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CHILD CARE REPORT AVAILABLE

A report on child care issues at Lane has been produced through the Marketing Council. It is available for reading at the office of Council chair Diane Dann, ADM 209.

The report includes information about how other Oregon community colleges are addressing child care needs and "should provide an excellent basis for continuing discussions," Dann says.

A major recommendation is that a way be found for the various groups working on child care to coordinate their efforts. Participants include the Child Development Center, Office of Instruction, Welfare Reform Task Force, and Marketing Council.

Judith Boler of the Oregon Social Learning Center wrote the report under a commission by the Research Committee chaired by Julie Aspinwall-Lamberts, IRP&E.

The executive summary of the report is reprinted below.

The child care needs of current and potential students are a concern at Lane, as they are at other community colleges throughout the country. This concern is legitimate. An increasing number of community college students have small children and there is good evidence that inadequate child care can be a significant barrier to a student's entering and remaining in school.

Imagine a young mother without a car spending up to three hours a day trying to make the necessary bus connections between home, day care, and school. Imagine how the problems are compounded if the child becomes ill during the day.

According to a survey conducted at the State University of New York and reported in the Community College Times (May 9, 1989, page 1), adequate child care can be essential to academic success. Parents who have reliable child care are more likely to enroll, perform better in school, and find they can manage larger classloads.

Colleges have tried various approaches to child care, ranging from full-scale on-site day care centers to aiding in the formation of informal cooperatives. Others, like Lane, offer child care in conjunction with an instructional program; however, as at Lane, openings and services are necessarily limited and fees are higher than many low-income students can afford.

Services that address the child care needs of community college students are characterized by

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(1) affordability (\$1.00 to \$1.50 an hour),
 (2) flexible hours, (3) drop-in care, (4) sick-child care. Finding appropriate and affordable child care is particularly difficult for Lane's low-income students. While there are efforts within our community to offer resource and referral services, no comprehensive referral program currently exists.

At the present time at Lane, there are a number of groups working independently to improve child care for students. The full report describes the work of these various groups, the research that has been done to date on child care needs, and how other Oregon Community Colleges are responding.



RECOMMENDATIONS

This report was not intended to determine how the college should respond to the need for child care. It was intended to help the college move forward on this issue.

We recommend that the college take the following next steps:

1. Acknowledge that the focus of the Child Development Center at Lane Community College is to provide training for Early Childhood students. It cannot and is not intended to be Lane's total response to the child care needs of students.

2. Create a task force that brings together the various people now working independently on the child care issue. This collaborative model would include participants from Student Services, Student Government, the Child Development Center, Office of Instruction, the Welfare Reform Task Force, and possibly the Marketing Council.

The charge to this group would be:

- To determine what child care services are needed by present Lane students, focusing first on meeting the needs of low-income students. See characteristics above. - To recommend methods for meeting these child care needs, beginning first with the needs of low-income students, followed by methods for meeting the needs of other students and potential students.

- Once we've met the immediate needs, to explore broader child care issues, such as partnerships with businesses or providing assistance and perhaps certification to other providers.

WATCH FOR ERRORS IN MEDICAL BILL When you get your medical bill, check it over thoroughly. Mistakes can happen. Check the accuracy of your name, address, group and identification numbers. Look at the services or supplies on the bill to see that you aren't billed for services or supplies you didn't receive. For example, you may have been charged for x-rays or lab tests that were ordered but later cancelled. It is not unheard of for one person to be billed for services that another has received. Finally, add up the figures yourself to make sure there are no mathematical errors. If you do find a mistake, let your doctor or hospital know about it right away. If they agree, they can either send you a corrected billing, or you can cross out the incorrect item, and indicate on the billing that it is an error with your signature or initials beside the incorrect item. Then resubmit the bill to your insurance carrier for payment. If your doctor's office or hospital does not agree, you can call the claims department of your insurance carrier for assistance.

ORIENTATION SHOWS ENROLLMENT CLIMB

THE DAIL

A record number of students attended Lane's first day of new student orientation last week, indicating a continuation of last year's climb in enrollment. Director of Admissions Sharon Moore said nearly 400 more students have enrolled for fall term than at this same time last year.

Enrollment climbed three percent in 1988-89, the first increase in eight years. A total of 7,774 FTE (full-time equivalent) students was counted, compared to 1987-88's 7,541 FTE. The all-time high was 9,520 FTE in 1980-81.

President Jack Carter attributes the increase to Lane's strong marketing effort, improved services such as registration by telephone, and a turnaround in the economy.

Vice President for Student Services Bob Marshall said more people are attending school full-time, which increases FTE count, and that community colleges statewide are experiencing similar increases.

POOL OF OUTSTANDING PRESIDENTS SMALL

A Carnegie study by Kerr (1984) found many leaders saw community colleges as relatively unattractive institutions in which to work. O'Banion advocates that college boards work hard to keep a peak-performing president when they get one, pay around \$100,000 salaries, provide generous benefits such as housing, and surround them with ample, outstanding administrative staffs that make leadership possible.

"VOCATIONAL" TERM CRITICIZED

Use of the word, "technical", in place of the word vocational in describing community college education is advocated by Dale Parnell, president of the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges and founding president of Lane. The term "vocational" education has developed a negative connotation nationally, Parnell says in the August issue of CTJC Times. Such courses are those taken "by somebody else's kid," he says. Parnell's view is echoed by Sen. Christopher Dodd, D-CT, who says, "I don't know what it is exactly, but we almost have a Pavlovian response to the term" in Congress. He supports a name change in the law to the Perkins Technical (instead of vocational) Education Act. Around Lane, some people are using the generic "career" education to designate all courses taught. "Career" education, according to surveys done in Lane County, gets the most positive response when compared to vocational, technical, transfer, and like terms.

SHORTFALL FORECAST FOR SCIENTISTS, ENGINEERS

The number of jobs requiring a graduate degree will increase dramatically by the 21st century, yet:

- Less than 50 percent of high school juniors and only 33 percent of high school seniors actually enroll in a science course.
- The number of 18 to 24-year-olds in the population is expected to decline 19 percent by the year 2000.
- If trends continue, the United States will experience a shortfall of as many as 560,000 scientists and engineers by the year 2010.

Traditionally, science and engineering are white male professions.

- Women are now 51 percent of the population and 45.5 percent of the workforce, yet they compromise only 11 percent of all employed scientists and engineers.
- While blacks make up 9 percent of college freshman, in 1987 they received just 2.6 percent of the bachelor's degrees and 1.8 percent of the doctorates awarded in science and engineering.
- However, just 15 percent of the workers entering the workforce in the year 2000 will be white men.

Student interest in science careers in the U.S. is declining rapidly.

- The number of undergraduates with science majors dropped 15 percent in the decade between 1975 and 1985.
- While U.S. citizens comprise 90 percent of engineering undergraduates, they make up only 45 percent of the 3,000 Ph.D's awarded in this country each year.
- 400 out of every 10,000 people in Japan are engineers, compared to 70 of every 10,000 in the U.S. Conversely, the U.S. has 20 lawyers to every one in Japan; 40 accountants to Japan's three.

Strong job growth is predicted for Oregon, but if current trends continue, the work force of the year 2000 will be employed in non-technical, low-paying, part-time jobs.

- By the year 2000, more than 178,000 new jobs will be created in Oregon, but almost 95 percent of the new jobs will be created in the non-manufacturing sector, primarily in trade and service-related industries.
- In 1985, the Oregon State System of Higher Education instituted new requirements for entering college freshmen: three years of science and three years of math. While these upgraded standards are starting to produce results, still 1/3 of all students registered in freshman math fail or drop out.
