GETTING BALANCED

Hardly a day goes by without some new claim for what we should or should not eat. It's downright confusing.

What should you eat to stay healthy? The U.S. Department of Agriculture and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services have prepared current guidelines, based on the latest nutrition information available. The first two guidelines form the framework for a good diet: "Eat a variety of foods" that provide enough essential nutrients and energy to "maintain desirable weight." The next five guidelines describe special characteristics of good diets. They suggest that you get adequate starch and fiber and avoid too much fat, sugar, sodium, and alcohol.

Food alone cannot make you healthy. But good eating habits based on moderation and variety can help keep you healthy and even improve your health. To get the full details on good eating, write for "Nutrition and Your Health: Dietary Guidelines for Americans" (520P), available free from the Consumer Information Center, P.O. Box 100, Pueblo, CO 81002.

Executive Council to Change

In his inservice speech to Lane staff on Monday, Interim President Jack Carter announced that he intends to change the Executive Council to a College Council and to expand its membership to include broader representation of the college community. The change is in response to staff and board recommendations for more employee involvement. Along with the V.P.'s and Executive Dean, the council will include the presidents of ASLCC, the LCCEF, and the LCCEA; Julie Aspinwall-Lamberts for college planning; and Larry Romine for communications. Carter pointed out that the council's membership is not static and may be added to or changed over time. "Dissolving the Executive Council in favor of the College Council," Carter said in his speech, "This only one step toward achieving the level of effective involvement we need across this institution."

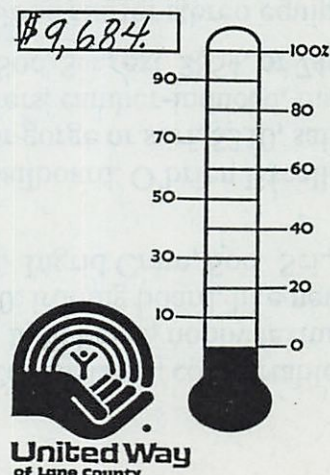

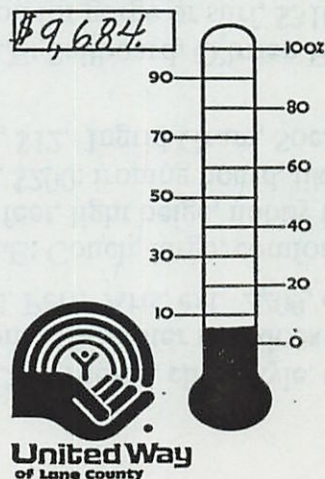

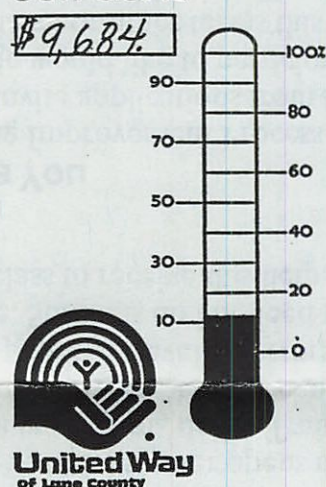
