# LCC RECEIVES GRANT

Lane Community College has learned that it will receive a \$198,680 grant from the U.S. Department of Education. The grant is funded through Title III of the Higher Education Act of 1965 and is for the purpose of strengthening the College in three important areas.

Projects include 1) assistance in the development of a management information system for curricular and fiscal analysis and decision-making; 2) establishment of a student success center, focusing on the needs of higher risk students; and 3) creation of a computer writing lab to help students improve writing skills.

The award is for the first year of a three-year project; therefore, the College hopes to receive a similar amount in each of two succeeding years. Grant funds cannot be used to support on-going, existing operations of the college, but must be used to improve the institution. Funds will become available at the beginning of the federal fiscal year, October 1.

"Title III funding is one of the most sought after sources of federal funding for community colleges because it supports new projects that will make an institution stronger, better prepared for the future," explained President Richard M. Turner, III. "Our application focuses on key developmental areas of the College, beyond the scope of our current funding. We are pleased to be able to move forward with these vital programs."

ACTING PRESIDENT WANTS PROGRESS ON PRIORITIES John E. "Jack" Carter, who is expected to be appointed Acting President tonight by LCC's Board of Education, says he'll continue his basic approach at LCC over the past 21 years--that of quietly working with others to make things happen.

He wants to continue activities focused on the improvement of learning, financial stability of the College, planning the College's future direction, and revitalizing "the enthusiasm that has always been here."

He knows staff throughout the College will be looking for ways to help learning occur. "It's not limited to what goes on in the classroom," he says. "We all can have a positive impact on learning."

The teaching process will have his full support. "We can instruct, but nothing much happens unless there's learning as a result." He wants to see activities toward that end continued and strengthened.

Though he sees an updated tax base as a necessity to stabilize finances, he thinks past cuts have to be accepted. "I wouldn't see us trying to get back what we've had to cut in the last two years."

Planning the College's future direction is well underway and will involve most staff during the September in-service program. The Board of Education has worked on this, as has a Planning Task Force, and community input has been solicited in a survey and at public forums, Carter said.

"LCC should continue to be a place where it's fun and exciting for students to come and learn, and for staff to work," he says. "I know the staff believes this, too. There's a lot of positive energy here; I'd like to see us build on that."

Except for time spent working on the family cattle and fruit farm plus several summers in sawmills, Carter, 57, has devoted his life to education. The first third was spent in Riddle schools, at Southern Oregon State College at Ashland, where he earned a bachelor of science in elementary education in 1954, and at University of Oregon, where he received a master's in education in 1963.

His 34 years in teaching and administration have been in Lane County. Carter joined the Oakridge School District in 1954 as a fifth and sixth grade teacher. Three years later he transferred to the junior high school to teach language arts, social science, math, physical education and to help coach football, basketball and track.

He became vice principal of the Oakridge junior-senior high school in 1963 and principal two years later, leaving in 1967 to join LCC. He served as Director of Student Activities for three years until 1970 when he became Vice President and Dean of Student Services.

He and his wife, Ilene, who is currently on leave from a job as secretary at Gilham School in Eugene, have two sons, two daughters, and two grandchildren. They reside in Santa Clara.

# BOARD WRAP-UP

Last week's LCC Board of Education meeting produced a new management contract agreement. Management will receive a 4.37 percent increase, a half step, and an extra \$50 a month into the annuity plan. The Board unanimously agreed to accept a bid for the lease/purchase of a modular classroom for the Child Care Program. The resignations of Beth Edwards, Health Occupations, and President Richard M. Turner, III, were accepted. Jack Carter was approved to serve as Interim/Acting President of LCC beginning August 2 until the effective appointment date of a new permanent President. Board member Larry Perry was elected board chair and member Jim Pitney was elected board vice chair. Vice President Carter reported that noncredit enrollment is down slightly and thought that the renovation of the Downtown Center was influential; credit enrollment is slightly up from last year. The Board approved the appointment of individuals to the various College advisory committees.

SENIOR COMPANION PROGRAM DIRECTOR NAMED Mark Chambers has been appointed director of the Senior Companion Program. Chambers comes to Lane County from Bend, where he served as director of the Area Agency on Aging.

LCC is the sponsor for the Program which is a branch of "Action's Older American Volunteer Programs" that includes Foster Grandparents and Retired Senior Volunteer Program. The Program's mission is to recruit, train and provide a small stipend to low-income persons over 60 years old, who are then assigned to social service and health care agencies throughout Lane County.

One of Chamber's major objectives is to increase local support for the Senior Companion Program. "A Program with such a favorable cost-to-benefit ratio deserves community support," Chambers said.
