
ENROLLMENT UP - Summer Term enrollment is up five percent for both FTE and headcount, compared to summer 1989. Full-time equivalent students are up 15 to 342.6 despite the fact that only 528 sections (17 fewer than last year) are being offered. Headcount is up 105 over last summer to 2,207 students. Largest growth areas are Industrial Tech, up nine FTE to 17.8; Central Area, up nine FTE to 16.6; and Flight Tech, up 8.4 FTE to 15.4. Biggest FTE generators are Social Science, 43.7; Mathematics, 43.5; and Business, 41.6. Full-time headcount has dropped off 10, while part-time headcount has climbed 115. Evening and weekend enrollment is down slightly because of a reduction in sections offered.

HIGH APPROVAL RATING - Ninety-five percent of Oregonians reached in a recent telephone survey think community colleges should play a significant role in building a competitive work force, ensuring high levels of literacy, and providing people with access to educational opportunities. Eighty-one percent favor greater state support to fund these goals, and 71 percent favor more state support even if it doesn't lower property taxes. The overall job rating was 72 percent, which led all other state systems of education. Eighty-one percent said community colleges meet community educational and vocational needs. Sixty-five percent have taken classes at community colleges and 63 percent plan to take more classes. In rating types of programs, the respondents placed importance on short-term job training (86 percent); one and two-year vocational programs (86 percent); transfer courses (82 percent); and basic skills and remedial courses (80 percent). Oregon Community College Association commissioned The Nelson Report of Salem to call 461 households throughout the state. The survey is considered statistically valid within plus or minus five percent.



ELECTION DECISION SOON - LCC's Board of Education is expected to decide at its July 11 meeting whether the College will have a money measure on the November general election ballot, and whether it will be a proposed new tax base, an operating levy beyond the six percent limitation, or a serial levy. All were discussed at the June 28 work session. An increase of around \$5 million in the base could push the tax rate for LCC up 29-cents to an estimated \$2.28. The owner of a home assessed at \$80,000 would pay an estimated additional \$38 or a total of around \$197 a year. Such a base would make almost no cuts necessary, would preclude a need for a tuition increase, would allow for a FTE increase of 245, and would include \$700,000 per year for plant maintenance and equipment. But, would voters support such a proposal? Would staff support it? Staff and community input are solicited.

CUTS WOULD HURT - Without additional funding for the 1991-92 fiscal year, and the year following, LCC would have to make big cuts to balance its budget. There has been talk of cutting \$1 million in personnel costs (around 18 positions), reducing spending for equipment, allowing no new programs, allowing no upgrading of present programs, capping enrollment, and cutting costs other places to save small amounts. To increase revenue, there has been consideration of a four percent tuition hike to raise about \$262,000, along with hopes expressed for additional state support. But



a budget has to be in place before the College learns what the Legislature will do in its 1991 session. Staff and community input are welcome.

LIMITATION AGAIN ON BALLOT - The sixth proposed property tax limitation since 1978 will be on the November election ballot. It would trim Eugene's present \$20 per \$1,000 for school support to \$5 by 1995. The state would have to find support to make up the difference for the schools during the implementation of the measure, but there is no implication that the state would continue to be required to do so after 1995. It has been suggested that a sales tax might have to be implemented by the state to find additional needed monies to fund schools. Yes, the measure does include community colleges.

The Daily will share additional information on the limitation as it is received A campaign to defeat the proposal is being organized by The Oregon Committee in Portland, which has used the firm of Pihas, Schmidt, and Westerdahl to overcome limitation measures in 1978, 1980, 1982, 1984, and 1986.

YOUR RESPONSE IS WELCOME - Board of Education-assigned goals and objectives for President Jerry Moskus for 1990-91 are being developed. All items in a first draft relate to the present College Plan. Staff and community suggestions on changes are welcomed. The approach reflects the new President's style of openness and consultation.

BOARD MEETING TOMORROW -- At tomorrow night's meeting, the board will discuss tax base options and be asked to take action on an interim child care recommendation. (See item below.) The consultant would work up to half time for six months and report directly to the president.

ELECTION UPDATE -- At its July meeting, the Lane Community College Board of Education delayed until August a decision about placing a new tax base or levy on the November ballot. In the meantime, the President's Office will poll staff and meet with community groups to learn their views of such an election. A survey will be mailed to contracted faculty at their homes and to all other contracted staff at work with a request to return the surveys by July 26.

OTHER BOARD BUSINESS -- Also at its July meeting, the board seated new member Larry Mann; elected Jim Pitney chair and Pat Riggs vice chair for the 1990-91 year; appointed Cindy Weeldreyer to serve as the college representative to the Oregon Community College Association board and Pat Riggs to serve as the college representative to the Lane Council of Governments board for 1990-91; appointed 452 community members to the college's 43 advisory committees; approved \$6,000 to \$7,000 from contingency to hire a consultant to develop a child care plan for the college; and approved a list of construction priorities for state funding. first item on the list was a request for \$382,000 to improve handicap access on campus.

The board also discussed a report by member Peter Sorenson advocating that the college use mediation as a means for resolving conflicts. The board agreed by consensus that the college explore membership in the National Association of Mediation in Education and consider holding a mediation day on campus. Webster Dictionary defines mediation as "friendly or diplomatic intervention, by consent or invitation, for settling differences between persons or groups."

The board awarded bids totalling \$26,336 for Health and P.E. athletic clothes to Durham Hosiery Mills, Team Athletic Supply, Champion Products, and Portland Athletic Supply and bids totalling \$35,800 for Health Occupations dental assisting and dental hygiene equipment to Biddle and Crowther, Burkhart Dental Supply, Durr-Fillauer Medical, Hu-Friedy Mfrg., JB Dental Supply, Kent Dental, Tag Dental, and Thierman Products.
