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SORENSON APPOINTED TO LANE BOARD

A person with long-term community college ties has been appointed to the Lane Board of Education. Eugene attorney C. Peter Sorenson, 38, was chosen from from among nine applicants on July 5 to succeed Mary Unruh in the Zone 5 (central and south Eugene) position. He will serve through next June 30 and will run for a four-year term next March. Sorenson, whose father was among Oregon's first community college teachers, is a 1971 graduate of Southwestern Oregon Community College at Coos Bay. He edited the student newspaper there and served as a campus security officer. Since 1985 he has been on the Lane budget committee. He lost by a handful of votes in a 1982 race for the Lane Board. In his letter of application for the appointive seat, he said he has "no set agenda...although participatory management and public support...are important objectives."

Sorenson will assume his Board seat at a July 25 special Board meeting and work session on collective bargaining and participatory management.

WEEKEND COLLEGE HAS SURVEY

During winter term 1989, a written survey was administered to weekend students. Results indicate:

The average age of weekend students was 30.3, almost two years over the college average of 28.6.
Females made up 64.3 percent of the weekend population, while the percentage of women in the entire college credit population was 53.6.
A large number of weekend students indicated that their employers had first told them about Weekend College, and encouraged their education. These findings suggest Lane might further increase Weekend College enrollments by fostering connections with area employers. United States Department of Education statistics indicate the available pool of traditional college

students, those in the 18 to 20-year-old range, will decline over the next few years. Results of this study suggest the Weekend College is in a strong position to attract the non-traditional students who are becoming an increasingly larger proportion of the higher education market.

BOARD APPROVES CHILD CARE PROPOSAL IN CONCEPT

Lane would establish an area child care resource and referral data base under a proposal approved in concept by the Board of Education last Wednesday. Funding would be sought through gifts and grants to set up a centralized, computerized data source to help families find child care. Several employees could be hired to establish the system and to arrange for creation of information and training video tapes. Linda Riepe and Doug White of Health Occupations are pursuing the matter. Former Board member Mary Unruh, co-chair of the Child Care Service area, Lane County Children's Agenda, has worked with them.

In other business at its meeting last week, the Board reelected Larry Perry as chair (its his fourth term as chair, the beginning of his 15th year on the Board) and Jim Pitney as vice chair; was advised by President Jack Carter that 100 people have requested application packets for the Lane presidency; approved a six percent raise for managers (faculty earlier got 8.4 and classified 7.4); and bought two mobile classroom buildings now used for Training and Development for \$38,000. The Board accepted the retirement resignation of 17-year nursing instructor Saralie Lewis, who plans worldwide travel; accepted the resignation of Sharon Hobart, Small Business Development Center Network, who moves to the University of Oregon Bureau of Governmental Research and Service; accepted the resignation of Fred Beisse from Data Processing, who becomes assistant director of the University of Oregon Computing Center; hired Steve Daletas of the part-time Fight Technology faculty to become full-time assistant chief flight instructor; and hired Judy Ward, 13-year employee in Athletics and LRC, to become administrative secretary in Personnel Services.

The next meeting of the Board is Monday, July 24, at 6 p.m., in ADM 216. Members will discuss collective barganing and participative management with consultant Lon Mills.

BOARD LEANS TOWARD PARTICIPATION

Board of Education members indicated an interest in more employee involvement in college decision making at a Monday night work session. But, they are not ready at this time to adopt any full-blown formal procedure which might be called "participative management" or "shared governance."

A statement of general principles might be considered, however, as early as the Board's August 9 meeting. The Administration was asked by chairman Larry Perry to draft a statement of "what we agreed to this evening."

The consensus seemed to be that more employee involvement is desired and that management should reflect that, but the Board should move slowly in that a new president could be involved within six months.

After a short formal meeting to swear in new Board member Peter Sorenson, Eugene attorney, members listened to consultant Lon Mills describe the college's collective bargaining process, and University of Oregon education professor Gerald K. Bogen trace the history, advantages, and limitations of participative management.

Following Bogen's presentation, Mills told the Board that the college "would be 80 percent of the way toward that" (participation) if more managers encouraged employee involvement.

Bogen said participatory organizations are "usually more productive" and emphasized that a fundamental of such systems is information sharing, particularly the reasons behind decisions.

He cited these advantages and limitations of participation:

Advantages

Participation in organizational decision making can improve employees' satisfaction and performance in a number of ways:

1. Participation leads to greater understanding and acceptance of decisions.

2. Participation leads to greater identification with decisions and more intense commitment to their implementation.

3. Participation leads to greater understanding of objectives.

4. Participation provides employees with a more accurate perception of organizational reward contingencies.

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5. Participation is consistent with the needs of mature employees for self-identity, autonomy, achievement, and psychological growth.

6. When a decision arises from a participatory process, groups apply pressure on dissenters to accept or at least outwardly comply with the decision.

7. Group decision making promotes cooperation, mutual understanding, team identity, and coordination.

8. In case of divergent objectives, consultation and joint decision making provides opportunities for resolving conflicts.

9. Participation allows the use of the expertise and analytical skills of individuals throughout the organization.

10. Participatory decision making can, if properly implemented and monitored, result in higher organizational productivity.

11. Participatory decision making frequently results in improved decisions.



Limitations

1. Broad participation is time consuming and not usable when an immediate decision is needed.

2. Decisions based on extremely broad participation may not give adequate weight to the primary applicable expertise; genuine expertise can be discounted.

3. Group decision making diffuses organizational responsibility, making it difficult to assign responsibility for success or blame for failure.

4. Providing for participation on some areas may lead to expectations for participation in a broader range of decisions than leaders may desire. 5. Extensive use of participation may result in a leader's being viewed as weak.

6. Participative decisions require special leadership skills and may lead to poor results if the leader lacks these skills.

7. Some participants may resent required involvement; organizational sabotage can result.

8. Many managers do not want to "lose" power and will resent participative processes. Such resentment is frequently found in mid-level supervisors.

9. If not properly implemented, group decision-making can result in replacement of "tyranny of managers" by "tyranny of peers."

10. Unrealistic expectations of group decision making can result. Group decision making cannot solve all organizational problems.

11. Transformation of an organization from "authoritarian" culture to one of collaboration and participatory decision making is costly and slow.

12. "Group think" might cause primacy of primary customer to be lost.

Other criteria

Bogen said six criteria must be met if adequate consultative opportunities are to be provided.

1. Consultation should occur early in the decision-making process.

2. Staff and administrators should jointly formulate procedures for consultation.

3. Staff must have time to consider and formulate responses to issues posted.

4. All relevant information with the exception of items concerning review of personnel must be made available.

5. Adequate feedback must be provided to the group when recommendations are not acceptable or when no action is being taken.

6. The final decision must be communicated to all interested campus constituencies and the reasons for these decisions must be given.
