## Project to study student success

Student Services and the Office of Instruction are sponsoring a project on student outcomes. The project seeks answers to two questions: (1) What kinds of educational outcomes do Lane faculty view as most important to their students? (2) What kinds of information about educational outcomes do faculty view as most useful in their professional roles?

In the first phase of the project, seven focus groups will discuss three questions: (1) How do faculty know when their students are successful? What is a definition of student success? (2) What kinds of data can be collected to document or demonstrate that Lane students are successful? (3) Of these kinds of data, which would be most useful to faculty.

The project's advisory team is co-chaired by Dan Hodges, Counseling, and Richard Null, Science. Also serving on the team are Don Micken, Electronics; Joan Ryan, Business; and Susan Swan, English and Foreign Languages. The project receives staff support from the Office of Institutional Research, Planning, and Evaluation.

Julie Aspinwall-Lamberts says that this exciting project will enhance our focus on student success and directly affect the college's abilities to meet the needs of our students. Faculty are encouraged to support this effort.

An upbeat campus atmosphere is seen at Lane by James Bemis, the Commission on Colleges representative. Bemis visited the college on Oct. 19 as part of the accreditation process by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges. The concluding statement of Bemis' report reads:

"In its 25-year history, Lane Community College has gained a national reputation for excellence. That reputation might have been somewhat tarnished in recent years because of declining enrollments, funding limitations, and strained relationships between the leadership of the administration and faculty. These matters are in the process of resolution. The evidence is clear that LCC is making progress in regaining its position of prominence. FTE student enrollment projections are encouraging after a period of decline. Funding is expected to improve with enrollment increases, better economic conditions, and some population growth. The main campus facilities are good to excellent in most program and service areas. The outreach centers are growing and progressing. There continues to be an experienced and well-trained faculty. The members of the Board of Education are willing and able to serve the college. The interim president is respected and an effective leader. There is an atmosphere on campus of renewed energy and enthusiasm to greet the new president who is scheduled to be named by January 1990."

## People out there love you

"Snapshots" of how Oregonians feel about community colleges came out of 10 recent Oregon Community College Association (OCCA) focus groups conducted in five cities, including Eugene. Information from the sessions will be the basis of a statewide telephone survey next February to

create a more precise standard on public opinion.

Findings from the focus groups:

- \*People don't understand how community colleges are funded, particularly how much the state contributes.
- \*People identify with community colleges, feel good about them, and often have been touched in some way by a community college. The smaller the community, the greater the tie and the more the college is a community center.
- \*People feel tuition is fair, maybe too reasonable. There is a hint that low cost is seen as low quality.
- \*People get information about community colleges from other people. A secondary source is the schedule of classes. Media are a distant third.
- \*People remember college problems and requests for money, but not the good things that happen.
- \*People give community colleges a grade of B; business people are the toughest graders.
- \*People perceive an inconsistency in faculty quality. They don't distinguish between credit and non-credit faculty.

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
