NEW TREE ON CAMPUS

A special tree was dedicated to late LCC administrator Hank Doua on Friday, March 31. The tree is a Dawn Redwood, or Metasequoia. Once thought to be extinct, one was found growing in a Buddhist Monastery in Central China. LCC's tree is a descendent. It will grow to be about 100 feet high, be a light, bright green turning to light bronze in the autumn, drop its needles in winter, and have smaller, softer cones than the California redwoods. The tree was donated by Mary Louise Doua.

OUR DROP SMALL BY COMPARISON

The western U.S. gets a break in estimates of the decline in the number of high school graduates between 1989 and 1994. The nation as a whole will see an 11 percent drop, from 2.7 million to 2.4 million. But the West will see a slight increase because California is expected to grow by 2 percent. The number of graduates is expected to drop 17 percent in the Northeast, by 15 percent in New York, by 16 percent in Illinois, and by 5 percent in Florida. 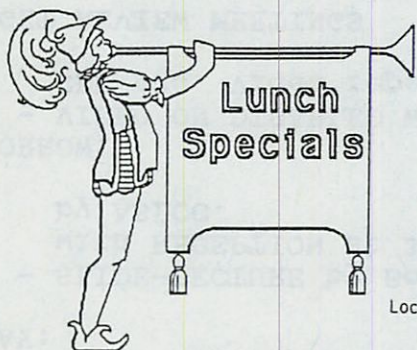

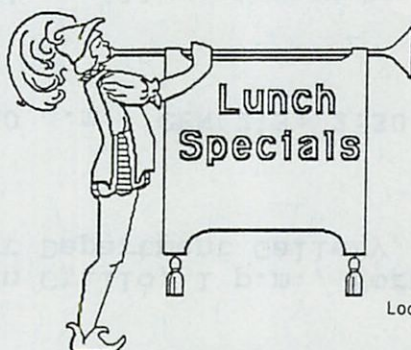

U.O.'S PLANS FOR DALE PARNELL ON LCC BOARD AGENDA

The University of Oregon's plans to honor Dale Parnell will be presented at the April 12 board meeting by Dr. Fielding E. Cooley of the U.O. College of Education. The University will present its first College of Education Outstanding Alumnus Award to Parnell, founding president of LCC, at its June commencement. The University also proposes to establish a Dale Parnell Chair for the Study of Community College Policy and Practice.

The U.O. says "Parnell is the recognized leader of the community college movement in this nation" and the driving force behind 2+2 programs which connect high school and community college curricula.

INTERIM ACCREDITATION STUDY UNDERWAY

A steering committee is working on an interim accreditation study in preparation for an October visit from the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges. This visit occurs five years after LCC's last full accreditation review and serves to reaffirm the college's accreditation standing. The interim study will focus on specific recommendations presented to the college in 1984, plus a series of questions posed by the Association. TRANSITIONS TO SUCCESS IS A SUCCESS

Transitions to Success Displaced Homemaker/Single Parent Program has graduated 253 women since its first term of operation in winter, 1987. Class retention averages 95%, with approximately 70% of the women who complete the six-credit-hour Transitions Class registering for additional classes the following term. Around 63% of the Transitions students who completed the class from the first group in winter, 1987, through fall, 1988, are continuing students. As a group, they have accumulated 3,441 credits as of December, 1988, with an average GPA of 3.54. Winter and spring term 1989 have added 78 more students to the program.

BOB WAY WINS AWARDS, PLANS TRAVEL

Cooperative Work Experience department head Bob Way will be installed as Vice President of Finance for the Cooperative Education Association at its annual conference this week. CEA is the world's largest professional association devoted to cooperative education and work experience programs. Way joined CEA in 1969 and has served as Western Regional Representative, Program Vice President, and on numerous committees. He will serve two years as Vice President of Finance.

In addition, Way will be named Vocational Administrator of the Year by the Oregon Council of Career and Vocational Administrators at its spring conference next week.

Later this month, Way will conduct Title VIII program evaluations at Guam Community College and Marianas Community College. Title VIII provides federal funding for cooperative work experience programs. Way also will speak to students and faculty at the Department of Defense Dependents School in Tokyo before returning to LCC.

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BOARD POLICY HANDBOOK SUGGESTS PARTICIPATION

Yes, to those who have inquired, the LCC Board of Education's Board Policy Handbook does seem to speak to the issue of participation.

Paragraph 2 (of 4) in 1320.1, Formulation of Policies and Bylaws, adopted October 8, 1975, states:

Recognizing its own functions as the lawful and final authority in policy matters, the Board accepts the principle that those who are affected by the policy or bylaw should be involved in the formulation of those policies and bylaws. The Board encourages all members of the College community to review and recommend on new policies or changes of policy.

Policy 2153, Formulation of Administrative Regulations, adopted October 22, 1975, states:

In the development of administrative regulations and procedures, the President shall solicit and weigh the advice and recommendations of those members of the College community who will be affected by such provisions.

The President shall evolve channels for groups and committees to present reports and recommendations to the Board in the instance of major differences of opinion. It is emphasized, however, that the Board considers such a cooperative endeavor as entirely advisory.

Policy 2151.1, Institutional Bill of Rights, adopted July 9, 1975, states, in part:

Discussion and expression of all views within the College shall be limited only by civil and criminal law. (Section 7)

On questions of College policy, the Board and its representatives shall utilize the advice and assistance of employees and students. The Board alone, however, will serve as the final policy-making body. (Section 19)

On questions of College administrative regulations, the President and his representatives shall utilize the advice and assistance of employees and students. The President alone, however, will serve as the final decision-maker. (Section 20)

LCC HOLDS MATH CONTEST FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

High school students from around the area will compete in the LCC Math Skills Fair on Wednesday, April 19. Students in grades 9-12 from Churchill, Creswell, Junction City, Marist, North Eugene, Oakridge, Sheldon, South Eugene, Thurston, and Willamette are expected.

Three contests will be conducted: Solve That Problem (take-off on Name That Tune), The Math Relay, and The Quiz. Winners of The Quiz will be invited to the State Math Contest at the University of Oregon on May 6, and will receive a \$100 scholarship to LCC. The top winner keeps a revolving trophy for one year. The schools of the 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners will each receive a programmable calculator donated by Hewlett-Packard.

THE SKILLS EMPLOYERS WANT

The American Society for Training and Development (ASTD) and the U.S. Department of Labor have completed a two-year study identifying the skills necessary to build a world-class work force. They're described in "Workplace Basics: The Skills Employers Want," in the February/March 1989 issue of AACJC Journal. Four books on the study are due out later this year.

Here's what ASTD says employers must find in employees:

- Good basic reading, writing, and computer skills;
- Knowledge of how to learn, so they can absorb new ways;
- Listening skills, so they can heed customer, supplier, and co-worker concerns;
- Speaking skills, so they can respond to other's concerns;
- Problem-solving skills, so they can recognize and define problems, invent and implement solutions, and track and evaluate results;
- Creative thinking, so they can come up with innovative solutions;
- Self-esteem, so they can be proud of themselves and believe in their potential to be successful;
- Personal and career development skills, so they're aware of what it takes to perform well;

- Interpersonal skills, so they can get along with customers, suppliers, and co-workers;
- Teamwork skills, so they can work with others to achieve goals;
- Negotiation skills, so they can build consensus through give and take;
- Organizational understanding, so they can see where the organization is heading and how they can contribute;
- Leadership skills, so they can assume responsibility and motivate co-workers as necessary.

PUBLIC BUDGET HEARING TOMORROW

The Instructional Branch Budget Subcommittee invites statements from staff and the public regarding the 1989-90 budget at tomorrow's meeting, April 11, 3:30 to 6 p.m., in the Board Room. To facilitate the meeting, the Subcommittee suggests that: 1) speakers sign up on a sheet that will be posted in the Board Room; 2) no more than two people address the same topic; 3) a written copy of statements be given to the subcommittee; and 4) speakers limit themselves to five minutes.

The subcommittee may ask questions. All statements received will be part of the subcommittee's considerations for decisions to be made at the Thursday, April 14, meeting from 3:30 to 6 p.m. in PE 205.

OPEN HOUSE AT HECETA

The third annual open house at Heceta House is set for Sunday, May 21, in Florence, during the Rhododendron Festival. Volunteers and display materials are needed. Staff volunteers may bring family and stay overnight. Two tables are available for displays and information. About 2,000 visitors are expected.

Five more open houses are scheduled this year: June 11, July 2, July 30, August 20, and September 10, all Sundays. Facility use has been expanded to include classes, conferences or other cultural enrichment activities, with a lodging allowance for family members. Museum and information displays are being planned. LCC leases Heceta House from the U.S. Forest Service, and shares its sense of stewardship with the community of Florence.

HIGH SCHOOLS BECOME LCC TEST SITES

Four area high schools will serve as test sites for a new business department project. They are Churchill, Cottage Grove, McKenzie, and Pleasant Hill. The program is the 2+2 Business Education Database and is LCC's most formal embrace of the so-called 2+2 movement in education that links high school and community college vocational classes into a planned curriculum.

High school teachers will be typing information about the business classes they teach into a computer program developed by LCC. The software will compare high school courses to LCC courses. "Credit will be granted based on the comparison of high school and community college courses. There will be no transcripting cost for students who enter LCC full-time," says LCC business instructor Greg Harpole.

If the field test is as successful as anticipated, 2+2 programs will be extended to other vocational courses, says Director of Vocational-Technical Education Bill Porter. LCC currently credits some high school coursework in business, welding and medical terminology through less formal evaluations and testing.

A masters degree is required. An earned doctorate from an accredited institution is preferred.

Five years of successful upper level administrative experience of significant breadth and depth. Experience with a community college is preferred. Teaching experience is desired. A history of personal and professional respect and recognition is expected.

Option - experience that is different but equal or better will be given consideration.

GENERAL COMPETENCIES

The Candidate Must:

Demonstrate positive and constructive leadership, to include:

- a commitment to the comprehensive community college and to excellence in education
- a genuine concern and respect for all people
- an ability to build cohesive relationships
- the ability to make good, effective decisions.

Be an effective communicator and listener, to include:

- the ability and willingness to be the out front representative of the college
- a commitment to high visibility on the campus, in the community and in the state
- openness and honesty in both written and oral communication.

- providing for instructional improvement
- planning for future programs.

Be able to inspire others to do their very best by acting as a role model, to include:

- the skills to motivate individuals and to assist staff members as they fulfill the mission of the college
- the ability to challenge the community to take pride in and develop support for their community college
- motivating students to reach their highest potential and to take pride in their education.

Have vision and foresight, to include:

- long range planning, prioritizing, goal setting and achievement of objectives
- the ability to see the needs of a changing society and guide the college in meeting this challenge

Have exceptional business management skills, to include:

- strong skills in fiscal management and budget preparation
- the ability to balance the needs of the college with the communities ability to fund the educational program..

Have outstanding personnel management skills, to include:

- a commitment to participatory management
- an ability to recruit, hire, supervise and evaluate staff
- the ability to develop the potential of the staff to its fullest
- the ability to delegate responsibilities and authority effectively
- a working knowledge of public sector labor relations and collective bargaining.

Be a political advocate for the college, to include:

- building relationships with local governmental bodies and agencies
- developing a working relationship with the University of Oregon
- being a contributing member of the State Community College Network and Association
- being an advocate for the college at the Legislature and with local legislators.

Demonstrate a willingness and ability to be a positive and constructive advisor to a locally elected lay board of education, to include:

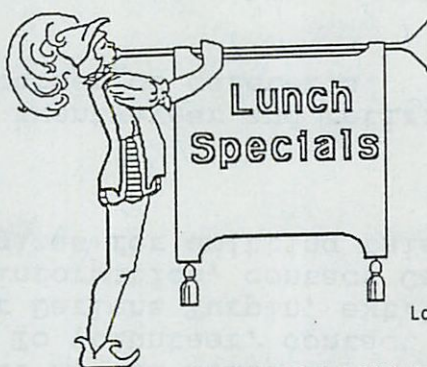

SPRING TERM ENROLLMENT EXCEEDS EXPECTATIONS

Second week enrollment figures for spring term have inspired research staff to predict a 2.6 percent growth in full-time equivalent students for 1988-89, rather than the 2 percent predicted winter term. Spring term FTE so far is 2,194, bringing the year-to-date total to 7,265, and the estimated annual FTE to 7,738.

In terms of headcount, 2,065 full-time students and 8,457 part-time students have been counted for a spring term total of 10,522.

APRIL BOARD MEETING REPORT

The LCC Board of Education met Wednesday, April 12.

Appointments: Pat Riggs was sworn in to the Board; Student Scott Meer was appointed to the Budget Committee; and Doyle Hicks was appointed to the Cottage Grove Center Advisory Committee.

Guest statements: Dr. Fielding Cooley said the U.O. plans to recognize Dale Parnell; a statement from George Alvergue favoring participative governance; and a statement from Scott Meer opposing a tuition hike and favoring more student participation in the budget process.

Board statements: Mae Westfall Cook noted recent achievements of Bob Way, and the women's track team. Martin Lewis complimented President Carter on doing a fine job. Chuck Ivey said he hopes to see styrofoam products banned by LCC. Pat Riggs said the Springfield High students liked the LCC display at a recent job fair. John Millet said he supports participative management style and is concerned about a tuition hike. Bill Mullin said he would like to see open discussions between the Board, faculty, and others, in addition to statements at meetings.

Staff reports: Speaking for Linda Riepe, Mary Unruh said LCC is seeking funding for a child care resource and referral program. Dave Wienecke showed a promotional video on the VIII World Veterans Championships, including a cross-country event at LCC on August 3.

Bid awards: The Daily Journal of Commerce in Portland for the LCC Catalog; and Computer One for networking computer equipment.

Resolutions: to oppose changes to Treasury Repayment by the US Power Marketing Administrations; and to realign some budget accounts with a net effect of zero.

The Board approved the presidential profile submitted by the Presidential Search Advisory Committee, after discussion which included Board member Mae Westfall Cook's concerns that the profile could be more tightly written. The Board approved publishing the median salary for Oregon college presidents rather than a salary range in recruitment materials, except for Martin Lewis, who opposed the decision.

The Performing Arts Department was approved to submit a grant proposal to the Oregon Arts Commission for \$2,500.

The Board discussed a tuition increase but did not take action. Vice President of Student Services Bob Marshall described options explored by the College Tuition Committee. The Board recommended further review including more student participation.

Trendy Health Tests: Pricey and Controversial

Health and fitness are popular these days for good reason, but some people get carried away in wanting to try all the latest gimmicks, products, and tests. Some of these are unnecessary, misleading, and test results may be inaccurate.

Before you insist on an exotic health item or procedure, talk with your physician or other licensed health consultant about what it can and can't do for you, warns *The Wall Street Journal*.

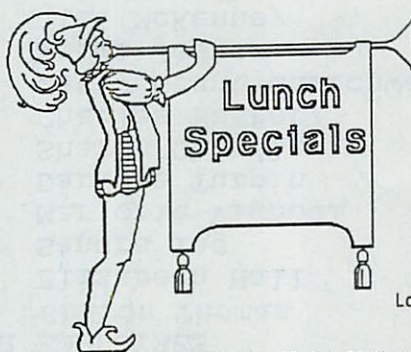
Tests that aren't trendy but are essential: annual breast exams for women; and blood pressure, rectum, and stool checks for everyone.

Beware "Pure Vegetable Oil"

With all the hype about saturated fat, you probably drink skim milk, trim fat or skin from your meat, and avoid butter. But some less obvious offenders may still be lurking in your daily menu, report Tufts University researchers. Palm, palm kernal, and coconut oils (commonly used in snack foods such as cookies, crackers, and non-dairy creamers) are highly saturated fats, even though they are vegetable oils.

Researchers suggest you read the label and look for soybean, corn, safflower, and cottonseed oils instead. Don't be fooled by "contains one or more of the following..." because you have no way to know which oil was actually used.

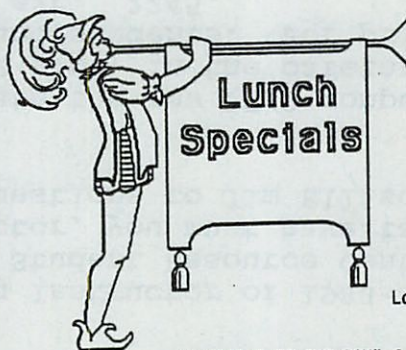
