ENROLLMENT DUE TO U.O. CAP PROBABLY SMALL

Newspaper reports speculating that the University of Oregon enrollment cap may be diverting students to LCC probably are premature. Diane Dann, chair of the Marketing Council, says in a February 28 report that analysis of enrollment doesn't necessarily back up the assertion. There is an enrollment growth in lower division transfer enrollment, but the surge is among part-time adult students rather than traditional younger full-time students. This is not peculiar to LCC; it's a national trend among community colleges. Further, there has been no increase in the percentage of students who indicate their ultimate educational goal as four-year or graduate degrees. LCC does have some students who didn't get into the U.O., but the extent of their presence awaits further investigation. D reached her conclusions after consultation with Institutional Research, Dann Planning and Evaluation staff.

FORMER LCC STUDENT HEADS UP NEW SECTION OF THE REGISTER-GUARD

Ann Van Camp, who earned an Associate Degree in Broadcast/Visual Design and Production from LCC in 1986, leads the team that assembles the Register-Guard's new weekly Community section.

The new Community section includes a regular feature on local culture or history;, a club calendar; a directory of local services; and wedding,

anniversary, and marriage news. The first issue was Monday, February 27. Van Camp was a reporter, columnist, and features editor for The <u>TORCH</u> while enrolled at LCC between 1983 and 1986. She earned a Bachelor's Degree in Journalism from the University of Oregon in 1988, and also worked

part-time for the <u>Springfield News</u> for 18 months. Several other former LCC journalism students work in county media. The <u>Register-Guard</u> employs Janelle Hartman, covering Cottage Grove; Karen Irmsher, writing the nationally syndicated house design feature; and Terry The Rhoads, writing sports news. The Register-Guard recently also employed Ron Goldberg, who joined the <u>Ketchican Daily News</u> last month. <u>Springfield News</u> employs Val Brown and Vicki Pittaluga as production specialists. <u>Oregon</u> Daily Emerald employs Julie Crist, editing special supplements; Julie was last year's TORCH editor. What's Happening employs Robert Wolfe as a columnist. The Oregonian employes Kathleen Monje as Lane County correspondent. School District 4-J employs Kelly Fenely as public information specialist. ### DOES LCC NEED INNOVATION?

Innovation is responsible for between one-half and two-thirds of the increase in U.S. productivity over the last 40 years. During the last 20 years, innovation has accounted for nearly 40 percent of the growth in the nation's GNP. Those figures come from a Merce & Co., Rahway, N.J., publication and were quoted in the February 20, 1989, issue of The Ragan Report. Elsewhere, it has been reported that more than 90 percent of innovations fail, but that organizations that don't innovate die.

ELECTRONIC SERVICES BECOMES AUTHORIZED PANASONIC SERVICE CENTER The Electronic Services Department was recently designated a Panasonic Authorized Service Center. The department will repair on-campus industrial video and audio Panasonic equipment. In addition, the department has acquired the final test equipment needed to repair on-campus professional cameras, camcorders and related equipment. These changes will save costs incurred by LCC for outside repair services.

## KLCC BEGINS SPRING RADIOTHON

KLCC begins its spring radiothon Thursday, March 9, at 7:30 p.m. The membership campaign takes place every spring and fall, and is the largest source of funding for KLCC. This spring's goal is \$65,000.

# LCC SPEECH STUDENT WINS TOURNAMENT

LCC RECEIVES \$4,500 GRANT TO DEVELOP COMPUTER NETWORK

LCC Electronic Services has received a \$4,500 grant from NOVELL, Inc. for the installation and development of a computer network system. Next term, 30 existing computers in the Business Department lab will be linked by the NOVELL system. Electronics Services Chair Bob Vogel says he hopes to expand to a 50-computer network. Networks enable all linked personal computers to share data and software, saving the cost of purchasing duplicate programs for each user.

TEACHING EXCELLENCE AWARD TO BE GIVEN TO RIEPE

#### NATIONALLY ACCLAIMED ARTIST TO VISIT LCC

LCC will hold an exhibition by nationally renowned Boston artist and University of Massachusetts art professor, John Grillo, from March 27 -April 14, at the Art Department Gallery.

Grillo will conduct a slide-lecture on Monday, April 3 at 1 p.m. in Forum 308. A reception follows at 3 p.m., in the Art Department Gallery, sponsored by the ASLCC.

Art instructor Harold Hoy says Grillo is probably the most established artist ever to visit LCC. Grillo has 19 museum collections, nine corporate and foundation collections, 42 group exhibitions, 28 one-man exhibitions, and four awards and fellowships to his credit.

The LCC exhibit includes watercolors and black and white charcoal drawings. Many of the drawings are mural size, measuring 60 by 80 inches. About 17 pieces will be exhibited.

The visit was arranged by art instructor Satoko Okito, who studied with Grillo at the University of Massachusetts between 1983 and 1985. "I really admire him as an artist," says Okito. "What's really exciting about this show is that some of the pieces are from the forties and fifties when he was part of the American expressionist movement in New York. His slide-lecture will show his progression from abstract to representational, or figurative, work."

# USERS TELL HOW TO IMPROVE CLASS SCHEDULE

In March, small focus groups of students and others were asked to help LCC improve its class schedule. The focus group study, conducted by an independent research firm and funded with marketing money, included a number of useful recommendations.

Suggested things to change: convert from a loose page newspaper format to a stapled magazine format; make the cover more appealing; include a better table of contents and an index; make costs clearer by putting the actual cost by each class; have a tearout registration worksheet; and reduce or eliminate news and feature stories.

Suggested things to continue: have separate credit and noncredit sections; describe noncredit classes, but not credit classes; mail to all residents; and distribute for free.
