


Lane's fifth president takes office today

Dr. Jerry Moskus assumes office today as LCC's fifth president. Dr. Moskus began his career as an administrative assistant to the president of Lincoln Land Community College in Springfield, Ill. He worked his way up the administrative ranks holding various positions at Lincoln Land, including director of research and planning, dean of admissions, and dean of transfer programs. In 1984, he became vice president for academic services.



Since 1985, Dr. Moskus has served as supervisor of chief campus administrators and head of instructional and student services at Des Moines Area Community College in Ankeny, Iowa. He has been in charge of the day-to-day operations much of the time at Des Moines Area CC, which has programs similar to Lane's.

At the Iowa college, he worked with more than 50 community advisory committees on all college programs areas, and was an active member of the Ankeny Chamber of Commerce.

People who have worked with him describe Dr. Moskus as a good thinker, a good planner, approachable, and capable of working with diverse groups in complex tasks. Joe Borgen, president of Des Moines Area CC, describes him as "a very competent guy who gets things done. He works well with people."

Dr. Moskus received a B.S. in English, 1965; a M.S. in English, 1968; and a Ph.D. in Educational Administration, 1983

from Illinois State University in Normal, Ill. His dissertation was on community college student withdrawal.

Dr. Moskus is 47 years old. His wife, Dr. Virginia Loftus, is executive director of district administration at Des Moines Area CC. They have five children: Beth, 19; Jane, 17; Jennifer, 16; Julie, 15; and Jonathan, 12. Dr. Moskus enjoys golf, walking, reading, and painting watercolors.

Memo to LCC community from President Moskus

Today, as I assume my new duties, I want to express to you how grateful I am to have been given this opportunity. You may be assured that I intend to serve you to the best of my ability.

Over the next several months, I hope to contribute to a smooth, orderly transition in leadership. Toward that end, I pledge to study closely the major themes and issues, listen more than I talk, and suppress, to the best of my ability, any impulse I feel to "make an immediate impact." If in the next two months some unexpected crisis forces me to take action seemingly without adequate information or advice, I hope you will understand that I am acting out of necessity, not inclination.

A newly appointed president's vision of what a community college should be is, at best, premature. What LCC can be is to some degree a function of what it was and what it is. I want to work with you to develop and communicate a vision of our future that is consistent with LCC's impressive past. Your support in this endeavor is solicited and is very much appreciated.

I look forward to working with you!

Measles update

Yes, there is a measles epidemic among young adults in Eugene. Student Health has vaccines to help protect you from measles, mumps, and rubella. If you were born after 1957 and have not been immunized since 1980, or if you've had a medically diagnosed case of measles (not German measles, rubella) you should seriously consider being immunized. A measles shot is only \$13. A measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccination is \$32. If you have any questions about being vaccinated or revaccinated, particularly if you were born after 1957, contact Student Health, first floor Center Building, ext. 2665.

Most say "no" to ED-NET

The final tally of staff responses to the ED-NET survey confirmed earlier reports. Seventy-three (62 percent) of the 120 respondents don't want ED-NET. Faculty voted 2-1 against participation.

Some 71 percent cited limited resources as their reason for turning thumbs down. Sixty-five percent said the question should be reconsidered in future years if financial conditions improve. Response rate for the survey was 20 percent; only 120 of 600 surveys were returned.

Mechanics receives car

Mechanics Department received a donation of a 1989 Hyundai Sonata from Romania Hyundai. Automotive Technology students will use the car, along with separate components and manuals, to learn trouble shooting, maintenance, and repair.

Board, management reach agreement

The Board of Education has approved the modifications to the management working agreement. Those modifications are:

- *Apply a 4 percent cost-of-living increase to the salary schedule.
- *Grant a step to those eligible. (Two percent, what is called half-steps.)
- *Add \$10,000 to the personal development leave fund.
- *Cap the health insurance package at the current (Feb. 28, 1990) rate.

Official Notice Change of Sales Policy



HILL LESS A BARRIER THAN THOUGHT - When thinking about attending Lane, some prospective students are turned off by the prospect of attending a school that is "out in the country" and which is reached by traveling over the 30th Avenue hill. But, once people have traveled the distance a couple of times, the College is no longer perceived as remote or difficult to reach. That's what members of a student panel told Julie Aspinwall-Lamberts of Research, Planning and Evaluation recently. The inquiry was part of the Marketing Council's effort to solicit student opinion on various issues.

Other findings: Transfer students want more specific information about requirements of school which they plan to attend later. Prospective students want brochures about programs to be more specific and to include checklists of things to do to enroll, etc. People will pay more tuition if they know how the money will be spent and that funds will enhance, not just maintain, services. Respondents weren't enthusiastic about an alumni association. They invited staff to "treat me like I'm important when I'm here; help me." They'd like better bus service, including shorter commute times through park and ride service direct from various areas around the District.



RETREAT SCHEDULED - College Council will go off campus Tuesday, March 13, to hear President Moskus' views regarding participative management and to review the purpose of Council, discuss where decisions should be made, what kind of issues the Council should be considering, and what the composition of Council should be.

At last Tuesday's Council meeting, plans for the retreat were made and a discussion was held regarding mandatory and other program budget adjustments for the fiscal year starting July 1. A list of 31 items was scheduled to be divided into mandatory, items needed to maintain present service levels, and recommended adjustments. That list is to get a lot of airing in coming weeks because it represents where new money will be spent in next year's budget. The big ticket items are \$78,510 for the financial aid match, \$71,241 for childcare labs, \$70,000 for electricity rate increases, and \$28,346 for a Flight Technology technician.

QUESTION - About the serial levy on the March election ballot, what happens after this serial levy expires at the end of four years? ANSWER - Voter approval would be required to levy any additional money for these purposes. (For more information about the levy, call ext. 2202.)

Enrollment outlook rosy

Fall 1989 enrollment was up 179 FTE, or 7.3 percent over fall 1988. The largest increases were in credit programs (LDC and vocational preparatory) and in the self-improvement area. The latest projection from the office of Research, Planning, & Evaluation for the 1989-90 academic year estimates 8,181 FTE, up 5.2 percent over 1988-89. The number of full-time students is increasing sharply, reversing the trend of the mid-1980's. Likely factors contributing to this trend, according to RP&E, are increased marketing efforts by the college and enrollment management practices in the state system of higher education.



INNOVATOR OF THE YEAR AWARD

The League for Innovation in the Community College has created an award that is designed to recognize League College staff members who have designed and implemented a significant innovation during this past year. The recognition is known as the Innovator of the Year Award and is given annually to one individual from each of the 17 League member college districts. Any current Lane Community College employee, part-time or full-time, may be considered for the award.

The recipient of the Innovator of the Year Award will receive a plaque from the League for Innovation to be presented at an appropriate LCC function. The award winner will also be featured in the League publication, Innovator.

Last year's award went to Mr. Greg Harpole, Instructor, Business Department, for three recent achievements involving a database of tasks for office systems and accounting careers, a computer networked classroom to enhance individualized instruction in office administration, and a test-workbook for a computerized, simulated medical office.

The deadline for nominations is April 20, 1990.

CALL FOR NOMINATIONS

WHO MAY NOMINATE?

Nominations may come from anyone either inside or outside the College.

WHAT ARE THE SELECTION CRITERIA?

The award will be given to an individual who has designed and implemented a significant innovation at LCC. The League has established the following criteria for making the selection from among nominees. PLEASE NOTE THAT ONE OR MORE OF THE CRITERIA SHOULD BE MET, BUT IT IS NOT NECESSARY THAT ANY NOMINEE SHOULD MEET ALL CRITERIA.

1. Quality - Students and/or staff agree that the innovation increases quality in the course program, office, or institution. Evidence of quality may include student ratings or letters of support from colleagues.

(OVER)

2. Efficiency - There is evidence that the innovation or outstanding program contributes to a more efficient way of doing things. Student ratings, perceptions of outside consultants, and pre- and post-comparison of time involved are examples of evidence.
3. Cost Effectiveness - There is evidence that the innovation adds a value to the institution while at the same time containing or reducing costs. Cost data will serve as evidence.
4. Replication - The program selected can be used by other institutions with a minimum of difficulty. The description of the program should include any conditions necessary for replication.
5. Creativity - The selected program should be as original as possible or the adaptation should at least be creative. The description of the program or letters from experts are examples of evidence.
6. Timeliness - The award-winning program should not be more than five years old at that institution, but it must have been around long enough to have been tested so that it meets most of the criteria.

HOW WILL THE WINNER BE SELECTED?

LCC's Innovator of the Year Award Selection Committee will review the nomination and supporting materials and select one award winner by May 14. The Committee will invite and encourage high-quality nominations, and in the event no nominations are deemed to be of a caliber worthy of nationwide recognition, no award will be made.

This year the Selection Committee will consist of the three most recent recipients of the Innovator of the Year award. They are: Dr. Daniel Hodges, Counseling (1986); Ms. Linda Riepe, Home Economics (1987); and Mr. Thomas A. Wayne, Science (1988); Dr. Larry Warford, League Representative, chairs the Committee.

HOW ARE THE NOMINATIONS MADE?

Nominations should consist of the name and department of the innovator and a one-page description of the project, process, item, or activity supported by relevant materials. If materials are visual, or in some other form, it may be necessary for the nominee to make arrangements for the Award Selection Committee to have access for viewing purposes.





Kudos for Study Skills

On the last day of a graduate class I had this winter, one of the class members reported on a project she had conducted of older (30-50) undergraduate students at the U of O. She interviewed ten students at some depth looking for what its like to attend college with younger students, problems they encountered, and their successes. Nine of the ten reported numerous problems, ranging from inconsiderate fellow students to feelings of classroom isolation. Only one, an LCC transfer student, reported his experience as positive. It wasn't that he hadn't encountered the same problems, but that he felt prepared to handle them. He credited the LCC Study Skills Department and an "Effective Learning" class as the key elements in his ability to cope. He especially mentioned the idea of subjugating external factors in order to clearly focus on the process of learning.

Insurance notes

When you get your medical bill . . .

Examine it carefully. Staff in doctors' offices and hospitals make mistakes like anyone else. Check your bill carefully to make sure you aren't billed for services or supplies you didn't receive. Add up the figures yourself to make certain there are no math errors. If you find a mistake, contact your doctor or hospital immediately. If your doctor or hospital bills your insurance company directly, be sure you get a copy of the bill. The more complicated a billing, the more likely it will contain mistakes. A decimal point can make a difference. Watch, too, for extra zeros that can change \$100 into \$1000. Even if your insurance company pays your medical bills, billing errors drive up the cost of health insurance. Remember, it's your health care dollar: Spend it wisely.



Serial levy goes down, Lewis unseated

The no voters outnumbered Yes voters by less than one percent in Tuesday's election, defeating LCC's proposed levy for maintenance and equipment 27,873 to 27,381. All four counties in the college district voted No. In Linn, it was 176 to 392; in Benton, 71 to 221; in Douglas, 0 to 5, and in Lane, 27,134 to 27,255.

In contests for seats on the LCC Board of Education, Larry Mann of Springfield defeated incumbent Martin Lewis of Eugene 16,550 to 15,005 (results from Lane County only). Some 45 percent of voters didn't bother to vote in this race. Other candidates Cindy Weeldreyer and Peter Sorenson were elected without opposition.

"I'm happy to have the opportunity to work with the Board as a team on problems the college faces," Mann told *The Daily*. "It's nice to be on the same team instead of the other side."

Lewis told *The Daily*: "I congratulate Larry Mann, and I hope the staff offers him the same opportunities and cooperation I received when I came to the Board. I will continue to be an advocate for LCC. Thanks to everyone who helped in my campaign."

Message from President Moskus

We appreciate very much the voters who took the time to become informed on the serial levy, and we want to thank the many staff and community members who worked to inform the public.

The referendum leaves us with some difficult options. We can plan to fund essential repairs to the physical plant and essential equipment with operating fund revenues, or we can return to the voters again before the current levy expires in June 1991. The first option would impact the college's current programs and services. Meanwhile, our role is to inform the public of our needs. We will be happy to discuss the issues with any group or individual as we explore the options.

I want to thank the students, classified staff, faculty and administrators, and community members who supported the levy. Given the narrow margin of loss, we are viewing this as a challenge to inform the public better of our needs. I welcome your ideas and your help in addressing this challenge.


