Highlights from the Board of Education special meeting Wednesday night, May 31 are: Members encouraged residents to apply for vacancies (see above). Jay Marston attended his first board meeting in his new role as LCCEA president. The Foundation received approval to apply for a \$200,000 endowment challenge grant under Title III. Members approved an upgrade of the college's mainframe computer to accommodate increased use. Members reinstated an exchange scholarship with the Nagasaki Wesleyan Junior College. The board issued a formal resolution honoring Marie Reid on the occasion of her retirement. The resolution notes her 17 years of service as Board Secretary; attendance at more than 300 board meetings, some lasting as long as six hours; and more than 4,500 pages of shorthand notes.

CAUGHT IN THE ACT OF EXCELLENCE



\$200,000 RECEIVED TO CONTINUE GRANT

The college has received \$200,000 from the U.S. Department of Education towards the second year of its three-year Title III grant. The grant enables the college to improve management decision-making, student services, and academic programs.

Management information system hardware has been installed, says Jim Keizur, Director of Computer Services. Next, the system will produce reports to help fiscal and curriculum administrators make more effective decisions. A computer-based tracking system to identify high risk students has been installed, says Counselor John Winqvist. Reports should be available in the fall to help instructors find ways to help those students. A college success course for higher risk

students and a student information center are being discussed, he says.

Academic programs are being improved with the addition of writing instruction to several courses, not just English, since writing skills are fundamental to student success, says Jack Powell, English Department Head. A computer writing lab is also being established.

Ronald Mitchell is the project director for the grant.

INDUSTRIAL TECHNOLOGY HAS NEWS

Ed Humes and his shop fabrication students have been involved with various welding projects for community members including duplicating brackets, welding a car drive line, providing a quote to manufacture tanks for growing mushrooms, and manufacturing beams for a carpenter shop. The beams were welded by two certified welding students and passed certification by a testing lab.

Industrial Technology staff and students participated in the Future Farmers of America contest on May 25 at LCC. High school students from six area high schools competed in welding and woodshop events and were judged by LCC students studying the same disciplines.

Welding instructor Mark Huntington received Staff Development Funds enabling him to enroll in an American Society for Metals home study course. He also received funding for curriculum development to continue standardizing the competency base for the current welding curriculum, and continue developing new curriculum. Huntington is also developing a fall seminar in computer estimating for Oregon community colleges. A local company, Fab/Trol, will be donating software to seminar participants.

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Welding instructor Albert Rowe has been accepted into the summer Harvard University Graduate School of Design's 1989 Career Discovery Program. The six-week, intensive program concentrates on architecture and includes lectures, discussions, visual presentations, projects, and simulations of a typical first year professional training program. Rowe says the information he passes on to his students will help them when they go to work in the construction/fabrication industry where structural integrity and architectural design are interdependent.

Culinary, Food Service and Hospitality students catered a Lane Leaders event hosted by the CWE department, serving over 200 guests. CWE coordinator Linda Myers shared this joke with the students: What would you get if you lit a match to all the oil spilled in Alaska? Baked Alaska!

Firefighting training is being offered through the Forest Workers Apprenticeship Program at LCC. This is the first time a community college has offered firefighting training, making it affordable for smaller forest service contractors. Two training sessions will be held in July. The second one will be taught in English and Spanish. Bilingual training reflects the increasing number of minorities in the industry and highlights LCC's response to the changing work force.

WEEKEND STUDENTS PROFILED

Researchers have profiled Lane Community College's weekend students in a report published last month, "Weekend College at Lane Community College: A Profile of Student Characteristics," and a survey administered to weekend students during winter term.

Both reports say the weekend-only student population is 71.2 percent female vs. 53.6 percent for the total college credit population. Weekend students average 32.7 years old, vs. the college average of 28.7. The percentage of weekend-only students that work and take classes at the same time is 71.5, vs. 59 percent of the total student population. Part-time students account for 89 percent of the weekend-only population, but 46 percent of the college total is full-time. The percentage of weekend-only students who take classes for self-improvement, to earn a certificate, or a two-year degree is 81.2 percent, but 46.1 percent of the college total is pursuing a four-year or graduate degree.

Researcher Marie Matsen says that "weekend classes are clearly attracting students who are not able to attend college otherwise," principally people who work weekday jobs. "A large number of students surveyed indicated that their employers had first told them about Weekend College, and that their employers encouraged their education."

FORMER ASLCC PRESIDENT JOINS BOARD

Cindy Weeldreyer of Cottage Grove is the new Board of Education member representing Zone 4 (south and east Lane County). Appointed by the Board last Wednesday, she will serve through June 30, 1990. The Zone 4 position will be on the March 1990 election ballot. Weeldreyer was ASLCC President in 1984-85, was community college student representative to the State Board of Education in 1985-86, and served on Lane's Budget Committee this year.

The Board also:

- Adopted a 1989-90 general fund (operating) budget of \$35,967,148. That's up 10.38 percent over this year's, due to such increases as \$700,000 in student fees for aircraft rental in Flight Technology (the same amount paid to aircraft suppliers), and and \$540,000 to set up a reserve fund to offset expected cost increases in fiscal year 1990-91. These two items account for 3.78 percent of the increase. Without these two items the general fund increase is 6.6 percent. Revenue to help make the 6.6 percent possible comes from an expected \$367,493 in additional tuition due to projected enrollment growth, and a state allocation of \$400,000 to purchase teaching equipment.

- Approved the levying of \$15,756,340 in property taxes to help pay for the budget. At a collection rate of 89 percent, the increase in property tax support is 5.4 percent.

- Heard a report from Vice President Dick Hillier that there could be a cash carry forward from this year ranging from \$1.6 to \$2 million. It's due to an overattainment of revenue from increased tax collections, increased enrollments, and increased interest earnings. The money will help meet expenses in the next two fiscal years.

- Gave the Administration authority to continue to negotiate with Edmonds, Washington, Community College to be a part of a satellite campus in Japan.

- Approved 40 new or revised courses, ranging from Resort Management to Tap Dance to a psychology course called The Mind; approved \$569,500 for facilities projects; approved bid awards which included \$475,000 for a Flight Technology building, \$95,000 for a Robinson R-22 helicopter, \$183,491 for gym/P.E. reroofing, \$231,888 for Forum building reroofing, and \$56,250 for printing the class schedule next fiscal year.

- Hired Lloyd Rain of Lane County Housing Authority as Purchasing Director, Steven L. Myers of Eugene as a Mathematics Instructor, and Shirley Pearson (office manager in Instruction since 1974) as Secretary to the President/office manager.

- Named Board member Martin Lewis as Lane Board representative to the Oregon Community College Association.

LCC HOSTS SYMPHONY FUNDRAISER

Lane will be the host site for the Eugene Symphony "First Annual Box Lunch Social" on Wednesday, June 28, at 12 noon, in the northeast corner of the cafeteria. The Business Department and the Performing Arts Department are co-sponsoring the event, and will conduct two short guided tours of their departments.

H&PE HAS INTERIM DEPARTMENT HEAD

Bob Radcliff has been appointed Interim Department Head for Health and Physical Education for the summer. Former Department Head Dr. Fred Loveys has tendered his resignation effective December 15, 1989. In the interim he has been reassigned to Special Projects within the Community Education Division.
