
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

Program spotlights women composers





Disabled Student Services provides in-class assistance to both temporarily and permanently disabled students. Support services include notetaking, textbook reading, mobility aid, tutoring (including learning disabled), sign language interpreting, test proctoring, and early registration.

Disabled Student Services also lends adaptive equipment to students. Equipment includes a telecommunications device for the deaf (TDD), personal FM loop amplification systems for the hearing impaired, and a talking calculator and Perkins brailler for the visually impaired. Students can also get minor emergency wheelchair repair and resource and referral information on other community organizations.

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





Closure policy

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There's been a lot of confusion the past week over closures and late starts because of bad weather. Following is the official policly on closures:

- When the college is officially closed, all bargaining unit members, part-time credit instructors, and management employees scheduled to work will be paid as if they worked.
- If you are required to work when the college is officially closed, you are entitled to time off with pay on a straight-time basis.
- If you schedule leave on a closure day, your leave account will be charged as originally scheduled.
- Hourly employees are paid only for hours they actually work.
- If the college officially closes after work has started, eligible employees receive leave with pay for the remainder of the work day.
- If you are scheduled to report to work before a closure is announced, but have not reported at the time of the announcement, you may take personal leave, vacation leave, compensatory time, or leave without pay for hours not worked before the closure, as approved by your supervisor.
- If you choose to come to work late or leave early because of bad weather, you may take leave without pay, vacation leave, personal leave, or compensatory time, as approved by your supervisor.
- If you choose to work all or part of your schedule during an official closure, you receive no additional pay or time off.

- Feb 12 after 2 p.m.
- Feb 13 all day and evening.
- Feb 15 after 2:30 p.m.
- Feb 16 from 8 to 10 a.m.



Board agrees to faculty contract

At it's February meeting, the LCC Board of Education voted to accept a contract agreement with LCCEA, the faculty association, which amounts to approximately a five percent increase in the total wage/benefit package for full- and part-time faculty. The new three-year contract will cost the college about \$481,000 the first year.

In other action, the Board: Agreed to fund payroll costs of the LCC Foundation for the remainder of the fiscal year and for fiscal year 1990-91. Accepted audits of college operations for 1988-89, KLCC, the Student Financial Assistance program, and a general audit by the accounting firm of Coopers & Lybrand. Approved the sale of helicopter for a price not less than \$40,00. Accepted bid awards for a hot bond repair system and a robotic welding system. Authorized purchase of equipment to install and operate a translator for KLCC's Newport/Deope Bay site. Adopted a resolution authorizing the college to enter into an agreement with Lane County to install a traffic signal at Schafer Drive and 30th Avenue and to add a third lane to Schafer Drive. Agreed to continue general fund support of the Talent Grant, ASLCC Tuition Grant, and International Scholarship programs.

Resources for ED-NET are concern

Initial respondents to the recent ED-NET survey said Lane shouldn't participate because of limited resources, according to a preliminary report by Marie Matsen, Research, Planning, & Evaluation. A final report to include date from surveys received too late for inclusion in the first count will be forthcoming. The original respondents included 31 full-time faculty, seven part-time faculty, 17 classified, and 14 managers.

Sixty-five percent said "no" to participation in ED-NET. Of those, 73 percent cited limited resources, 58 percent said it's too expensive, and 29 percent said they're philosophically opposed. Some 51 percent would like to see the proposal re-evaluated if the college's financial situation improves.

Those who want Lane in ED-NET voted 20 to 4 in favor of both sending and receiving rather than receiving only.

Activities seen as practical for transmission and reception on ED-NET include special workshops, cited by 68 percent of respondents; staff development, 56 percent; regular courses, 48 percent; and meetings, 48 percent.

Business supports education

Oregon's post-secondary students should do a better job of learning basic skills, and four- and two-year colleges should be given more money to teach them. That's the advice of the Oregon Business Council, which surveyed business leaders statewide and presented the results this month to the Governor's Commission on Higher Education.

Businesses need employees with stronger basic competencies, such as ability to communicate, calculate, compute, analyze, reason, solve problems, and understand global issues, the report says.

Sixty-six percent of respondents agreed that today's educational offerings won't meet the needs of the year 2000 work force.

Some 89 percent advocated more resources for core education, which was defined as basic science, literature, math, and civilization. Seventy-five percent want more money for community colleges, and 74 percent want more resources for four-year schools.

Respondents see post-secondary education as having a key role in the economy (96%), business as dependent on improved post-secondary education (91%), continuing education as important to business (82%), and retraining of adult workers as needing a larger percentage of resources (83%).
