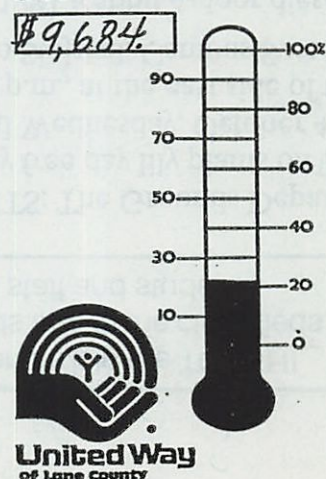
## Thank You

- \*Resolve complaints quickly. When you handle complaints well, people become better customers.
- \*Invest money in training customer personnel. Be sure they know how to operate equipment properly and how and what to communicate.
- \*Measure performance to ensure that customers are getting the kind of service they should. Let everybody in your organization know how well the goals are, or are not, being met.
- \*Constantly measure customer perceptions of quality of service.

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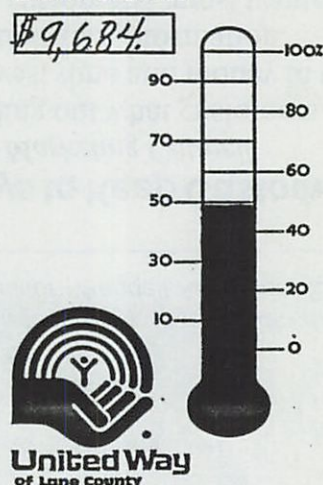

## Goal this year: Work the plan

The aim of this year's planning effort will be, simply, to keep the college moving toward implementing themes and goals of the College Plan. Julie Aspinwall-Lamberts, IRP&E director, told the College Council Tuesday that she foresees no big changes and will keep an eye on trends and issues. In other business, the Council: \*Received the vice presidents' and executive dean's recommendations to spend \$135,271 for capital outlay items fall term. President Carter invites staff reaction, this week, pending his decision to approve or reject the spending next Tuesday. A list of capital outlay items is available from Council members. An additional \$200,000 should be available later for additional equipment, depending on state lottery income. \*Agreed to meet at the Eugene Hilton on Saturday, October 21, to continue to work on evolving working relationships among members. \*Heard President Carter share his feeling that the Council should replace the Planning Task Force. He said he will discuss the issue next Tuesday. \*Heard Bob Marshall, vice president for Student Services, report that fall enrollment is up 720 students and 30.8 FTE in Community Education, and up 509 students and 154 FTE in credit areas. Big gainers include Social Science, up 38.8 FTE; Data Processing, up 23.2 FTE; English and Foreign Language, up 21.7 FTE; Mathematics, up 19.2 FTE; Performing Arts, up 16.8 FTE; Science, up 15.8 FTE; Health Occupations, up 12 FTE. \*Agreed that next Tuesday's agenda include discussion of a childcare task force, structure and organization of inservice, planning, a staff meeting room, and a review of Lane Advocates.



## Enrollment up this term

Enrollment is big news at Lane this fall. Adult Education FTE is up almost 50 from a year ago. Admissions reports that credit enrollment has increased about 150 FTE over fall term last year. Institutional Research says that lower division credit courses account for most of the increase. A complete enrollment picture will be available the fourth week of classes after additional registrations are loaded in the computer.

## Name change policy clarified

The process adopted this summer to systematize name changes of college units is now under way. Vice presidents will make their recommendations to the president by November 1. Final decisions will be by made by December 15. New names will go into effect when the college catalog is published in spring. Instructional Cabinet has a list of name changes for consideration by the president. Other units are also working on changes. New names will be published in *The Daily* in January. You are asked not to use the new names until the catalog is published. The purpose of this new process is to identify and publish a set of official names that agree in correspondence, in publications, on the ClassLine voice, and in other applications. A list of approved names is available from the vice presidents and the executive dean.

## Last week to change insurance

Faculty interested in changing from one medical insurance plan to another, or adding a dependent to your medical or dental coverage, may do so during open enrollment through October 13. # Voters Okay College 5 to 1

## New Board Already Faces Organizational Fund Lack

It has neither operating expense money, a name nor a president, and only the promise of a campus and student body.

But a community college exists today in Lane County.

Voters overwhelmingly approved establishment of the college Monday by nearly a 5-to-1 margin. Preliminary tallies showed 5,944 votes for and 1,282 against the college.

Named to the initial board of directors were Dr. Albert Brauer of Florence from Zone 1, Dr. Clifford Matson of Junction City from Zone 2, Kenneth Schmidt of Springfield from Zone 3, Dr. Dean Webb of Cottage Grove from Zone 4, William Bristow Jr. of Eugene from Zone 5, and Olga Freeman and Lyle Swetland, both of Eugene, as at-large representatives.

The board has weighty problems awaiting it, the immediate one money. What will the college use to finance its organizational throes between now and a budget election, perhaps next spring?

"It's a problem the board members will have to solve," said Bert Dotson, community college study committee executive secretary. "We have no ready solution, believe me."

"They will have to get it somewhere," he said, "because we would hope to have a fairly good program operable next fall." The initial curriculum will be mostly technical-vocational courses, he said.

"The Eugene School District has agreed to make Eugene Technical-Vocational School facilities available for a temporary campus," said Lloyd Millhollen, a School District 4 official and also a member of the study committee. "A rental agreement probably will be drawn up."

"We expect an opening enrollment of a thousand, if not more," Dotson said.

No immediate meeting has been scheduled by the board. It cannot, in fact, meet officially until Monday's vote is canvassed by the State Board of Education.

The state board next meets formally in December, although it might be persuaded to call a special meeting in November. And an even earlier telephone

canvass has been mentioned.

The college board in the meantime will have to meet unofficially Millhollen said. They must talk about choosing a president to direct organizational efforts and assist in such duties as picking a name for the new school. The directors can pick a name out of the air or hold a contest.

"It's up to the board," Dotson said.

A first consideration of the board when it meets will be to draw lots to determine the length of term each director will serve. There will be two four-year terms, two three-year terms, two two-year terms and a single one-year term.

Subsequent terms will be for four years. The directors will serve without compensation.

The board, whatever tribulations it encounters in the future, will begin its duties knowing the college has a solid backing among voters. Every one of the 22 polling places voted for establishment of the college.

"I thought it would be closer," said Dale Parnell, superintendent of the Lane County Intermediate Education District and a member of the college study committee. "People are backing this more than I thought."

"I never for a moment thought it would fail," insisted William Jones, assistant superintendent of Bethel School District and chairman of the college study committee. "People knew it was needed," he said.

Only in the Monroe Elementary School District in Benton County was the voting close, 27 for and 26 against. The narrow split was attributed to rumors of a "plot" that the college vote was part of an effort to shift the area from Benton to Lane County.

Slightly more than eight per cent of the college district's 85,000 registered voters—7,226—cast ballots and 82 per cent of them said "yes" to establishment of the college.

The vote, while seemingly fairly light, was termed "large" by Dotson. "I'm extremely pleased to see this many for a special election," he said.

Several of the new board members won easily while others had to settle for narrow victories.

In Zone 1, Dr. Albert Brauer tallied 2,788 votes to 1,791 for Glen Jensen of Central and 617 for S. Carl Traegde of Noti. Brauer captured 16 polling places and Jensen, six.

Dr. Clifford Matson received 2,705 votes to win the Zone 2 seat. Carroll Groshong of Eugene trailed with 1,660 votes and Wanda Casper of Junction City had 838 votes. Matson won in 19 polling places and Groshong in three.

Kenneth Schmidt won a close race in Zone 3, gathering 1,867 votes to 1,779 for Jay Hicks of Springfield and 1,373 for Robert Mealey of Blue River. The polling places were split 11-7-2 with four ties.

Dr. Dean Webb ran away from A. K. LaFon of Fall Creek in Zone 4, winning 3,582 to 1,418. Webb prevailed in 21 of the 22 polling places.

William Bristow Jr. captured 18 polling places and tied in another to amass 1,924 votes and the Zone 5 seat. William Madron of Eugene had 1,679 votes and the remainder of the polling places. Other votes went to: Eugene Herlocker of Eugene, 600; R. Glade Shimanek of Eugene, 490; Melvin Hess of Eugene, 441; and DeWitt McGhehey of Eugene, 275.

Olga Freeman and Lyle Swetland had tight competition from Francis Nickerson of Eugene for the two at-large seats. Mrs. Freeman won 14 polling places and 2,583 votes to 17 polling places and a tie in another for Lyle Swetland who had 2,580 votes.

Nickerson was right behind with 2,509 votes. He won at 11 polling places and tied in another.

Trailing the top three were James Weaver of Eugene, 1,521 votes; Paul Purvis of Harrisburg, 840 votes; and George Pyle of Eugene, 633 votes. Purvis won at one polling place while the other two were shut out completely.

The election was conducted with only one known hitch. Nearly a third of all the voters cast their ballots at South Eugene High School, resulting in block-long waiting lines at times during the evening.

When the polls closed at 8 a waiting line of 292 voters was moved inside the building and continued voting until about 9:30.

"We had \$1,000 to spent on this election and it was only enough to pay for 22 polling places," Millhollen said. The money came from contributions of county school districts and sales of college advertising buttons.

But if the heavy turnout at South inconvenienced voters, it did that and more to election workers. They did not finish counting the flood of ballots until 5:10 a.m., Tuesday.

## State funding close to budget

The latest figures from Salem, reports Vice President for Administrative Services Dick Hillier, indicate the following amounts for Lane Community College:

1989-90	Budgeted:	\$8,802,900
	Actual:	\$8,786,417
1990-91	Budgeted:	\$8,962,000
	Actual:	\$9,181,806

The 1909-91 funding is based on an inflation factor of 4.5 percent applied to the 1989-90 funding level. There is also a "set aside" for 1990-91 of \$1.1 million for "growth in 1989-90." Lane's share will depend on systemwide growth in 1989-90 and our individual enrollment attainment.



## Accreditation score: Overall positive

Lane's shape, as far as interim accreditation is concerned, is "uneven, but overall it's positive," according to Dr. Jim Bemis of the Commission on Colleges of the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges. In a visit Thursday, Bemis said he was impressed with the college's new goals statement, with marketing, with delivery systems such as weekend college, and with the many program improvements.

He said the 25 Commission members, who will meet in December to likely reaffirm Lane's accreditation for another five years, will be pleased that budgets have increased slightly in spite of resource shortfalls, pleased that the physical plant is in good shape though needing "subtle improvements," and pleased with the "very supportive, interested and committed" Board of Education.

"Administratively," Bemis said, "the Commission would have wanted to see more stability in the last five years." But he pointed to the coming appointment of a permanent president and the fact that the administration is "functioning effectively" now. He said the Commission will be "disappointed in the library situation, which has continued to decline. A great deal needs to be done in acquiring learning resources."

Lane continues to have "an outstanding reputation," he said.

## Competency examinations: myth vs. reality

**Myth:** Minimal competency examinations raise student accomplishment.

**Reality:** The typical effect of a minimal competency examination is to reallocate limited instructional resources from the average students, who have no trouble passing such a test, to the weakest students, who need special help. Since the effort to bring all students up to the level set by the exam is great, the progress of the majority is often slowed down while that of a few is improved. Many weak students fall further behind; often, the floor is too low for all. On the whole, more students lose than gain from such rigid structures. -- Source: "Everybody Counts," a report to the nation on the future of mathematics education, National Research Council, National Academy Press, Washington, D.C., 1989.

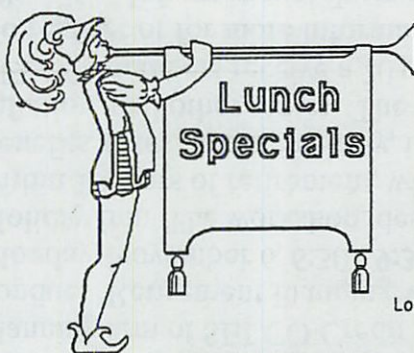

## **Alcohol and drug programs begin at Lane**

To meet federal regulations of the "Drug Free Workplace Act," the college has hired a substance abuse prevention coordinator. His name is Harvey Bond. Bond works out of Student Health half time, and for ASLCC half time. He has developed a counseling program and an education program for staff and students.

Three recovery support groups make up the main thrust of the counseling program.

An ongoing recovery group meets on Tuesdays, noon - 12:50 p.m., in Business 206. For those whose recovery has already begun, the group is open to anyone in the college wanting support for their recovery from chemical dependency.

A support group for "affected others" meets Wednesdays, 9 - 9:50 a.m., in Center 220. This group is for people who have been affected by another's (husband, wife, parent, child) chemical usage.

"Introduction to Recovery" is an opportunity to explore drinking and using patterns for greater self-understanding, as well as a group to help those seeking support for their decision to become chemically-free. Meetings are on Thursdays, 1 - 1:50 p.m., in Center 446.

Bond says the groups are ongoing; people may start at any time, and that group members' privacy is strictly guarded. He says he will start a recovery group for staff only if enough people want it. Bond is also available for individual counseling.

The education program begins this week with an ongoing seminar. It will meet on Wednesdays, 1 - 1:50 p.m., in Math & Art 249, and repeats on Thursdays, noon - 12:50 p.m., in Center 446. The free seminar is open to staff and students. It includes discussion on the disease concept of addiction, co-dependency and addictive family and societal systems, the recovery process, relapse, and basic information about alcohol and other drugs.

Bond says that he is also compiling a resource library of books, pamphlets, reference materials, directories, and videos on drug-related topics.
