
ROLE MODELS


MR. PRESIDENT!



ALL THE NEWS THAT'S NEWS FROM KLCC

The people at KLCC have been busy making changes and additions, including:

* Significant changes in their program schedule. Some shows have been moved and others have undergone name changes. New shows include: **<u>Afropop</u>, a nationally produced program featuring the music

of contemporary Africa; **Sunday Brunch, a new call-in show highlighting family issues, hosted by KLCC volunteer, John Glassburner; and **Radio Arts Programming, featuring a potpourri of high-quality comedy, drama, and arts programs.

* Plans for a new 3000-watt noncommercial FM station at Otter Crest near Newport. KLCC currently serves Lincoln County with a translator. Because of the transmission limitations of translators, KLCC has decided to improve service to the coastal region by providing a full-service transmitter. The station has applied for a grant from the National Telecommunications and Information Administration. If received, the grant will fund 75% of the project. The remaining cost will be funded from a variety of sources including other grants and fundraising in Lincoln County.

* Installation of a translator in the Sisters/Black Butte area. This translator will serve a population of about 5,000. Listen in on 90.3 FM if you are traveling east.


* The addition of issue-oriented news coverage from Salem while the State Legislature is in session. KLCC and the members of the Consortium of Public Radio in Oregon are funding this public radio bureau with business underwriting. Reporter Stephanie Nutt has been hired to operate the bureau on a part-time basis, supplying consortium member stations with daily reports and weekly wrap-ups. KLCC is providing equipment for the capitol coverage.

It has been reported that a larger percentage of people in Lane County and parts of Douglas County listen to public radio than in any other part of the nation. Nine percent of all radio listeners are tuned in to KLCC and KWAX in Eugene and KSOR in Ashland at any given time. Program Director Don Hein reports that the KLCC usually has about 30,000 to 33,000 people tuned in. In making the numerous changes highlighted above, the station is endeavoring to persuade listeners to stay tuned longer and to tune in more often.

THE BUDGET

In a February 14 letter to staff, Interim President Jack Carter says LCC must cut \$1 million from its budget for the year beginning July 1. About \$750,000 will come from direct instructional budgets, and the other quarter million from instructional support, Administrative Services, Student Services, and the President's Office. Options to cutting back do not appear viable at this time. A full copy of his letter is attached.

As part of the budget process for FY89-90, budget managers were asked to submit program adjustment requests. This is money that would be used to meet the higher costs of present activities or to enhance them so as to get the job done more adquately. The requests totaled \$2.4 million. The amount available for allocation is expected to be \$250,000. Larry Romine, Institutional Advancement, ext. 2303.

LCC BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING REPORT Richard Romanek of Electronics and Edward W. Seabloom of Mathematics, both 21-year LCC faculty members, will retire at the end of the college year. Each helped shape both the institution and their respective departments. LCC's Board of Education accepted their resignations during the board meeting on February 8 and commended them for their service.

In other business, the Board approved a \$50,000 loan from the Bookstore to Food Services so that the latter can buy 18 vending machines and take over that service from a nonperforming vendor. Profits will be used to repay that service from a nonperforming vendor. Profits will be used to repay the loan. Name of the Cottage Grove and Florence outreach centers were changed to Lane Community College at Cottage Grove and Lane Community College, Siuslaw Center at Florence. Hufford Construction of Portland won a \$99,425 contract for building beam repair in the Auto/Diesel building. Pepsi-Cola of Eugene will sell soft drinks to Food Services at \$7.50 a case. Computerland of Portland won a \$34,445 contract to supply computer equipment and software to Printing/Graphics. Student Tiffeney Ross was appointed to the Graphic Design Advisory Committee. New member on the LCC Budget Committee is ex-ASLCC President Cindy Weeldreyer of Cottage Grove. Larry Romine, Institutional Advancement, ext. 2303.

WE'VE GOT THOSE OL' WINTER TERM UPS AND DOWNS



SMALL BUSINESS GRANT MAY BE THE LAST

The \$741,000 federal grant awarded to the Oregon Small Business Development Center Network (OSBDCN) based on LCC's Downtown Center will be the last if the Bush administration budget passes, according to comments of U.S. Rep. Ron Wyden during the grant presentation ceremony on February 14. "(Bush) zeroes out the SBDC program; but dollar for dollar, it's the best economic development tool in Oregon," said Wyden. Both he and U.S. Rep. Peter DeFazio are fighting to overturn the budget recommendation. This year's grant was the sixth consecutive award by the federal Small Business Administration to the OSBDCN. 
