



Hill a barrier to some

The 30th Avenue hill is a barrier to access to LCC for some students, according to members of the Student Consumer Panel. Three of the eight students on the panel felt that LCC's location was a barrier and recommended free bus passes for LCC students and more direct bus transportation between Springfield and the college. (The U of O issues free bus passes to its students.) The panel also discussed tuition, fees, and tax levies at its most recent meeting.

The students unanimously agreed that LCC is a good value for the money. Most said they would pay higher tuition and fees if they knew how the money would benefit them. Similarly, the majority thought that students would support tax

increases if they knew how the money would help them.

The Student Consumer Panel is a pilot project that will continue if it proves to be a useful way to gather information from students.
