TWO SELECTED FOR LEADERS PROGRAM

Joan Adams, assistant director of Student Employment at LCC, and Lynne Swift, a counselor in the college's Dislocated Worker Program, have been chosen to participate in the "Leaders" program, an international leadership training program for two-year college women administrators. HELPFUL INFORMATION ABOUT W-4 FORMS

Although there is no requirement to refile Form W-4 Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate, you should review your withholding situation each year to be sure enough tax is being withheld. Employees whose personal situations have changed may need to file a new Form W-4. Changes that might make it necessary are changes in marital status, number of dependents, non-wage income (interest, dividends, capital gains, etc.), family income (more than one job or both spouses work), itemized deductions (if a significant change), or owing extra tax when you file your 1989 return. 



ENROLLMENT NEWS

The trend toward fewer full-time students continues at LCC. This is most evident in the population of credit students taking vocational preparatory classes. As the graph below illustrates, the percentage of vocational prep students taking a full-time load (12 or more credits per term) has fallen from 22 percent in 1982-83 to 13 percent in the fall of 1988. At the same time the percentage of part-time students (those taking five credits or less) has risen approximately 14 percent. A similar trend is occurring among lower division credit students. LCC data reflects state and national trends toward more part-time and fewer full-time students in community colleges. Marie Matsen, Institutional Research, Planning, and Evaluation.
