITION THIS YEAR, BE SURE TO READ IT

Signatures are being collected on three initiatives which could impact LCC employees. Collectors hope to get them on the November 1988 ballot. One would require state income taxes on Public Employee Retirement System (PERS) pensions. A second, the McIntire Initiative, is Oregon Taxpayers United's sixth attempt to amend Oregon's constitution to limit property taxes for schools. This proposal reduces property tax for schools to one-half of one percent by 1993. No source for the rest of needed monies for schools is suggested. A third initiative would limit state spending to the rate of growth of personal income in Oregon. It could be a major obstacle to increasing state support for schools.

J. WADE GILLEY, FINALIST FOR CHANCELLOR, KNOWS LCC
