APRIL 19 BUDGET MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

President Carter said the proposed budget is based on 7,800 FTE and State support should be about the same as for 1988-89, although an additional \$400,000 may be allocated for equipment. He also noted that a proposed tuition increase is subject to Board review and action, which may affect budget totals. Vice President Hillier said the current projected budget total for all funds is \$63,631,405, which includes an 11% increase in the General Fund. Staff said additional state funds, a tuition increase, and other possible revenue sources may soften the original budget reduction goal of \$1 million set in February.

In other business, elected for 1989-90 were Catherine Lauris, Chair; Larry Brown, Vice Chair, and Sharon Smith, Secretary.

AIRPLANE DONATED

The federal government has agreed to give LCC a CT39 Saberliner airplane. The 12-passenger airplane will be used in the aircraft mechanics program. It has retractable landing gear, a pressurized cabin, oxygen systems, fire control systems, and operational twin jet engines mounted on the tail. It will arrive in about three weeks. Priced between \$8 and \$9 million when new, the Saberliner will cost LCC about \$1,500, thanks to a year's work by mechanics department chair Ted Kotsakis, flight technology department head Terry Hagberg, and Congressman Peter DeFazio. A TH55A helicopter, valued at \$150,000 when new, was also obtained from the federal government about four months ago at a cost of \$600.

'GIVE YOURSELF A PAT ON THE BACK'

That was the word from the Civil Rights Compliance Review team which spent last week at LCC to determine if the College is conforming to equal opportunity laws. Dr. Joan Stoddard of Oregon Department of Education and Dr. Warren Sujuki of Oregon State University declared LCC "in compliance" and replete with "pockets of excellence" throughout. The visitors said they were impressed with the commitment to student success they found and the diversity of services to students. They singled out such services as the women's transition program and the Training and Development department. More of the winners will be reported when the written report is received. The College is asked to make some minor adjustments in wording of Board policies where practice has gotten ahead of policy. Disabled access can be improved, the team said, but noted that corrections are already underway. "You should all feel very, very pleased," Dr. Stoddard said.

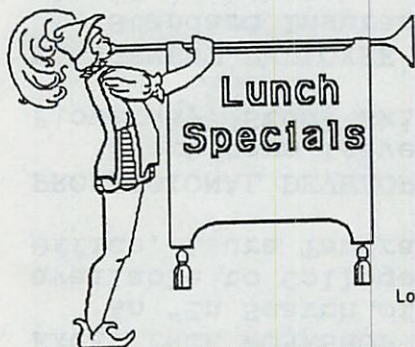



The Board of Education vetoed a tuition increase by a 4-2 vote at its May 10 meeting. Opposing the increase were Mae Westfall Cook, Chuck Ivey, Larry Perry, and Mary Unruh. Favoring the increase were Martin Lewis and Jim Pitney. The decision requires staff to prepare alternatives for the next Budget Committee meeting on Wednesday, May 17.

Mary Unruh and Mae Westfall Cook resigned. Both are moving out of town. Cook said, "It has been a special privilege to have met and worked with so many outstanding and dedicated members of the LCC campus community."

Mass communications students protested proposed budget cuts in their department. Paul Machu of KVAL-TV also spoke, citing the program as "our most important resource" of employees.

Outgoing president of LCCEA Bill Mullin read his final statement. He said "the real problem at LCC is not money, but management." He said participatory management is the key to solving LCC's problems.

In other business, the board voted to continue funding the Talent Grant and ASLCC Tuition Waiver Programs, amending them to include part-time students and areas other than athletics and performing arts. The resignation of David Wienecke, Campus Services, was accepted, and the retirements of Kathleen Wiederholt, Library, Trish Kocher, Personnel, and Marie Reid, President's Office, were acknowledged.

Next meeting is Wednesday, June 14, 7:30 p.m., in the Board Room.

CLASS SCHEDULE IMPROVEMENTS SET

Review of LCC's quarterly class schedule is now complete and major changes will begin with the fall issue. Review of the schedule included formal and informal input from staff, students, and potential students. All suggestions were considered by a steering committee and four subcommittees. The schedule is our most important information and recruitment tool. The purpose of the review was to make it more useful and effective.

Some major improvements include: changing from a loose page tabloid to a stapled, magazine format; adding a table of contents and index; simplifying and reorganizing registration and tuition information; using "real" not military time in the credit section; and eliminating most of the articles and news items. These changes will require help from virtually all campus branches. A detailed report on the review process and recommendations has been sent to directors, department heads, bargaining unit leaders, others, and is on reserve in the library.

HARPOLE LEADS INNOVATORS

Business instructor Greg Harpole has been named LCC's Innovator of the Year by the League for Innovation for three recent achievements. They involve a 2 + 2 database of task lists for office systems and accounting careers, a computer networked classroom to enhance individualized instruction in office administration, and a text-workbook for a computerized, simulated medical office. The database is believed to be the first of its kind in the nation. Harpole supervised its development and field testing in local high schools. The software was written by former LCC student John Hughes. The Vocational Technical Education Consortium of States will use the program and the State of Oregon will offer it for sale. The computer networked classroom was developed by Harpole with the cooperation of fellow instructor Betty James and electronics chair Bob Vogel and electronics students. Harpole's text-workbook, A Computerized Patient Billing and Recordkeeping Simulation for a Medical Office, was published by McGraw-Hill in 1989.
