

ELECTION ON BOARD AGENDA - LCC's Budget Committee and Board of Education will each meet Wednesday night. The Budget Committee will convene at 7 in ADM 216 to receive the Administration's spending plan for the fiscal year which begins July 1. The \$40.2 million proposal will be up 10.3 percent over this year because of such things as a \$940,000 reserve fund to be used in 1991-92 toward an anticipated revenue shortfall.

The 8 p.m. Board of Education meeting will focus on housekeeping matters plus a discussion about possible funding elections. On the table is an offer by Lane County to pay up to \$25,000 toward costs of an LCC election to be held between now and July 1991. The Board could consider either or both a serial levy or tax base election.



Salik recommendations will be reviewed

The Salik reclassification recommendations for classified staff will get a thorough administrative review between now and November, with the aim of identifying and remedying concerns.

President Moskus will appoint an Administrative Review Team (ART) of about five to nine managers by Tuesday, May 15, to develop a process and begin looking at problem areas. If you wish to serve on or nominate someone for the ART, contact President Moskus by May 14.

The ART is to report its findings by mid-July and to share them with the Salik team. Salik will do its own review and report back to managers by mid-October. President Moskus is to receive the final recommendations by October 29, then discuss possible implementation of the classification system with the Board of Education on November 14.

After that time, hearings will be arranged for individual appeals by classified employees. Finally, possible wage changes will be negotiated with the LCC Employees Federation.

Moskus gives specific charge to Insurance Task Force

Reprinted from LCCEA News

The Insurance Task Force (Pat Dickover, Dick Eno, Linda Loft, Germaine Mock, Bill Reilly, Jackie Thomas) has been reviewing the college's current benefit program for all employees and has evaluated cost containment measures as proposed by the Agent of Record. In a January 16 memo to the three bargaining units, the task force recommended that the college and the bargaining units investigate having a single insurance carrier or trust organization which would provide the current level of benefits. They further recommended that the investigation entail the procurement of informal bids from the various insurance carriers and trust organizations.

In a March 22 memo, President Moskus suggested:

1. Exploring the feasibility of self insuring by the college.

2. Developing Requests for Proposals based on the insurance coverage currently applicable to each group and no less coverage for present employees based on negotiated contracts.

3. Evaluating potential carriers and their proposals.

4. Looking for ways to use the approximately \$20,000 of surplus funds from the Vision Service Plan.

5. Any other efforts which the task force deems appropriate toward improving benefits collegewide while containing the rapid escalation of insurance programs.





BUDGET OKAYED - LCC's proposed \$71,012,447 budget for fiscal year 1990-91 has received tentative approval by the College Budget Committee. It includes a general fund (day-to-day operating budget) of \$40,246,706. In the general fund is \$21,915,345 (54.4%) for instruction; \$1,640,481 (4.1%) for instructional support; \$279,597 (.7%) for community services; \$308,895 for financial aid (.8%); \$3,706,019 (9.2%) for student services; \$5,577,776 (13.9%) for college support services; \$3,253,248 (8%) for plant operations and maintenance; and \$3,565,345 (8.8%) for contingency. Expressed another way, there is \$28,328,372 (70.4%) for personal services; \$6,794,064 (16.9%) for materials and services; \$834,333 (2.1%) for capital outlay; \$1,515,515 (3.7%) for transfers out; and \$2,774,422 (6.9%) for contingency. The increase in the general fund is 11.9 percent. Revenues will come from state reimbursement, 23.9%; property taxes, 39.3%; tuition and fees, 17.4%; nonclass fees, 5%; and other, 14.4%. 
