We have a new president

In case you were out of town or asleep and missed the announcement, Jerry Moskus was appointed sixth president of Lane Community College in a unanimous vote by the Board on Dec. 18. Moskus will assume his new position on March 1. His salary will be \$73,500, the same as former President Richard Turner's.

Moskus is currently a vice president at Des Moines Area Community College in Ankeny, Iowa; a post he's held since 1985. Before moving to Iowa, Moskus was at Lincoln Lane Community College in Springfield, Ill., for 14 years. His various jobs included assistant to the president, director of research and planning, dean of admissions, dean of transfer programs, and vice president of academic services.

He received his B.S. in 1965, his M.S. in 1968, and his Ph.D. in 1983 from Illinois State University in Normal, Ill. His doctoral dissertation was on community college student withdrawal.

People who have worked with him describe Moskus as a good thinker, a good planner, approachable, and capable of working with diverse groups in complex tasks.

Moskus says he will spend his first year thoroughly studying the college, talking to students and staff, and getting out in the community. "At the end of my first year," he said, "I'd like people to say about me that I know as much about LCC as anyone does."

Moskus is 47 years old, married with five children ranging in age from 12 to 19. He enjoys golf, walking, reading, and painting watercolors.

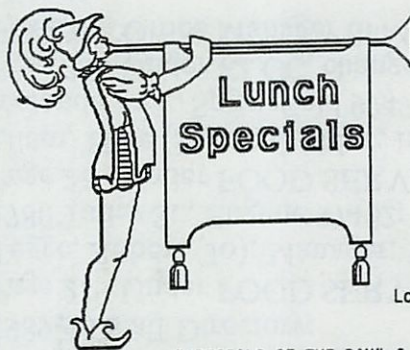

Growth spurt continuing

Winter term registration, as of the end of December, was up by 193 FTE (about 500 head-count) over winter term 1989. Growth is mostly in the transfer areas, but some career departments are up, too. Social Science is up 39 percent, English & Foreign Language 23 percent, Performing Arts 21 percent, Mathematics 17 percent, Science 12 percent. In career areas, Health Occupations is up 44 percent, Industrial Technology 16 percent. Classes tend to be full to overflowing, says Bob Marshall, interim vice president for Student Services. The growth has occurred in spite of a reduction of about 179 class sections (about 9 percent) over winter 1989.

By April, Customized Training will have trained more than 100 Forest Service employees in the use of computer spreadsheets, graphics, and data base.

"By using the Mobile Classroom in this fashion," Oatman says, "we're addressing the changing technology needs in the workplace. We're also addressing one of the college's main goals of working closer with businesses and employers to meet their training needs."

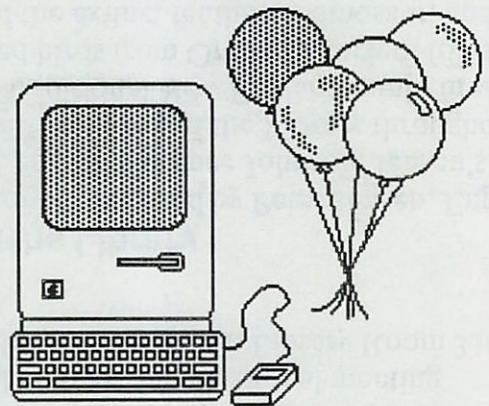

Grants to help KLCC build new station

KLCC 89.7 FM has received a \$10,000 grant from the Jackson Foundation to help construct a new public radio station to serve Lincoln County. In September KLCC received \$86,000 from the National Telecommunication & Information Administration, a federal agency, which provided 75 percent of the funds for the project.

The new station is scheduled to be on the air by the end of 1990 and will broadcast at 90.5 MHz. It will initially carry the same programming as KLCC.

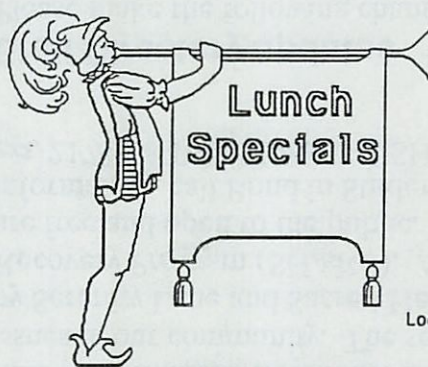

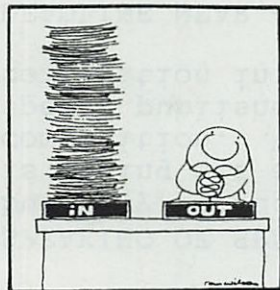

TUITION INCREASED - The Board of Education last week increased the College's tuition package by 3.6 percent, beginning summer term. Cost of 12 credits goes up \$12 to \$276 a term; out-of-state tuition increases \$92 to \$1,104 per term; a 30-hour non-credit class goes up \$2 to \$39; high school completion will cost \$2 more to \$39 a class; and senior citizens will pay \$2 more a class to \$17.

LEVY ON MARCH 27 BALLOT - Voters are asked to continue Lane's levy for campus maintenance and equipment by approving a four-year, \$725,000 per year serial levy. It would be collected in 1991-95. Cost is estimated to be 10 cents per thousand dollars of assessed value. It isn't a new tax since it replaces a current levy which runs out in 1991. Board of Education members say it's needed to protect the community's investment in Lane's \$75 million facilities. More on this later.

MARIE WILES RETIRING - Marie Wiles, Health Occupations faculty member from 1978-85 and associate department chair the past five years, will take early retirement, effective September 1. She led in development of the new nursing curriculum which is based on a nursing model. The first class to complete the new program graduates this year.

SHARED DECISION-MAKING POLICY ADOPTED - Lane's Board of Education has approved a new policy which begins, "The president shall assure broad employee and student representation and participation in college decision-making."

SPEAKING OF SPEAKING - Let's hear it for LCC Forensics, our little-heralded but very successful speech team. Coached by Barbara Breden, the group is coming off a winning year in which two students participated in national competition. Veasna Chan Yun went to North Dakota and Connecticut and got a speech published in 1989 Winning Orations. Cheryl Jacob was part of a competition in Concord, Calif. The program is offered for credit each term.

DEADLINE NEAR - In March the Oregon Committee for the Humanities will award up to seven individual research grants of \$3,000 to support a sustained period of professional research by Oregon scholars. Higher education enrollment booms

Enrollment in U.S. institutions of higher education reached an all-time high of 13.5 million in fall 1989. For the second consecutive year, women outnumbered men on the nation's campuses by more than one million, maintaining a 54 percent share of the total enrollment. Public two-year institutions captured the major share of the enrollment increase, with attendance up six percent over fall 1988. Large increases in full-time and part-time enrollment of both women and men contributed to the rise. Four-year institutions experienced slower growth, 2.3 percent. Questions and answers from last week's All-Campus Forum

Q. What's being done to supply adequate child care for students?

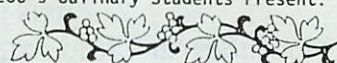
