CREDIT HEADCOUNT UP TO 7,100

Evidence continues to mount in support of the contention that LCC enrollment will be up fall term. The credit headcount reached 7,100 as of Friday, September 30, according to Interim Vice President Bob Marshall. At the end of fall term 1987, it was 7,200, Marshall said, suggesting that it could yet climb this fall to 7,700 or 7,800. The full-time equivalency (FTE) count was up 75 as of Friday, September 23. It appears that the College is on track to reach and surpass the 7,555 FTE projected for 1988-89. As for non-credit enrollment, no numbers are in yet, but officials have the impression that the total will exceed that of fall term 1987.

CC CONFERENCE COMING UP



This is an \$8 million item in Governor Goldschmidt's budget to be presented to legislature this coming January. According to the Legislature's Feasibility Study, the purpose of Ed-Net is:

To strengthen Oregon's educational and economic infrastructure. Ed-Net would enhance current education, training and information activities of the organizations that use it. Using the network, organizations could deliver courses, data, information, meetings, etc. to virtually any location in Oregon. They could also access such resources from any location in Oregon and beyond.

The Ed-Net system proposes to serve: K-12 through university, libraries, business and industry, government agencies, community service organizations.



CLARIFICATION PROVIDED

Several times over the past several years, the question about the right of staff and students regarding political persuasion activities has come up. The following is provided to clarify these questions:

The law, (ORS 260.432) Solicitation of public employees; activities of public employees during working hours, provides that it is unlawful for persons to coerce employees to promote or oppose the nomination or election of a candidate or the adoption of a measure. The law specifically states, however, that this does not restrict the right of a public employee to express personal political views.

College legal counsel's position and the college practice is that it is fine for staff and students to wear buttons of their political persuasion on candidates or measures. Signs expressing political views are subject to college posting regulations. Staff and students are expected not to attempt to persuade others on political views during paid time or by use of college equipment, facilities, or property. In July, the American Institute for Foreign Study initiated contact with Jacquee Belcher, Vice President for Instruction. AIFS asked Vice President Belcher to take a leadership role in sharing information about AIFS with Oregon's community colleges. Dr. Belcher contacted a number of Oregon's larger to mid-size community colleges to share preliminary information about AIFS and discuss the possibility of forming a consortium to examine the feasibility of an AIFS linkage. The intent of such information sharing was to familiarize the colleges with AIFS and its College division which provides educational management services to U.S. colleges that wish to have their own educational program abroad. Five Oregon community colleges (Chemeketa, Clackamas, Lane, Mt. Hood, Portland) decided to meet for further exploration and discussion about establishing an international education consortium.

Vice President Belcher made periodic reports to Executive Council about discussions among the five colleges with and regarding AIFS. The presidents of all five colleges were aware of on-going discussions and gave preliminary approval for an international education consortium and approved continued contact with AIFS.

Following a series of meetings planned and coordinated by Dr. Belcher, these five colleges agreed that the AIFS proposal warranted further consideration. As a result, AIFS scheduled a site visit in London for the interested Oregon colleges. Site visits are part of the customary proposal AIFS submits to interested colleges/consortiums.

Representatives from Lane and Mt. Hood (one from each college) made up the site visit team; representatives from Chemeketa, Clackamas, and Portland were unable to attend during the time period established by AIFS for the site visit. The total cost of the site visit was paid by AIFS.

The purpose of the site visit was to allow interested colleges to examine AIFS college programs from every aspect: academic and instructional support programs, student and faculty support services, student and faculty accommodations, social and cultural activities, student enrichment programs, facilities, and adjunct faculty arrangements. The site visit team met with faculty, staff, and students; visited all facilities; attended classes; and became familiar with all auxiliary and support services.

AIFS developed a comprehensive and tightly planned agenda for the site visit, as well as making all travel and accommodation arrangements. AIFS planned the entire schedule for the 6-day site visit (September 24 to October 1 with two full days for air travel); the schedule permitted minimal discretionary time for site visit team members.

Representives from Chemeketa, Clackamas, Lane, Mt. Hood and Portland will continue to meet regarding the AIFS proposal. Vice PResident Belcher will continue to chair the group and to plan, coordinate, and facilitate meetings: The group will examine closely the benefits that would be available to the colleges involved, their faculty, and their students.

Certain information about potential benefits is already known. The colleges would retain complete academic control of any instructional program abroad involving AIFS, including selection of faculty, choice of courses/curriculum to be taught, and approval of adjunct faculty. All college credits earned by students would be part of the colleges' authorized course offerings and will appear on the participating students transcripts from their home institution. These arrangements allow students to make normal progress toward their instructional program while benefitting from international resources and crosscultural experiences. Students who participate can receive financial aid for study abroad. AIFS also provides a course on Life and Culture at no cost to the home institutions.

An integral part of the AIFS programs is the use of instructors from the "home" institutions. Faculty are selected by the home institutions to teach abroad. Faculty participation in international education programs offers significant professional development opportunities and is a major benefit.

Further information about AIFS is available in the Office of Instruction. Additionally, the LRC has a videotape about the AIFS London program that provides a program overview including student commentary. The videotape is available for anyone to view.

ELECTION UPDATE

As most of you know, LCC is asking voters at the November 8 election for permission to continue its present level of programs and services through at least the next three years. The request comes in the form of a proposal for a \$1.3 million increase in the college's tax base. If approved, the new base would go into effect next July 1, 1989. College officials estimate that the ballot proposal would cost property tax payers 19-cents per \$1,000 of assessed property value. The owner of a \$60,000 home would pay an estimated additional \$11.40 in LCC taxes for the 1989-90 year. Voters last approved a base for the college in 1980.

In the last two years, LCC cut back its operation by \$3.6 million, eliminating 89 full-time equivalent positions from its staff. None of the cuts will be restored. Without a new tax base, college officials say they will have to continue to cut back. About \$2.1 million, including 55 more staff positions, will have to be eliminated in the next three years. The request comes at a time when enrollment is stabilizing and a growth of five percent is forecast for the next three to four years. A recent survey showed that more than half of Lane County households have had one or more people enrolled at LCC in the last five years. A third of people contacted said they plan to take an LCC course in the immediate future. The new \$16.3 million base that would result from approval of the November 8 election measure provides that local taxes continue to be the largest source of college income. Local taxes supply 42 to 43 percent of operating revenue. The state pays 27 percent, the federal government about 9 percent, and tuition and fees make up the remaining 21 percent.

Barbara was recognized for her diplomacy and ability to find solutions to what often seems to be insurmountable problems.

BOARD WRAP-UP

The LCC Board of Education ratified the classified union contract last Wednesday. The three-year agreement will be retroactive to July, 1988 and provides, in addition to wage increases, improved insurance benefits and a \$150 bonus each year for employees on Step 8 who did not receive a step or bonus during the previous year. The Board also agreed to contract with Consultant Pat Fitzwater, of the Oregon School Boards Association, to assist with the presidential search. College Mission, Unifying Principles, Philosophy and College-wide Goals were formally adopted. KLCC was given the go ahead to pursue the construction of a transmitter in Newport. Finally, the Board confirmed the appointment of Lyn Francis and Aimee Phillips to the Transitions to Success Advisory Committee. Joella Ewing was appointed to the Nursing Programs Advisory Committee. All appointments continue through June 30, 1989.

LISTENERS END KLCC RADIOTHON IN RECORD TIME

Listeners of KLCC 89.7 FM pledged the most amount of money in the least days to end Radiothon in record time. The \$65,000 goal was reached eight and a half days after Radiothon began. The pre-Radiothon "Thonbuster Campaign" brought in \$12,100 from nearly 300 mail-in pledges. Then 1,405 phone pledges broght the grand total to \$65,000. This was KLCC's largest goal to date. A big thanks goes to all the listeners who pledged their hard-earned money, volunteers who staffed the phones at all hours and sorted through stacks of paperwork, the many wonderful businesses who offered an incredible variety of premiums as incentives to the listeners, and those businesses and listeners who provided food and moral support to the station.

DISNEY REP ON CAMPUS





TWO MILLION DOLLAR 'PAYROLL'

President Carter spoke to RSVP volunteers last Wednesday and shared some facts that other LCC people might be interested in knowing. The College has sponsored the Retired Senior Volunteer Program since July 1974. Some 800 people are on the volunteer roster. Portland, with its much larger population, only has 100 more. Lane volunteers work at 80 agencies, all non-profit or health care facilities. Their 141,164 hours a year equal the equivalent of 68 full-time people worth a payroll of about \$2 million. The two oldest volunteers are 92, the youngest 60. The in-betweens include six people who are 90 and five who are 89. In saluting them for their charity, President Carter quoted Rabindranath Tagore, who wrote: "I slept and dreamed that life is happiness. I awoke and saw that life is service. I served and found that in service happiness is found."

CONGRATULATIONS!

Instructor Leigh Bass, Emergency Medical Technician program, received a letter from the Oregon Board of Medical Examiners congratulating her on a job well done. The pass rate for students in Leigh's EMT IV class was 93 percent for both the written and practical exams—well above the state average of 71 and 55 percent. Additionally, the written scores were the highest ever recorded in the state for the EMT IV examination.

PROMOTION CEREMONY TOMORROW NIGHT

LCC will host a promotion ceremony for students completing training in the pilot program "New Jobs" Tuesday, November 1, at 7 p.m. in Forum 308. U.S. Representative Peter DeFazio will be the keynote speaker. The program, co-sponsored by LCC, the Southern Willamette Private Industry Council, and Adult and Family Services, provides training opportunities for welfare recipients and others, primarily females who are single heads-of-households, so that they may gain employment. Participants received six months of training in one of the following areas: office and accounting skills, health unit coordinator, or pharmacy technician. These areas were targeted in response to market research that showed there are job opportunities in these fields. Seven Oregon cities are participating in the "New Jobs" program.
