JACKSON COUNTY CC TABLED

The proposal to allow residents of Jackson County (Medford, Ashland, etc.) to vote on establishing a new community college has been tabled by the State Board of Education. Residents wanted to ask voters to approve a tax levy of 20 cents per \$1,000 of property value. Michael Holland, Commissioner for the Office of Community Colleges, said it would cost at least 65 cents. He declined to recommend a college without assurance of at least minimal local funding.

I realize that there may be some concern with the additional costs involved in moving our annual All Staff meeting to the Eugene Conference Center next Monday, September 19. Perhaps the following information will help to alleviate some of those concerns.

This year, during Inservice, all staff members are being asked to provide input into the Collegewide goals and objectives. This is part of the schedule approved by the Board of Education for establishing the College Plan. As you recall, surveys were sent throughout the College District asking for response concerning educational and training needs of the community to provide direction for the future of the College. Community input was requested during the Community Forum, held in April. Now, as part of the total process, the Board is waiting for a summary of ideas and suggestions from staff prior to their final deliberations and decisions on these issues.

The Board has authorized that the campus be closed on Monday, September 19, until 1:00 P.M. so that all staff can participate in the All Staff session during Inservice. There is no space on campus that can hold the total number of small groups of all staff in the seating arrangement needed for discussion and gathering information. The Conference Center is better suited to the type of work session. Since a continental breakfast will be served, there is no rental charged for the facility. The extra cost (compared with the usual Fall breakfast on campus) of \$8-900 did not seem out of line, since this larger facility can be utilized for both the breakfast and the work session.

All staff are encouraged to participate in this important work session from 7:30 - 12:00 on Monday, September 19. Free parking is available in the area. If you are unable to attend, please notify your department chair or supervisor prior to that date.
